

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ST MARY'S PARISH CHURCH **PAYHEMBURY**

Dear Friends.

I travel around the lanes a lot to and fro between my three parishes and the other day. as I was driving along, the shape of the landscape really struck me. We take so much for granted, the rolling hills, wooded valleys and lush green horizons. But what particularly struck me, as I was driving along a lane I don't usually travel on, was the actual contours of the land, the ups and down of the fields. One minute it looks like a flat field and then the field dips down to a small valley or just curves away into the distance. It set me thinking whether we really appreciate the environment in which we live. I know that I take for granted these rolling fields, the different shades and the changing colours.

We live in a part of the country which is beautiful; where our eyes can travel over so much of interest. We don't have large endless flat plains that stretch into the distances, but a patchwork of colour and shape.

As I mused on the countryside, it set me thinking about life itself; life is a patchwork of colour and shape, we have our ups and downs, we have changes of mood as we have changes of seasons, we are affected by the climate just as the land is. But there is a constant in all of this; we have God's love which was brought to us though the life and

death of Jesus Christ, which is a constant. That love never changes and is with us though all the ups and downs of life, as well as all the changing circumstances, whether we are aware of it or not.

The seasons are changing again; the lovely weather of late summer is drawing to an end, the evenings are closing in, the hours of light are shortened and reduces our time to admire our countryside, but we know that as the winter closes in, eventually spring will open out, bringing light, bright days. We have the hope of fresh beginnings once more.

That is, of course, the cycle of the natural life and also the cycle of our lives, if you like, it is the contours of our lives just like the contours of the countryside. Through all the changing contours of our lives God's love surrounds us and keeps us going; seasons change but His love doesn't and wherever the changes of our lives lead us and whether we feel we are in a dark season, there is always hope of the brightness of a changing season or something else over the hill.

Help pets during firework season

Prepare and protect your pet from fireworks.

Most dogs and cats have a favourite place to go and hide, if not you need to create a hideaway where they can feel safe. A room that is quiet and has minimal windows is the most suitable. Installing an Adaptil or Feliway diffuser may encourage them to settle, feel relaxed and confident. This should be done 2 - 4 weeks prior to the expected stress. Provide blankets for him to hide under and burrow. Offer chews and treats, so that your pet sees this hiding place as a good place to go, and he can chew to relieve tension.

Take your dog out for a walk an hour before any planned fireworks, and feed him an early evening meal to help him feel relaxed. Close the curtains to block out flashes of light and as much of the sound as possible. Cats need to be confined to the house and provided with a litter tray.



If you're going out, play some background music that your dog normally hears (and doesn't object to!), or leave the television on.

Ignore the sounds of the fireworks yourself and do not soothe or comfort your dog, as this gives him the impression that there is something to be frightened of and rewards him for being scared.

Small mammals like rabbits and guinea pigs that live outside should not be forgotten. If possible move them into a shed or outhouse. Covering the front of the hutch with a blanket can help cut out some of the noise and flashes of light.

If you require any more information about helping your pet, then just call and speak to either a vet or veterinary nurse who will be happy to help and may recommend medication. Old-fashioned sedatives have been replaced with modern anti anxiety drugs which help treat the problem, rather than just mask it.

A few points of interest from the last Parish Council Meeting, held on 10th September 2014



The application for funding from the new 'pothole fund' for the **repair to Uggaton Cross has been refused**, based on county-wide priorities. The meeting confirmed that the badgers have now returned to the site and it was widely agreed that we have missed this year's window of opportunity for repairs to be done. Pressure should continue, aiming for work to be done early next year.

The clerk has written to the Chief Constable outlining the dangers and concerns regarding the lack of a pavement, and asking for support. We're now awaiting detailed information from DCC Highways, regarding specification for a pavement. Cllr Diviani agreed to continue to

push for funding for a pavement as a priority.

Cllr Disney updated the meeting that **sleepers are now in place restricting stones and water entering the road at Mousehole**. Cllr Fowler has emailed DCC Highways requesting a site visit during the dry weather to assess the damage. The meeting thanked Cllr Disney for his work on site at Mousehole.

The **telephone box has been temporarily removed** in order to re-decorate it. This will not affect its listed status, but it must be returned to the original spot once repainted. Consideration is being given to making the telephone box into an 'information box' or a library once it has been re-decorated.

Nature Notes

Observations from September

Hello nature lovers!

Just a short note this month, as Margaret and I have been away on holiday for a week in September. Also, the lousy weather in August did not encourage much nature watching!



The birds have been very quiet, both before and after our holiday. They are still resting up after the breeding season, and their annual moult. However, there are still some swallows and martins about; I saw twenty or so down at Tuck Mill yesterday, September 15th. The young birds were sitting on the telephone wires, being fed by their parents. They will soon be off to Africa, when the days become cooler. We saw a lot in Europe, together with their larger relatives, the swifts, which were

screaming overhead. Amongst them were a few alpine swifts, which are white underneath and black on their backs and wings.

It's been a good year for butterflies. According to the results of the 'Big Butterfly Count', the most common butterfly seen in the UK is the peacock. There were certainly lots round here, but even more small tortoiseshells. Both species are lovely butterflies. There have not been as many whites this year.

The autumn is the time of much change in the bird world. We lose our summer visitors, but we gain lots



of birds from the north, places like Scandinavia and Russia, lots of wildfowl, waders, wild swans and geese, so there's lots to look forward to.

Rainfall: August was unusually wet with twice the average rainfall. September so far has been almost completely dry for the first two weeks and for the UK it is the driest start to September since 1960.

Temperatures: August was relatively cool with the mean only just above the climatological average, the coolest month of the year relative to the norm. September, in contrast, to date has been very warm, up to 3 degC on average, giving us an Indian summer.

Weather elsewhere: According to US researchers, June 2014 broke a few records. It was the warmest month on record over land and ocean (16.2 degC) and also for the ocean alone (16.4 degC). Meanwhile, California's continuing drought is resulting in wildfires. In contrast, in central Pakistan, monsoon rains are resulting in severe flooding.


