Dear Friends,

How are your Lenten promises going, did you give something up or take on something? **We're past the halfway point, a time to reflect on how it's been. Did you lapse, forget, moan about it or are you still going?**

I am often amazed at the number of people who wouldn't say they were religious in any way or even have a faith but they still like to give something up for Lent, in a way I can't get my head around that. Is it just tradition or a good excuse to try a diet etc?

For those of us who observe Lent in a religious way we may not necessarily give something up but may take on something. Perhaps we will try to be more helpful or give more to charity or spend more time in prayer or reading the Bible. Doing any of those things is still giving something up as it takes time and that takes time away from other things.

Lent is supposed to be a time for self reflection

though, a time to look at ourselves and perhaps to look more closely at some of the things we do wrong, where we make mistakes in our relationships and so on.

I think it's quite a good idea every now and then to look into ourselves, we can be so

busy doing lots of things that we forget to look inward. When we do we might of course not be too happy with what we see, but in a way **that's the point. We need to** look into ourselves occasionally

to look at our little foibles and perhaps reflect on how we could change them if they **need changing. If we don't give ourselves** time for self examination we can carry on behaving in a way which might offend others unknowingly. **In a way it's a bit like doing some personal spring cleaning. I don't** know about you but I know I need it sometimes, so give yourself time as spring is here to do some personal spring cleaning and you may well find it refreshing.

Parish Paper Finances

The committee held its annual meeting in March where it was revealed that our bank balance is actually fairly healthy at the moment. However, this is mainly due to the envelopes put in the magazines which raised £352 and a generous donation of £150 from the shop, so we are well aware that we need to keep an eye on the ball.

Some people feel there are rather a lot of adverts in the paper, but without them we would not be able to give every household in the parish a FREE parish paper every month of the year. This year the income from advertising was £1,407 and there is no other way of raising this sort of money. Once again generous donations from everyone totaled £430 with £50 coming from the box in the shop.

It was decided at the meeting to put envelopes in the June issue of the parish paper again this year; we were in dire straits a couple of years ago and are keen to keep the finances on an even keel and avoid any further emergencies.

Once again, many thanks to all and keep it coming!

PIZZA KNOTS

It is very simple recipe for pizza dough and I like it as not necessary to wait for long time to double dough. You really need 15 minutes to double dough or little more depends of yeast. Or if you have a bread maker it's even easier!

Ingredients:

230 ml. warm water (45°C)
1 tbsp sugar
10g. dry yeast
3 tbsp. olive oil (best you can get)
1 tsp. salt
310g strong white flour plus some for dusting

In warm water dissolve yeast, add sugar, olive oil and salt and mix well. Pour the mixture in flour and make the dough and leave covered to rest 10-15 minutes somewhere warm. The dough will double.

Roll out the dough and cut into strips about 5cm (2") wide and 20cm (8") long. Tie them into a simple knot (no scout badges required here) and bake for about 15 minutes on high shelf to 220-240°C.

For something a little different add cheese or olives.

Nature Notes
Observations from March

Hello again

Well, Spring has sprung! The birds are singing, the bees are buzzing and some butterflies are fluttering.

It was very Spring-like on 24th February, so I was encouraged to take a walk down to Tuck Mill. Some primroses were flowering along the lane, but the recent storms have felled two trees by the river. Talking of primroses, have you seen them outside Nan's by Warren Close. They have special significance for Margaret and I because the seeds were sown by Jackie Platt, who lived there, and has since sadly passed away.

The first early birds we hear singing are the robins, dunnocks and chaffinches, and they are now almost in full song. I must rise earlier in the morning, to hear the full dawn chorus! On a walk round Upton the other day, we saw several butterflies, including three lovely yellow brimstones, and five small tortoiseshells. These will have survived the winter, in a shed or similar hiding place. Down in Cornwall, at Lanhydrock National Trust garden, there were lots of butterflies, including some commas, so called because on their underwings, they have a small white mark, which looks like a comma.

I was amazed to see on telly that some beavers have been spotted on the river Otter! I thought they must have been otters, which is more likely, but no, they were definitely beavers. What do you know!!

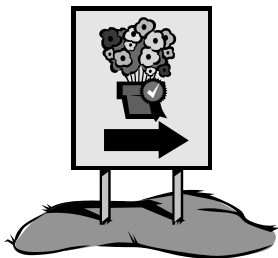
The report on our Lady Day Holy Communion Service being held on 25th March will be given next month.

Devon Carers pledges to improve Health and Wellbeing for carers

Staff from Devon Carers will be working hard over the next three months to highlight the issues that face carers and the support available for them.

A local awareness-raising campaign will focus on identifying carers who might benefit from a Carers Health and Wellbeing Check.

Matthew Byrne, Manager of Devon Carers said:

"We are delighted that Devon Carers has been selected to lead the Carers Week Quest in Devon. The campaign aims to be the greatest ever drive to reach out to the UK's carers – to identify carers in their local communities who are missing out on vital support and services.

"Between now and Carers Week (Monday 9 to Sunday 15 June 2014) we will be raising awareness of carers and their needs, and working in collaboration with local organisations to enable carers to access Carers Health and Wellbeing checks."

The very nature of caring – of being there for a loved one facing ill health or disability – **means too often people don't at first, or sometimes ever, identify themselves as carers and, therefore, miss out on support.**

Without the right help and support caring can have a devastating impact – carers can quickly become cut off with their physical and emotional health, work and finances all hit hard.

Even more reason to be cheerful when the sun comes out!.....

Parish Hall

In March you may see activity in, around and on the Parish Hall. On Thursday 13th March, Rudge Renewables started to fit a 40-panel 10kWp Solar Photovoltaic system on the south side of the roof which will generate electricity whenever the sun shines (or even when a cloudy sky is reasonably bright).

The Parish Hall Committee has invested approximately £14,000 of the community's funds into this project, with the following benefits in mind:

- ◆ The anticipated financial benefit is just under £2,000 a year, meaning that the investment will be paid off between 7 and 8 years from now. Thereafter, until 20 years from now, the Hall will be better off to the tune of approximately £2,000 every year (an overall benefit of £26,000 over 20 years).
- ◆ We will reduce the impact of unforeseen energy price increases.
- ◆ We will be generating clean, renewable energy.

Although it may be a little while before the direct benefits are realised by Hall users, eventually this means that, over 20 years, the Hall will have £26,000 to use on facilities development or maintenance, equipment, or reduced user charges (as decided by the elected Committee) which otherwise we, as a community, would not have had. This could turn out to be even greater than projected if electricity prices increase faster than the standard projections.

Thanks go to the Committee for making the decision to invest in the future.

Payhembury School

Payhembury School also saw the potential in renewable energy and fitted a 4kWp Solar PV system on its outdoor shelter last year. Since then it has generated 1.2 mWp. The School will be better off by approximately £900 per year (net) over a 20-year period.

Thanks are due to the FOPS Committee for raising the money, to the team of hard-working volunteers for their huge effort into the Shelter extension which made fitting the PV possible, and to Penny Hammett the Head Teacher, for having the foresight to see the potential of the project straight away. Thanks also to Rob Leach who donated some of the Solar PV panels, which significantly reduced the cost to the school.

Rainfall: In February we had twice the normal rainfall with many storms yet again queuing up to sweep across Devon. This winter southwest England and south Wales has seen 632.5mm of rain beating the previous record of 610.7mm in 1990. The south-east was wetter compared to its average than the south west. Things have settled down in March with a dry period during the first half of the month.

Temperatures: The mean temperatures over the past two months have been well above average by over 2degC making it a warm winter with no sign of snow to date and only a few frosts experienced. Globally 2013 was among the top ten warmest years since records began.

Weather elsewhere: The strong storms have transferred from battering the UK to herald the start of Autumn in New Zealand with a tropical cyclone threatening N. Island and Christchurch flooded. California continues to suffer drought conditions.
