

will be in the Parish Hall car park Wed August 6 11.25am - 11.45am







Nature Notes - Observations from July



Hello again

Returning home at dusk the other evening, a large dark shape flew silently overhead – a tawny owl – the first I've seen this year. I haven't heard many owls either, which is unusual. Biddy tells me that they have a family of little owls in Colestocks. These are not much bigger than thrushes.



Late in June, there was a lot of activity on our feeders – lots of young birds – finches, tits, sparrows, collared doves plus a great spotted woodpecker, which was always around. Then, I discovered that there were two of them, a pair? We've also been visited by a nuthatch, but only once! Did you know that nuthatches can walk down tree trunks head first?



Down at the Tale, at Tuckmill, the young swallows were sitting on the wires, being fed by the parent birds. There are a few more hirundines (swallows, martins and swifts) about now,



but not as many as we get in some years. I wonder why?

Walking back home, I noticed more butterflies on the wing – gatekeepers, meadow browns, whites and a comma. The main flush of butterflies has not appeared yet. It is a bit early in the year for them. They usually wait until our buddleia has gone to seed but they then feed on the windfall apples.

Rainfall: Both June and so far in July has been average rainfall. Thunderstorms on 17th July provided a good lightning display over Payhembury.


The book offers a variety of themes - from whimsical humour to the macabre, with each of the five authors offering their own styles of writing. It has already

Tips to keep your dog safe at the beach



Don't assume your dog can swim. All dogs have to learn to swim just like us. Some breeds are naturally strong swimmers, but other breeds (such as corgis and pugs) are not.

Drinking salt water is a bad idea. Ensure you have plenty of fresh water in a cool or shaded place at all times.

Apply sunscreen to your dog – especially to dogs with thin or pale fur – and apply to areas such as the nose and ears. Don't forget poo bags so you can clean up after your dog.

Make sure your dog has a collar, ID tag and preferably is micro chipped, just in case he/she gets lost.

Don't overdo it. Running on sand is more tiring than on grass, so don't expect your dog to be able to run and play for as long as they might on a normal walk. Make sure your dog has a shady area to rest in and remember that sand can be scorching on paws on a hot day so make sure you have a blanket for him/her to lie down on.

Be careful to avoid heat stroke – watch for signs of overheating such as excessive panting, drooling, co-ordination problems, vomiting and/or diarrhoea and collapse.

Dogs with heatstroke need their body temperature lowering gradually to give them the best chance of survival.

Immediately douse the dog with cool (never cold) water if possible.

Move the dog into a shaded cool area and give small amounts of cool water to drink.

Go straight to the nearest veterinary practice and call ahead so that they are expecting you.

If your dog suffers from arthritis or other joint conditions limit the amount of time spent swimming in cold water. They may think it is great fun at the time, but they will probably be very stiff and sore the following day. They can also get tail strain from using their tail as a rudder when swimming, which can be very painful.

At the end of the day check your dog over thoroughly for cuts and scrapes, rinse him/her thoroughly to remove salt and sand from coat and paws and dry thoroughly to ensure he/she does not get chilled.
