#### Payhembury Parish Council

Draft notes of a Parish Council meeting held Wednesday 8th January 2014 In attendance: Cllrs Somers, Williams, Scarle and Disney

Apologies for absence: Cllrs Fowler, Leach, Doble, Diviani and Skinner.

Minutes of the previous meeting were agreed and signed as correct.

Public Session: Jim Baker asked for an update on the closure of the road from Uggaton Cross. Since the last meeting, the hole in the road has been filled, but not by DCC Highways. As such, traffic is now using the road, despite the road closed signs still in position. The meeting agreed for the Clerk to continue with the request for repair costs and a risk assessment from Highways, and to ask if the repair has been inspected.

Lorinda Perry raised the problem with the Payhembury village website. It is currently not appearing on any search engines. It was reported that Graham Smith is working to rectify this. Clerk asked to review next month, and to ask for a link with Payhembury Primary School. Cllr Somers reported of more problems with BT & Broadband in the village. If the situation continues, PPC should consider getting involved. A petition has been placed in the village shop re: improved broadband.

Cllr Disney reported how he has cleared the road gully at Mousehole with his digger and found 4 drains. Water was flowing much easier now. Possible further improvements would be to place railway sleepers in the field, by the hedge gap. Clerk to contact Cllr Leach.

Police Report: PC Vickery reported of 3 crimes since the last report in September. These were a forced entry into a detached garage resulting in garden equipment being stolen; criminal damage to a car and forced entry into a barn resulting in a stolen quad bike. PC Vickery **reminded the meeting of the 'stop a thief' scheme which enables alarm systems to be trialled.** Jim Baker gave thanks to the police saying they did all they could to retrieve the stolen quad.

Matters Arising: <u>Village pavement</u>: the Clerk reported that the petition gathered by the shop has been sent to DCC Highways with a request for stipulations & costings for the requested pavement. PCC has been informed the required information would take 6-8 weeks for Highways to gather, and a response would then be prepared.

<u>De-listing telephone box</u>: research has found the village's telephone box is a 'K6' which was designed by Gilbert Scott. There are limited numbers of these in existence in the country, and as a result it would be very difficult to 'de-list'. In order to carry out some of the repairs, it may require listed building consent. It was agreed the box will now have to stay in its current position, and to now go through with the dis-connection of the electricity. Clerk to investigate any possible grants that may be available to assist with the refurbishment.

<u>Parishes Together</u>: the possible funding with Broadhembury to tackle the Japanese Knotweed is progressing. Clerk to contact Tale Valley Trust for advice. Cllr Disney to contact Blackdown Environmental to arrange a site visit and a quote.

Planning: The application for Willow Lodge was discussed. It was agreed the demolition of the building would be beneficial for the site. (Table on opposite page) Finances

Current balance was £4,175.32 and the Parish Council agreed to pay the following invoices: ALP Grounds Maintenance, £255.00.

Precept Planning

Clerk outlined the budget for the year, and the possible expenses still to arise.

Cllr Williams proposed the Clerk receive a pay rise of 5%, all Cllrs agreed. The rise will take

effect from the new financial year. It was concluded that further information from EDDC is required regarding any new rules for precepts. It was agreed the precept should rise by 6.5% if acceptable within EDDC referendum rules, or by 4.95% if the referendum rule is set at 5%. Clerk to contact EDDC and circulate any further details to ClIrs.

Parish Grants: The request from PCC for financial assistance with the cremation area was discussed. It was concluded that the Parish Council would offer assistance, but would not be able to offer the full amount, and required further quotes and more details in order to proceed. Clerk to contact PCC. Further grants to be awarded: Parish Paper £250.00, Ottery St Mary Help £30.00, Citizens Advice Bureau £ 30.00, Tale Valley Trust £30.00 and PCC £80.00 (for general upkeep of the church). All grants to be reviewed for increase next year.

Speaker for the Annual Meeting: Lorinda Perry suggested asking for Poltimore House to provide a speaker, if appropriate. If this is not possible, to approach Ottery St Mary Help Scheme to provide a speaker.

Clerk to ask Cllr Leach if Otter Breweries could provide a barrel of beer for the meeting.

Christmas Lights: Thanks were given to Cllrs Fowler and Scarle for their efforts in installing and managing the Christmas lights in the cherry tree. It was felt a Thank You letter should be sent to Mr Griffiths of Robin Cottage who supplied the electricity

Correspondence: A letter has been received from Mr Evans of Church Lane. Clerk to contact EDDC re: ownership of the lane and repairs required. Correspondence was also received from Mr Bryson of Markers Park asking if the PPC could find out if a planning condition meant families were unable to use the cul de sac to safely play in. EDDC confirmed no such conditions were included in the 3 different planning permissions given for Markers Park.

Nature Notes Observations from December

Hello everyone

Margaret and I have just returned from a visit to friends in The Lake District. The

Weather there was kind to us, and we were able to get about in the lovely countryside. We made a trip to the R.S.P.B. Reserve at Leighton Moss, Lancashire, where we saw some great birds. The best by far were a pair of Marsh Harriers, which danced about in the sky for ages. These are large birds of prey, which are at home in the lakeside reeds and fens. They were showing off for us, as if they knew we were fascinated by them. The male bird is largely chestnut, but with



blue-grey parts of its wings---a truly magnificent bird. His mate is brown, but with a lovely golden head. I doubt that we'll ever see such a display again.




In a river near Windermere, there was a bird swimming. It was sometimes on the water, and then under it. What was it? A rather pale duck, but sporting a red-brown punk hairstyle! I identified it as being a female goosander. The lady goosander is not as handsome as the man, which is a beautiful black and white. With most birds, the male is the more striking in colour, but there are a few

exceptions to the rule.

Back at home, the weather has been very wet, which tends to make birds lie low--can you blame them? Nevertheless, we've got the usual blue and great tits, chaffinches, jackdaws and of course our goldfinches to cheer us up. Roll on Spring!

**Rainfall:** The second half of December was very wet with the day before Christmas Eve resulting in flooding in Feniton after 23 mm of rain. The monthly average doesn't reflect this as it was very dry in the first 2 weeks. The wet weather continued into January with twice the normal rainfall in the first 2 weeks and showing no sign of a respite. New Years day was particularly wet with flooding returning to the area.

**Temperatures:** Both December and January have been very warm compared to the average with no cold spell in the forecast to the end of January and only a few nights with frost.

**Weather elsewhere:** The coastal areas around the south west were hit by the stormy weather battering the sea defences and causing flooding. Very warm temperatures above 40C were experienced in Melbourne for the tennis players. In contrast the temperatures in parts of North America have seen record lows due to the polar vortex with Niagra Falls freezing and boiling water turning to snow if thrown out of a bucket. Some parts of the Midwest hit -26C (-14F). Elsewhere a drought has been declared in California and dangerous levels of smog have been experienced in Beijing.

Children from 8 years will be welcome; but the play selected will depend on those who let me know they wish to be involved.




### *CLARET'S CORNER* by our postie Marty

Myself and my family went to YEOVIL to watch the Clarets defeat the glovers 2-1, it's nice to travel just 31 miles rather than nearly 300 miles to Lancashire.
