Nature Notes - Observations from December

Hello and a very happy new year

As you know, this Winter has been quite mild so far. It's the 16th December today, so anything can happen before you read these notes, but so far, so good! Late in November, I saw a butterfly in flight - a red admiral. It then landed on a bramble - lovely colours shining in the late sunshine. Then, a huge flock of birds appeared overhead - a mixed flock of fieldfares and wood pigeons - hundreds of birds. This morning, again a lovely day after early morning mist, a posse of long tailed tits were feeding on the nuts.

A week or so ago, Margaret and I visited West Sedgmoor RSPB reserve. It is famous amongst birders for the huge numbers of wildfowl and wading birds which descend on it in Winter. We were on an organised walk, which took us into a converted barn from which we enjoyed wonderful views over the flooded fields. The nearest birds were lapwings, about one hundred of them, feeding in the field. Further away were the dabbling ducks. There must have been thousands of




wigeon (from Russia), lots of shoveler, a few pintail and some mallard. Every so often, they would all rise up into the air - something had spooked them!

And there he was - a lovely marsh harrier. Beautiful bronze coloured body, with a hint of slaty blue/grey in the wings - a very wide wing span. I think he was playing with the ducks - soaring high and then diving in amongst them. We didn't see him catch one, but that's



what he does! He put on a spectacular show for us, flying from left to right for about a mile and then back again, and repeating this display time and time again. It's called showing off!



Rainfall: November was very wet with twice the average rainfall for the month. December in contrast has so far been relatively dry.

Temperatures: November was very warm being 3 degC above the average. In fact the highest max temperature of 17.8 degC on 2 November was a record. The plants are getting confused with no frosts. It has finally cooled down in December to the normal for this time of year but it looks warm in the forecast. My thermometer failed during early December so I had to use Otter Valley reports for a week.


Weather elsewhere: Early figures from the Met Office show 2014 is on course to be one of, if not the warmest, year on record both globally and for the UK. The UK's mean temperature from 1 January to 25 November is 1.6 °C above the long term (1961-1990) average, which means this year is currently the warmest in our UK series dating back to 1910. This would beat the record anomaly of 1.4 °C set in 2006, but a cold December could change the final ranking for this year. We will see.


SPRING BULB AND FLOWER SHOW
