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Dear Friends,

I came across this comment the other day by Jimmy Chapman, *“Disagreements between people are going to happen. It’s human nature to disagree with one another at times because we are different people! We are made out of the same stuff, but we are different people in spirit, attitude, thinking, etc.”*

This got me thinking; when we look at the news or read our papers there are reported so many disagreements. In fact it often appears that the media only like to report on disagreements rather than agreements; there are of course exceptions.

Disagreements are going to happen, but it is the way we deal with them that is important. People have strong views about certain issues and emotions can run high, but there are always two sides to an argument/disagreement and both views need to be aired equally and, most importantly, listened to. It is when the two parties don’t accept that others may have a view that problems occur and we can all see the consequences of this in the many areas of conflict around the world.

It is about respecting other views even when they differ so much from our own. We are always keen to teach our children about respecting others’ opinions, but do we remember to do it ourselves? Are we sometimes too ready to jump to conclusions before finding out all the details? (I know I can be guilty of this!)

I was once given a tip about going for a difficult interview, I was told not to answer the questions too quickly, but to pause for just a moment to collect my thoughts and that the answers would be so much better. It worked. Sometimes I think we need to stop and pause for just a moment before responding to an opinion different than ours, to avoid upset and discord. Sometimes we need to think about how our opinions may be received by others. This can be a difficult task, but one which I pray I can do better at. I pray that you, the media and particularly politicians too may just pause for reflection occasionally and those disagreements may not then have to escalate into the dramatic consequences we see reported on a daily basis.

It will now be performed on September 19th and 20th this year, with the bulk of the rehearsals taking place in July. 'They Dream of Home', written and directed by John Somers, features, with the permission of relatives, two real people whose names appear on the Payhembury War Memorial. It will be a promenade performance, with scenes happening in several village locations and including the Christmas Truce when rival soldiers sang carols together in an impromptu ceasefire. # Nature Notes

## Observations from January

Hello everyone

Well, we've enjoyed some lovely winter days recently, in amongst the grimmer stuff! The sunshine has encouraged a lot of birds to start singing. Led by the robins, the dunnocks, blackbirds, song thrushes, wrens and tits have all had a go! Also, the not so nice sounds have emanated from rooks, crows and jackdaws. I mustn't forget the chack-chack calls made by the hundreds of fieldfares, as they race around the village skies. Today, (19th, Monday) the sky is a lovely blue all over, with hardly a cloud in sight.



In our garden, the ivy has been cut off from around the oak trees. This has had the effect of reducing the numbers of birds in the garden. Not surprising, I suppose, because ivy is a valuable source of food for the birds in winter, Never mind, it will soon grow back. The number of goldfinches, in particular, has reduced. The small birds would hide in the ivy, before flying on to the feeders.

Mike and Ursula, who live at Hembury Fort, have had a very unusual visitor to their pond — a shag, which is the smaller cousin of the cormorant. It is, in fact, a lot smaller than the cormorant. It is greeny black, with a wedge shaped tail. In the mating season, the male sports a rakish crest on its head, very punky! This bird flew off in the direction of Dunkerswell, having presumably lost its way!



Walking up the lane this morning, we heard the drumming of the woodpecker, loud and clear. I have always believed that the woodies do this when making a hole in the tree-trunk for their nests. However, I recently read that the main reason that the male drums is to attract a mate. He's saying "Here I am — come and get me!"

## Hembury Hill Fort Update

Hembury Hill Fort entered a special conservation agreement with Natural England in November. This will allow much-needed management work to be carried out on the hill fort to conserve its important historic features.

Over the autumn and winter the trustees have been working hard, making a start on clearing scrub and bracken from the central area of the site, work which will continue as a long term project. The site, which was first occupied during the Neolithic period, is at high risk on English Heritage's Heritage at Risk Register and has been in a declining condition for some time. The trustees are in discussions with members of Natural England, English Heritage, the AONB, Devon Archaeological Society and Devon County Council, as well as specialist archaeological and environmental advisors, to consider ways to improve the condition of the site and preserve it for future generations.

It is hoped that one outcome will be a major new archaeological survey. Meantime, smaller scale works to protect the site will also take place; over recent years the site has been subject to damage from unauthorised vehicles and horse riders. Works will shortly begin to discourage unauthorised access and antisocial behaviour, whilst continuing to facilitate access for responsible walkers via the footpath, with the provision of new kissing gates and small areas of fencing.

The trustees, on behalf of the family, are undertaking a challenging and sensitive project aiming to preserve the archaeology and enhance and conserve the environment of this privately owned site, whilst continuing to welcome those visitors who use the site responsibly. It is hoped that work over the next few years will provide much more information about this important site that will enhance everyone's enjoyment at Hembury. More updates and information will be provided as the project develops. ## Volunteers needed!


Are you a passionate reader? Are you someone who understands the pleasure that reading can bring? Would you like to meet new friends? Over 1000 Royal Voluntary Service (formerly WRVS) volunteers across Devon & Cornwall provide practical support to older and disabled people, many of whom are isolated by ill health, disability or simply the lack of appropriate transport.

Our volunteers deliver library books and CDs to people who are unable to get to the local library. This vital service keeps the passion of reading alive and makes a huge difference to our clients' lives. The following is a quote from the son of one of our clients:

"My mother had a number of interests, including gardening, church architecture and playing bridge, but reading was something she continued to do when it became too difficult for her to leave home. This was greatly helped by a volunteer delivering and collecting books on behalf of the Home Library Service, going to great lengths to keep my mother in good reading and this was an important contribution to the quality of my mother's life."

Volunteers need to be willing to drive in the local area, for which we reimburse you at the rate of 45p per mile, and we will provide you with all training and local support. We also particularly need people to act as volunteer coordinators at Seaton, Budleigh Salterton and Colyton Libraries. For this role you need just the same interests and friendly, outgoing personality, plus being a good organiser with some basic computer skills.
