Dear Friends,

I write this at the beginning of Lent, a time of year recognised by many as a time for giving something up, a time to get in shape perhaps for the summer. Many people without any religious connection will perhaps use Lent as a time to start something new, take up an exercise routine or something similar.

Lent is, of course, the 40 days which lead up to Easter, reminding us of the 40 days Jesus spent in the wilderness before starting on his teaching mission, a time of reflection and deep concentrated thought. Jesus paused, thought and sought guidance from God as to how to move forward, he didn't crash headlong into his mission. We can only speculate on what he did in the wilderness as we have no record apart from his confrontation with temptation.

There are times in our lives when we may feel that we are in a wilderness, this may come after a redundancy, bereavement or just a particular phase in our lives. Whichever it is, it is when we have a feeling of desolation, or confusion, or even loneliness. We may feel that it is a time when we can see no end in sight, just the dry desert spreading ahead and during that time we too can be tempted to do something which we may regret. It is good sometimes to stop and look back at those desert times in our lives, some may have been very short, others longer, and see just how you managed to get through them. It may have been by your own determination or it may have been through the help and support of others, but you got through it.

Jesus knew he wasn't alone in the wilderness, that God was with him. We too have that knowledge, that wherever we are on life's journey, whether it is during a good season or a wilderness season, God is there for each and every one of us, loving us. That's a wonderful thought!

So as we struggle through Lent, having given up something we like or taken on something which could be quite hard for us, just remember that God is there with us bringing us through, as He is in every season of our lives.

Nature Notes

Observations from February

Hello everyone

It's a lovely morning today, so I went for a walk up the lane. Passing by Cokesputt, I stopped to look in the field on the right. There, in the field, by the hedge, was a green woodpecker. I must have disturbed it, because it flew up into the trees, showing the lovely yellow flash of its rump as it went. A splendid bird! On my way back home, about half an hour later, there it was again — probably looking for ants, its main food.

other week, at

these days is the bullfinch. However, we have had some in the village recently. Mary tells me she has seen a pair in her garden, and I saw one in our apple trees. David has

also been lucky enough to have one too. Bullfinches are not popular with fruit farmers, because they eat the new fruit buds! Mary has also seen a dipper in the village stream, bobbing up and down.

Looking into the field, at the rear of our house, the other day, there was a large mixed flock of birds, which included fieldfares, starlings and at least two redwings. I was pleased to see the redwings, because I don't see many of these small winter thrushes round here. Apparently, starlings are also getting rarer.

Rainfall: January and the first half of February have been drier than average with no significant snowfall. This is in contrast to last year when we had double the normal rainfall.

Temperatures: January was very warm compared to usual, with temperatures on 9th January breaking records at 14.8 degC. In contrast, temperatures in February so far have struggled, with night-time temperatures well below average, with several frosts. As I write this warmer air is coming in however.

Weather elsewhere: Although there was no snow at low levels in Devon, the Moors and areas further north did get some snow in early February, which stayed around. British tourists heading for the sun using the ferry to Santander were trapped in large snowdrifts on arrival in northern Spain on 7th February and had to be rescued. A fourth major snowstorm in Boston, Massachusetts, made February the snowiest month in the city's history.


The Broadhembury branch of the Women's Institute has a whole host of talks planned for this year, and they're all being held at Payhembury Parish Hall.


St Mary's Church Payhembury: Community Quilt Day

Saturday May 9th, in the Parish Hall from 9am -1:00pm

Come for a morning of fun creating a quilt, made by as many in our community, every age welcome, as we can persuade to join us. The idea is that each family, couple, individual, bring a piece of sturdy pastel coloured **cotton: A5-** the size of this magazine- your template- just add 2.5cm around as a border to allow for sewing the pieces together.

On the day there will be helpers on hand to assist. Your work can be embroidered, stitched, glued (felt) and decorated in any way you think fit. It is up to you what you choose as your subject; it could be your family, pets, hobbies – the design is your choice. So start thinking of ideas and collecting **bits and bobs to decorate your work.**

All sewing etc will be done on the day, come with your ideas, we will provide help, extra fabrics and trimmings and lots of tea and biscuits. We are, by making this quilt, hoping to raise money for our Church, so the cost of the morning will be £10.
