Dear Friends,

We have just passed Whit Sunday, did you notice? Sadly, it passes many people by. Some of you may remember that we used to have a moveable bank holiday which was usually referred to as Whit Monday, as it followed Whit Sunday, and this was the start of the school summer half term holiday. Whit Sunday, or Pentecost as it is referred to in the Bible, is 50 days after Jesus rose from the dead on Easter Day. Easter is calculated by the movement of the moon and therefore so is Pentecost or Whit Sunday. However, in 1971 it was decided to fix the date of this bank holiday for convenience and it became known as the Spring Bank Holiday and so the association with Whit Sunday and thus with Pentecost was lost and for many it is only a memory.

Why Whit Sunday you may ask? Well, it is commonly believed that as people were often baptized/christened on that day and the tradition was to wear white so the word Whit was derived from white. Why you may ask were baptisms/christening taking place on that day? The answer is the other name for that day, Pentecost. The Day of Pentecost was the birthday of the Church, when Jesus's followers were together after he had returned to heaven, waiting for something special. It came in the form of a rushing wind and tongues of flame settling on the disciples. They were filled with the Holy Spirit and were enabled to teach and travel around the world telling the stories and teachings of Jesus and so the early church was born.

Christians believe that the Holy Spirit is the presence of God with us every day and if we are open to His spirit we produce fruit, that we demonstrate by nine attributes; love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, humility and self-control.

I don't know about you but I think these are good attributes for all of us to have whether we are Christian or not. Whether we remember Whit Sunday, Pentecost or the coming of the Holy Spirit, it's certainly worth remembering the fruit of the spirit and if we worked hard at these I think the world would be a better place don't you?



Yellingham Farm Diary – May

May is a great month on the farm. The cattle are starting to lose their winter coats and beginning to look like they are wearing a mink coat. As I write, I think they wish they had a mink coat on as it is lashing with rain and freezing cold.

We sent off a few cull ewes last week, which is never a great thing, but they have to go if they are no longer able to get in lamb and/or rear lambs successfully. Tough decision sometimes but always the right one. We have just a few remaining lambs from 2014 which are now a year old and are commonly referred to as 'hogget'. There are many interpretations of the word hogget, but the dictionary defines it as a young sheep before its first shearing. I believe it is the best lamb you can eat as it is more mature, and the last remaining few will be slaughtered for meat and for sale from the farm – just delicious!

I mentioned last month that the skill now on the farm is to keep everything alive. It would be wrong of me to paint a rosy picture each month as problems do occur. It happened last week when for no apparent reason I found a dead ewe in the field. Obviously there was a reason, but it is not economic for one isolated case to have a post mortem. Thankfully her lambs are well grown and got weaned earlier than the others. What do we do with such a ewe? The Devon casualty service is excellent and come and pick the ewe up and take it away for incineration. Hey ho, life goes on.

Finishing on a positive note, the lambs are growing on well and have been wormed. The ewes have all been foot trimmed and the grass is growing like mad. Nell's puppies are divine and are now six weeks old and really into mischief – by next month I hope they are all settled into their new homes.



Nature Notes Observations from May

Hello everyone

Have you heard the cuckoo? Well, I haven't heard it for many years, but John Horrocks has not only heard one, but he's seen one! He wasn't sure what it was at first, but looked it up in a bird book, and sure enough, it was a cuckoo. A bird the size of a collared dove, but with a long tail and different markings. Cuckoos are now quite scarce in Britain, nobody seems to know the exact reason for this, so young cuckoos are being fitted with



tracking devices which follow their progress to Africa. There has been some success, but the birds seem to disappear over there.

The whitethroats have arrived in force and can be seen, and heard, up Haskins



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Lane. The male bird flies vertically up from the hedge tops, singing his scratchy song to attract a mate. I saw a male blackcap recently. The female should be called a browncap, for obvious reasons! The male has a lovely song. Walking through the park in Sidmouth the other day, we saw several pairs of grey wagtails in the river Sid, together with a dipper, which performed for us by diving under the shallow water and walking along the river bed looking for food morsels, which he found. Biddy tells me that the house martins and swifts have arrived in Colestocks. Swifts are the last birds to arrive from Africa, and the first to leave, which they will do in July.

One beautiful sunny day, I walked down the lane to the stream in the bottom, near to Brian Cooks, and there were lots of butterflies on the wing. I counted seven species, which were large and small whites, orange tips, a comma, a peacock, a speckled wood and a lovely lemon male brimstone. I have not seen so many before or since.

Rainfall: April was a dry month with only half the normal rainfall. In contrast the first half of May has been a lot wetter than normal ensuring the grass is growing well.

Temperatures: April was much warmer than average with records being broken on 15 April but early May has been around average at least for daytime temperatures. My temperatures should be more accurate with the new weather station.

Sunshine: January to April has been sunnier than average with April breaking records over the UK. I have plotted the monthly means from my solar cells on the website.

Weather elsewhere: The El Nino sea surface temperature anomaly in the Tropical Pacific is reported to be intensifying potentially causing drought in Australia and more rain in California. More than 25 tornadoes were reported recently across the central plains of America, one hitting Tulsa, Oklahoma.

Children and the British Red Cross. These charities are currently out in the field, providing aid and helping Nepalis rebuild their shattered lives.


