



Achieving the perfect balance

Spot the Dog, The Snowman, Angelina Ballerina and Mr Benn might seem to have little to do with landscape gardening in and around Payhembury. But to Martin Hazelgrave who, with his wife Lynn, runs the local gardening business Country Gardeners, these characters are an integral part of his life.

In the garden shed at his Payhembury home Martin paints and creates background landscape images for some of the best-known children’s film and TV animations. But when he’s not in his studio, he’s working as a gardener, following in the footsteps of his father, who was head gardener at a private estate in Yorkshire. “I have the best of both worlds”, he says. I’m working outdoors in the countryside most of the summer, and I’m tucked away in my studio creating art on rainy days and throughout the winter.

“Balancing gardening and being out of doors with art and creative work seems to have been the key to maintaining a simple, but beautiful way of life.”

The past five years have seen dramatic change in the animation industry - shorter contracts, sporadic workflow and more productions based abroad. There were numerous offers to work overseas, but Martin and Lynn decided, because they loved Devon so much, to stay here and to find a way to generate extra income locally which would allow them freedom to continue their creative work - painting, drawing and, for Lynn, textile work.

Thus *Country Gardeners* was born. “We have always been keen gardeners and passionate about the natural world. What set out as a few hours a week has now developed into a thriving little business with some fabulous regular gardens and many friendships forged along the way.”

In their leisure time, Martin & Lynn enjoy camping, kayaking, catching and cooking fish on the beach, and coastal and hill walking. Their two daughters, Kayleigh and Carina were brought up loving this open-air lifestyle and 20-month-old grandson Alfie has just enjoyed his first camping trip.

“Our outdoor life is good for the mind and soul and great exercise”, says Martin. “We feel very lucky to be able to balance this with our art and creative work.”



Nature Notes - *Observations from July*



In our front garden we've been treated to several visits by a mother green woodpecker, accompanied by a younger woody, presumably her son or daughter.

They busily search for ants in the short grass. This must be a good place for ants, because the green woodies come every year at this time.

I think they are possibly Britain's most exotic looking bird - very striking with their green, red and yellow plumage.

We have also got a pair of spotted flycatchers, which have been around for a month. We're lucky to have these birds, because spotted flycatchers are declining in Britain. They have to make the arduous journey from Africa every summer.

Standing on the bridge over the Tale, looking downstream, at Tuck Mill, I was slightly startled by a bird which flew under the bridge, and therefore, under me. A dark bird, not unlike a blackbird, but more like a dipper. A few moments later, it flew back. I often see these birds down there. This one must have a nest nearby.



There are now a few small trout in the Tale, and you can see them jumping to catch insects. I don't think there are as many fish as usual this year.

There are more butterflies about now, but they would like more sunshine, like we all would! I've seen meadow browns, gatekeepers, speckled woods and the whites. The main flush of peacocks and red admirals will not appear for another month or so. My buddleias will have gone to seed by then!



Rainfall: Both June and July have had below average rainfall but happily enough to prevent drought conditions so we have copious fresh fruit being harvested.

Temperatures: Slightly warmer than the long term average. The heat in the south-east (>30degC) on 1st July (see below) did not make it to Devon with only temperatures in the mid 20's experienced here.

Weather elsewhere: At Heathrow airport, 36.7 degC was measured, surpassing the previous 36.5 degC on 19 July 2006 in Wisley, Surrey. Nine weather stations across Lancashire, Nottinghamshire, Cleveland, West and North Yorkshire, Cambridgeshire and Cumbria obtained new all time records. Further afield Japan was hit by Typhoon Nangka on 16 July which dumped 600mm of rain as it passed over. Australia has been experiencing unusually cold weather with snowfall in the Blue Mountains.

Having successfully grown a first crop of broad beans in the garden at her home in Barrow Road, Jan Penly conjured up this delicious recipe to enjoy the beans at their succulent best ...

Jan's Broad Bean Risotto

What you need for two servings:

125 gms butter plus 2 tablespoons olive oil
15-20 gms porcini mushrooms (dried)
150 gms Arborio rice
1 onion, chopped
1 clove of garlic, chopped
200 gms chestnut or
closed cup mushrooms, quartered
2 portions uncooked young broad beans
(if old, the beans should be peeled first)
40 gms parmesan cheese, grated
500 ml vegetable stock (which includes the porcini liquor)
100 ml dry white wine
25 gms extra butter to add when almost cooked
Salt and pepper to taste



How to cook

- 1 Soak porcini mushrooms for 30 minutes in boiled water. Drain in a sieve and reserve liquor.
- 2 Heat butter and oil in medium/large frying pan. Add chopped onion and garlic. Fry until softened but not blackened.
- 3 Add broad beans, all the mushrooms and the rice, then stir to mix for about a minute.
- 4 Add 150 ml of the stock and half of the wine and simmer until absorbed. Continue simmering whilst adding 150 ml of the remaining stock and the remaining wine. Continue in this way until all the stock is absorbed - this should take about 20-30 minutes. The mixture should be should be creamy but NOT TOO DRY.
- 5 Stir in 3/4 of the parmesan cheese and the extra butter and add salt and pepper to taste. Serve with a topping of the remaining parmesan.

A green salad goes well with this dish.

Ed's note: Jan also passed on a tip that, if you over-winter your broad beans, they don't attract blackfly. But probably every gardener in the parish, apart from me, already knows this!

Have you seen Payhembury's Orange Elephants?

Between April and November you can see many "Orange Elephants" roaming the fields of Payhembury. In fact, they are the herd of South Devon cattle from the Slade Barton farm, so nicknamed for their wide faces, big ears and rusty coloured coats.



Traditionally, the South Devon cow is a triple purpose breed productively milking, producing butterfat and excellent beef. In the early 19th century they were also used to draw ploughshares. The breed dates back to the 11th century when they were introduced to Britain from Normandy.

"After exiting the dairy industry in 2002 Rob missed having cattle on the farm and in 2010 started the herd of South Devons with 10 heifers," explains Nicki Leach. "Our first bull 'Brafferton Hadrian' increased the herd substantially after three years on the farm. When he moved on into a new herd we bought 'Travolta Rye!'.

"We now have 50 head of cattle which includes 14 calves so far this year. We love hearing how much many of you enjoy watching them and some of you have witnessed a calving! There was much moo-ing and excitement the other morning for the arrival of the foot trimmer... quite something to watch!!

"A love of South Devons runs in the family. Babs' father and grandfather were top South Devon breeders and won many awards when showing them. It would be lovely if we could do that in the not too distant future too! We hope you continue to share our pleasure in watching these glorious animals in the fields for many years to come."

Interesting fact: The price of cattle is quoted in guineas, worth one pound and five pence, but a seller at the auction will only receive £1 pound per guinea for any bloodstock sold. The remaining 5p on every pound will be taken by the auctioneer. A gentleman's way of saying 'don't forget to add my commission!'
