Dear Friends,

Last month in my letter to you I wrote about connectedness, how we all have a need to be connected with each other. In the highly technical age in which we live we are all connected instantly with each other and can be readily connected to thousands of places around the world. Even friends and relatives who have emigrated to the other side of the world don't seem quite so far away when we can Skype or Facetime them at the touch of a button and actually see them. So I thought that I might look at this idea of being connected even more closely.

As Christians we are all called to work together and to be part of one body, the body of Jesus Christ. We will all have different skills and functions as any body has, each has to play their part but all the parts need to work together for the body to function properly. As members of that body we are required not only to work together and co-operate with one another but to join together for worship. This is not always easy when people have different views on how this worship should be done, but we are encouraged to come together in some way and often this is being united by prayer. This can be difficult at times when there are different opinions about issues but for the effective growth, health and happiness of the body, our communities, we all have to try to get along, each taking responsibility for our function and not leaving it to someone else. Some may feel they don't have a role but everyone in our communities is valued and important just as each cell in our bodies. So let's all think about how we function in our communities and make sure we are making the most of building up a healthy, happy community body. Don't leave it to someone else, thinking you don't have the time or energy or skill because if you do it could cause the downfall of your part of the community and the poor health of the whole body, the community. Let's all strive for a fit and vigorous community.

UNIQUE WW1 THEATRE PRODUCTION

After taking a short summer break, the Tale Valley Community Theatre company will resume rehearsals this month for 'They Dream of Home'. This unique performance will be staged at sites around Payhembury village on Saturday 19th and Sunday 20th September at 7.00pm. An original play, written and directed by John Somers, it captures the excitement amongst the young men of the parish as war is declared and their progression through recruitment, intense battles and the awful consequences of warfare. Two of the characters are based on real men whose relatives have given permission to include them in the story. The nephew of one still lives at the edge of the village green, close to the memorial which bears his uncle's name.

Because audience numbers are limited to 120 each night, it is expected that tickets will sell quickly. The ticket also comprises a programme which gives historical and other information about the context of the performance. It also holds the words of the songs which will be sung by audience members and the actors as they make their way to the next scene. Musical Director, Andy Hague, has brought together a 14-member silver band which will form an integral part of the performance.

Yellingham Farm Diary – August



What happened to July – it flew so quickly that the deadline for the Parish Paper flew past me as well, so July and August are being reported together!

With the hay all done and dusted the main job for July was to wean the lambs off the ewes. By this time of the year the poor ewes are being lifted off their back feet as the lambs are so big, yet still suckling. It is always a very busy and noisy task. So with some 200 sheep in the barn, the job begins. We separate the ewes out first and then spilt out the ewe lambs from the ram lambs.

It is a very busy time for my dogs as well. They love it, firstly bringing all the sheep in from the fields and then working hard to drive them through the sheep race. Once everything has been sorted into the right groups, the next task is to put the ewes in a field as far away from the lambs as possible. It is a stressful time for all – me included. The dogs find it easy to drive the ewes into the field opposite the farm. We use this field as the hay had been taken from it and so there was very little grass left. You might be thinking that my poor ewes wouldn't have much to eat, but the reason we do it is so that their milk supply dries up quickly, which in turn is beneficial for the sheep.

Driving the lambs to their respective field is trickier for the dogs. By this time the ewes are baa'ing very loudly as they realise their lambs are no longer with them. The lambs are bleating constantly and going every way other than where we want them to go. The dogs work tirelessly, trying to keep them grouped together and moving slowly in the right direction. Eventually the task is complete. Unfortunately it is a bit of a noisy night or two for our neighbours, but they all understand that it is inevitable once a year.

August is a relatively quiet month for us, as we have no arable crops to deal with. The stock all graze contently this month but as September looms, it will be time for the first crop of lambs to be sent off – an interesting time.

Nature Notes

Observations from August

Hello again

After a fairly quiet few weeks for the birds, things have livened up in our garden. Lots of young birds have appeared, including the tits - blue, great and coal of that ilk, plus chaffinches, dunnocks and sparrows. I'll have to go out and fill up the feeders again.



As well as the more common birds above, we have been lucky to see three fairly uncommon species recently. The spotted flycatchers have paid regular visits, darting about in search of their insect prey. Also, a lovely blue and buff male nuthatch has been to see us. You do know that he descends the tree trunk head first, don't you? I think the nuthatch is the only bird to achieve this feat! In addition, we're still getting regular visits from our green woodpecker. It announces its arrival by its loud cackle, which is known to country folk as a 'yaffle'.



Until the last few days, we have not seen many butterflies in the garden. So, I decided to pay a visit to Ashclyst Forest, to hopefully see a few good ones. I was not disappointed because there were fritillaries (silver washed) all over the place, plus white admirals. I'd not seen these lovely butterflies before, so it was

great. There were also peacocks, brimstones and some other species there. Not many birds, but I did see passing overhead a large raptor - was it a goshawk?

I understand, from Libby at Tuck Mill, that a very rare bird has been spotted there. Only a wryneck! This is a member of the woodpecker family (I think). The only wryneck I've ever seen was in Crete, so I must keep my eyes open next time I'm down there!

Apologies for the missing values in the tables in July's report. It was a problem in the printing. A good copy is on the website. My rain gauge is misbehaving so the values from my station may not be trustworthy. I am working to fix it.

Rainfall: In July and so far in August we have had twice the normal rainfall. On 24 July near record amounts of rain were recorded of 44mm. Luckily the dry fields absorbed much of the rain preventing flooding. The rain on 14 August was particularly heavy this time leading to some flooding.

Temperatures: July was slightly cooler than normal despite the record-breaking 1 July temperature at Heathrow. August has so far been warmer than average.

Weather elsewhere: With the heavy rain over S England on 13/14 August there was localised flooding in several areas. Scorching heat in Europe in early August with Germany, Czech Republic and Poland all breaking records. More than two million households were without power as Typhoon Soudelor, the largest tropical cyclone of the year, hit Taiwan on 9 August after 500mm of rain was dumped on Chinese coastal areas killing nine people.


