Doesn't it always happen as soon as the children go back to school, out comes the sun? Well at least it has meant that the harvest can be finished and the round of ploughing and seeding starts again.

Life is just a cycle isn't it, but it's what we do in that cycle which is important. Do we at the end of our cycle look back and feel satisfied that we have accomplished all that we could? I think that's a very hard question. At the beginning of the new academic year I have been looking at new beginnings and using the creation story as an illustration. Of course there is much debate about this and I don't intend to debate that here but just to reflect on the words that finished the first week of the story; ⁴³¹*God saw everything that he had made, and indeed, it was very good.* Genesis 1:31

We are fortunate where we live that all around us is very good. Yes we grumble about the weather and litter but overall we are very fortunate. Do we appreciate it? Are we willing to share it? Sadly there are many parts of the world where God's amazing creation and people's creations have been destroyed by human hands. People have been left without homes and livelihoods, left often without hope. We have seen reported so many hopeless situations and no doubt you like me have felt helpless, confused as to how to help. As Christians we are asked to pray for these desperate situations but we also need to act as well.

There has been much debate as to how and when we should help; what sort of help there should be and then how many people we should help. There are arguments for and against and in the meantime people continue to suffer as their part of creation is destroyed or forcibly taken from them. We should help as much as we can; we should be doing as much as we can now for those in desperate need.

But, we must also remember that whatever we do must not just be a kneejerker reaction, not a one-off action, there must be a continuing openness into the future so that we can offer hope for the whole of life's cycle. We who have much have a responsibility to share with those who have little if anything and in that way we may be able at the end of our cycle to look back and be proud of our lives and not regretful.

Chasing the perfect picture ...

When Malcolm Jarvis retired from his position with a national utility company 15 years ago, he couldn't have anticipated that in 2015 he would still be working virtually full time - as a photographer for the National Trust.

Not that Malcolm was planning a slippers-and-sofa retirement. "He just isn't the kind of man to enjoy sitting still," his wife, Joan points out.

He spends hours gardening at his Payhembury home (if you need advice on vegetable growing – Malcolm's the man to ask!) and he has been a volunteer guide at Killerton House for many years. He was also the maker of exquisite furniture, until health problems caused by wood dust forced him to stop.

A passionate amateur photographer since his teens, "I'd like to have been able to draw – but I couldn't. Taking photographs was the next best thing," he says. But it hadn't been the complete artistic experience for him - until the year he retired, when acquiring the latest digital camera allowed him to start producing high-quality prints from his own computer.

In 2008 The National Trust asked Malcolm to create a catalogue of all the plants at Killerton. "I'd never taken photographs of flowers before; there was a lot to learn," he admits. But today Malcolm takes virtually all the images at Killerton for use in posters, publicity and social media.

"I'm still chasing the perfect picture ... there's always a better one to be taken," he insists. "You must always remember that you're taking a picture of light, not an object."

Nature Notes

Observations from September

Hello everyone

I'm writing these notes on Wednesday, 9th September, as I'm off to Bulgaria on Friday, on a Naturetrek holiday!

I'll tell you all about it in the next notes. It should be good, because we'll be visiting the Black Sea coast, which is on the North/South migration route for the birds returning south, after the breeding season.

The other day, we had a jersey tiger moth on our rockery. We get one or two of these colourful moths every year. Their upper wings are chocolate brown, with white diagonal stripes. When they open their wings, the underwings are a lovely bright orange -- a nice contrast to the brown and white.



Another welcome visitor to our garden one evening was a plump hedgehog. We saw him in the car's headlights as we drove in. We don't see many hedgehogs these days, but we know they are about, because we see their calling cards!

A third interesting find was a young slow worm, which I disturbed when moving a pile of logs. Very snake-like, it was flicking its tongue out at me. The mature slow worms are silvery grey, but this infant had several markings -- it wasn't an adder, was it?

Station update: My station has been replaced so hopefully the rain gauge will be OK from now on. I tried to use readings from other nearby stations when it was misbehaving.

Rainfall: August was very wet with over twice the norm for the month but luckily no flooding. So far the rainfall has been normal for September.

Temperatures: August temperatures were cooler during the day than normal but warmer at night with the temperature on the night of 22 August breaking local records. September has been the opposite so far so no heat waves this summer. August was cooler overall over most of Southern England.

Weather elsewhere: The city of Joso in Northern Japan was hit by a wall of water after the Kinugawa River burst its banks after unprecedented rainfall from a tropical storm. Several people were reported missing after the floods. The Arctic sea ice cover dropped to 4.41 million square kilometres this summer, the 4th lowest sea ice extent since satellite measurements began in 1979.

Yellingham Farm Diary - September

I always think that this month is a month of anticipation in the farming calendar for sheep at Yellingham. At the beginning of October we put our rams in with the ewes, but before we do so, there is quite a lot to do to make sure that lambing goes as smoothly as possible.



This means making sure that all our sheep are in tip top condition. For the ewes this involves checking them all thoroughly – feet, teeth and of course udders. Any ewe that is not up to the mark is culled – no matter how hard you try, you always get unforeseen problems, so cutting out any potential problems before you start is a must.

In terms of the rams, they get the same MOT. September is always a good month for weather and we continue to get good grass growth. About 2 to 3 weeks before the rams go in, we “flush” them on the fresh grazing – in non-technical terms it helps to ensure that the ewes are in the best condition possible before mating. Not too thin and not too fat.

What we are aiming for is to get the ewes to successfully mate during their first heat cycle and so condense the time that we are lambing. Obviously this doesn't always happen and some mate during their second heat cycle and some unfortunately do not get pregnant at all. So Septembers work is very important as it does have a direct impact on the number of lambs eventually born. We want twins please, not singles or triplets!

September is also important as the first of this years lambs start to go to the abattoir. Our lamb is extremely tasty and we sell from the farm gate from now until well into the New Year. So please if you want beautiful, reasonably priced lamb, do give us a ring. No order is too small. If you live within the Village and we sell lamb to you, we will donate 10% to our fabulous, local shop.
