It's worth thinking about those marks we leave and ensure that they are positive ones which are for the common good. That's certainly a challenge!

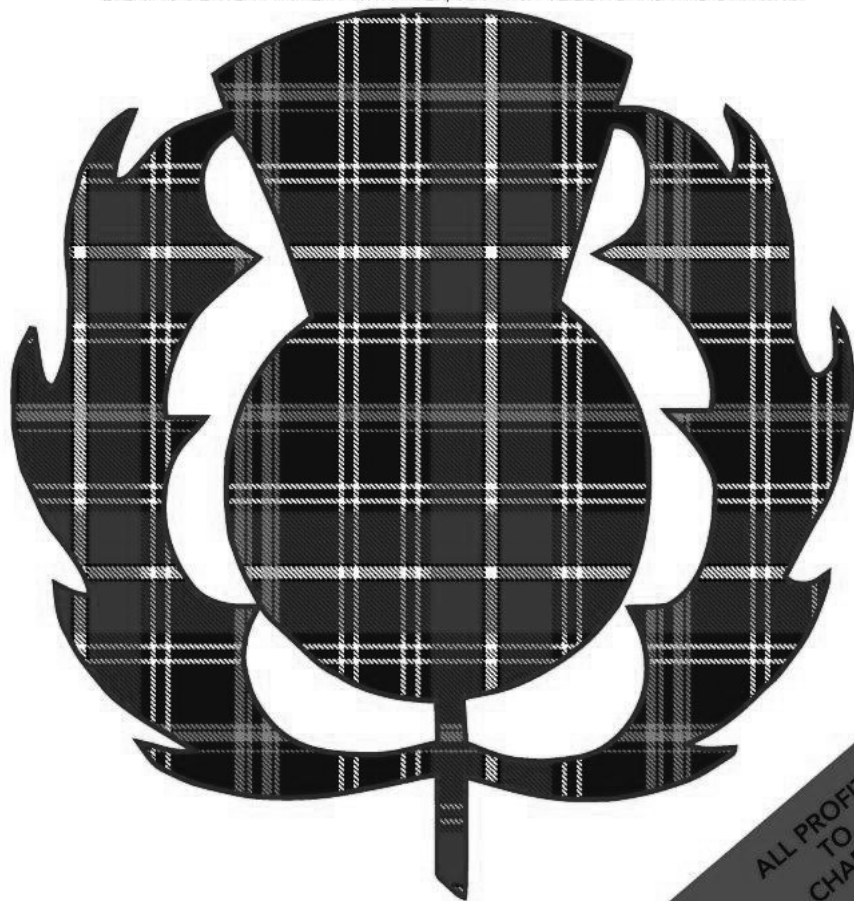

# Nature Notes

## *Observations from October*

### ***Birding in Bulgaria***

I recently spent a week in Bulgaria, looking for those birds which are rare, and which don't often come to East Devon!

Bulgaria is a small country, but it boasts many different habitats, including mountains, rivers, steppe, woodland, lakes, estuaries and the Black sea coast, which is one of the best migration routes in Spring and Autumn.



The Black Sea coastline is also a tourist area, and so is the most populated. In the mountain areas the villages are poor, as most of the young people have moved to the cities for work. We were very lucky with the weather, which was warm to hot and sunny for the whole holiday! At one point, we were very close to both Turkey and Greece, and at another, only three miles from Romania, in the north.

Our party arrived in the capital, Sofia, and soon set off to the Rhodope mountains, in the south east. We were based here for two nights, and explored the nearby rocky hills and valleys. This is a mainly Muslim area, as it is near the Turkish border. We saw lots of interesting birds here, including a wonderful view of a short toed eagle, which posed for our cameras, as he looked for his prey. Also, there were distant golden and imperial eagles, hobbies, chukars (like French partridges), black storks and many other species. We visited a vulture viewing point, from which we saw both griffon and Egyptian vultures, a blue rock thrush, alpine swifts plus a lovely male black eared wheatear.

We moved on to the Black Sea coast, which is a completely different habitat. On a pre-breakfast walk to the nearby saltpans, we were amazed by a tremendous number of water birds, including hundreds of pygmy cormorants, sandwich and common terns, four great white egrets, gulls, wild ducks and waders.

Later in the day, we came across thousands of pelicans, both the Dalmatian and white species. The white pelicans formed a great raft of five thousand or so of them, and moved as one over the water. In the afternoon, we stopped on a bridge over an estuary, which turned out to be an excellent choice, because we spotted several night herons basking in the sunshine, a few squacco herons, purple herons and whiskered terns. Also, several marsh harriers. Then, someone with a telescope spotted a huge bird in the distance---a white tailed eagle!

This country is an excellent choice for those interested in birds and nature generally. There are wolves and bears in the mountains, but we did not see any! We did, however, see all the species of eagle which come to Europe.

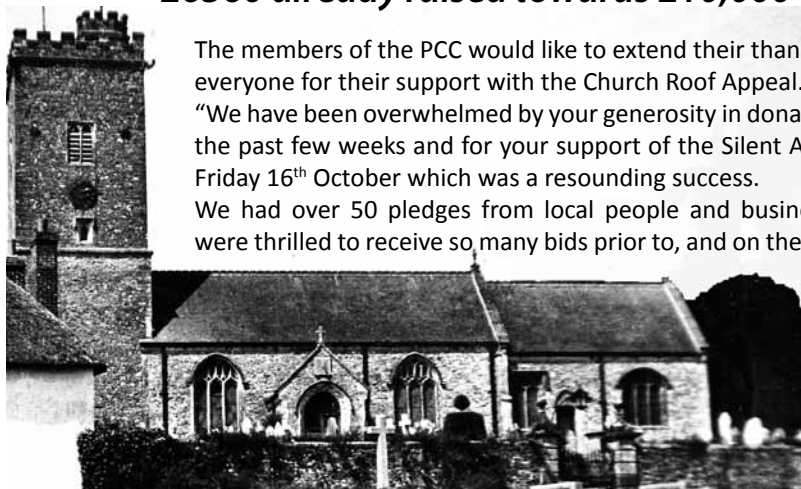

# 'They Dream of Home'

In a car-free village centre and on a battlefield-disguised school playing field, an inspired cast gave memorable performances in Tale Valley Community Theatre's challenging and emotive outdoor autumn production of "They Dream of Home", directed and written by John Somers, reflecting the lives of two young soldiers, killed during WW1, whose names are on Payhembury memorial. After reading the script, their relatives had given permission for use of the young men's names in the play.

The young actors who played the central characters - soldiers, Bertie (Caius Nicholas) and Tom (Mark Rose), and village girl Gwen (Catherine Davies) - were outstanding in their roles. The battlefield, cleverly re-creating the awfulness of trench warfare without damaging the field's surface, was an excellent representation of 'the front', with powerful sound and lighting effects adding to the authenticity of the experience.

With fine weather for the performances, audiences were able to watch the different scenes at close quarters. The finale at the memorial brought tears to many onlookers' eyes, as Gwen touched the engraved name of "her" Bertie, read a post-card message from him and ended the play singing 'If you were the Only Boy in the World'. The power of unfulfilled love brought Bertie back and they concluded the song together.

Plaudits go to Richard Pulman and Tony Treen for their creative use of palettes, camouflage netting and sandbags; to Duncan Chave for the brilliant battle sound effects and to Assistant Director, Martin Paine for operating the complicated battle sound system.

## Payhembury Weather

**Rainfall:** September was wet to begin with but the end of the month was marked by a long dry period and October has continued the dry theme. Overall the summer has been wetter than average in Devon mainly because of the very wet August.

**Temperatures:** September was below average in temperature and October started warm but has cooled to below average. Overall the summer in Devon has been slightly cooler than average.

**Sunshine:** It has been an average summer for sunshine over Devon.

**Weather elsewhere:** Ex-Hurricane Joaquin after initially heading for Washington DC threatened to spoil a weekend here in early October but in the event headed south into the Bay of Biscay as the jet stream was split to the west of the U.K. Several intense storms in the Western Mediterranean have resulted in severe flooding over the south of France. Heavy snow has already fallen in Moscow and eastern Europe in early October much earlier than usual.

## Yellingham Farm Diary - October

With all the work completed in September in terms of preparing our rams and ewes, the day dawned when we put the rams in. They had been pacing around the field and curling their lips in anticipation – they had smelt something in the air!



Containing rams at this time of year can be a problem if the fencing is not in good order – we have lost them before as they break out in search of their prize. That is not a clever thing to happen so we always keep rams as far away from the ewes as possible to avoid this happening.

We catch up the rams and apply a thick coloured paste to their chest so that we can see when and who has been tupped. It is a very simple method and gives the Shepherd information, which is very useful at lambing time. We change the colour of the paste after 2 weeks. In this way we can record which ewes are going to lamb in the first 2 weeks and which will lamb in subsequent 2 week periods. We can also see which ewes don't get marked and therefore the chances are they are barren. The other benefit is that we can feed our ewes appropriately according to their lambing date so that we are as efficient as we can be and keep feed costs controlled. That is the plan and it is fairly successful.

Already we have got some nice coloured rumps so the rams are doing their jobs. We leave the rams in for 2 heat cycles (approximately 17 days per cycle). You could leave the rams in for longer but then there is the chance of a very elongated lambing period. Anything not in lamb after 2 heat cycles doesn't get tupped. A ewe is only on heat for approximately 24 to 36 hours so the ram has his work cut out, particularly if a lot of ewes come on heat at the same time. I don't give my rams too many ewes - they normally get about 20 each. Rams in large commercial flocks will however cover many more ewes, but this system works for me.

So fingers crossed that October is a productive month for my boys and girls.

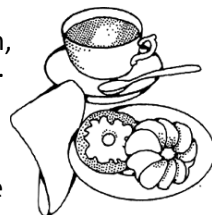
