Dear Friends,

I sit and write this at the beginning of Interfaith Week, just after the sad news of the terrorist activity in Paris. The title of this year's Interfaith Week is 'Living Well Together'. It is aimed at developing an understanding of how people of different faiths can live and work together peacefully and happily. In order for us to do this there must be some understanding of difference, and appreciation that not all people think as we might do. Their belief systems may be very different from ours, their culture may make them look at things slightly differently, but we can all appreciate the differences because that is what makes up communities. If we avoid those of different faiths or beliefs than ourselves, we are not being true to ourselves as well as others. In any community we need to share and respect difference because if we don't then there can be consequences.

It may well be relatively easy to do this in smaller communities and in our villages but we have to be ready to look outside and to value difference in the world around us. If we want to live in a peaceful community, whether local, national or international, we have to be prepared to put aside prejudice and become accepting of difference.

The consequence of terrorist activity is that we lose trust in others who are different or who may have a different faith to ourselves, but if we do that the terrorists have won. If we are to be true peacemakers, whether locally or farther afield, we have to, in the words of Jesus, 'love our neighbour as ourselves' and that means trying to get to know them and to understand them and, most importantly, to respect their point of view. You may not always agree with it but you can respect it as you respect difference. If we all tried hard to be more understanding and accepting then perhaps 'Living Together Well' will be as natural as breathing. Each of us has a responsibility to future generations to do so in the hope that peace will eventually reign here on earth. In the words of a song by Jill Jackson Miller, 'let there be peace on earth and let it begin with me'.

HOME LIBRARY SERVICE

Do you know someone who enjoys reading but can no longer get to the library? If so, the Home Library Service may be the answer. Home Library Service volunteers choose books for their clients, based on

what the clients have said they enjoy, and deliver them at a convenient time. We can bring large print books or audio CDs as well as ordinary print books.

For people who enjoy reading, the service offers access to the library and a visit from a friendly face. Often clients and volunteers become lasting friends. There is no charge for the service and no fines if books are returned late! Clients may keep books as long as needed and order particular books too.

We deliver the books to people in their homes, whether they are living independently or in residential care. The service is provided by Royal Voluntary Service (formerly WRVS) volunteers working with Devon Libraries. All volunteers are checked by the Disclosure and Barring Service (formerly CRB) before being allowed to make visits.

Yellingham Farm Diary - November

I have just re-read my October notes and I was writing about the exciting time of getting the rams ready and putting them in with the ewes. Where has the last month gone? This week we took the rams out and looking at the coloured rumps of my ewes, tupping has gone well – I hope!

Taking the rams out is a mission in itself. Well perhaps that's a bit of an exaggeration. The problem is that you cannot just throw the various rams that have been working back in a field together if they have been separated for tupping, which mine have, as I have two different flocks - my Jacobs and my Black Welsh Mountains. They can, and will, hurt each other and I have known a friend who made the mistake and a ram was killed. Doesn't bear thinking about. So to avoid such problems, I pen up my rams together after removing them from the ewes and put them into a very tight pen no bigger than a couple of metres square. They can fight as much as they like but the damage is limited as they cannot reverse very far and charge each other, which they do. Both my big large mature rams have enormous horns and when they head butt the noise is frightening. After a day or so, depending on how things are going, I make the pen a bit larger and when I am confident that they have got their anger out of their system I let them back out into the field. Normally this takes a couple of days. So that job is complete.

So with the farm and animals mainly under control, the next important job for me now is apple pressing and juice making. For the first time ever I am having a professional company in to press the juice and bottle it – another little project and an opportunity to sell my produce to my guests.

Have a look over Angus's orchard and you should see hundreds of fieldfares which have come from Northern Europe to spend the winter here in our balmier climate! Fieldfares are known as 'royal thrushes' in Spain. I



gather that the redwings are also about, but I don't see many around here.



There are lots of tits in our garden, alongside the many goldfinches. We have more coal tits amongst them this year who raid the nuts and seed and take them away to hide somewhere and so build up a stash! On cold days, we also see posses of long tailed tits passing through. It's always a pleasure to see these tiny, but very pretty little birds.

On one very murky day, I looked out of the back window, and there was a lovely bird on our lawn. It lit up the scene, showing off its beautiful colours. A green woodpecker and a very handsome bird indeed, flaunting his green, red and yellow colours. As he flew off, his yellow feathers shone beautifully.

Rainfall: October was significantly drier and so far November has been slightly drier than normal in East Devon.

Temperatures: October was an average month but so far November has been well above average in the UK, and in Payhembury, and close to record values, but cooler conditions are forecast for the second half of the month.

Weather elsewhere: Record warm October temperatures in South Africa of 48.4 deg C set the pattern for the warmest year since records began. Flash floods in the south of France caused flooding in Nice. The first named storm of the winter, Abigail, led to flooding in Cumbria on 15 November.

A Moment of Remembrance in Tale

In the early evening of Sunday 8th November, over forty of the residents of Tale gathered at the Higher Tale Memorial for a moment of remembrance for the two young men from our community who did not return from France in 1918. After hearing the stories of these men from Sue Barber, an extract from John Somers' play *They Dream of Home* and a two minutes' silence, the last post rang out over Tale as a tribute to not only these men, but all that have fallen in armed conflict. A collection afterwards also raised a significant part of the cost of necessary restoration of the memorial to ensure that it is still legible for another 100 years.

BBC Radio visits Tale Valley

BBC Radio 4 programme *Open Country* is to broadcast an episode focusing on aspects of the Tale Valley. In addition to items on Hembury Fort and the Tale Valley Trust, there



are interviews with people associated with the Tale Valley Community Theatre (TVCT) and the eyewitnesses who contributed to the research on the 1941 crash of a Junkers 88 German bomber in the Valley. This incident was the focus of Foresight, a 2007 play by Rose Watts, performed by TVCT in a marguee at Tuckmill. The play sold out and the audience exited the marguee near the play's end to hear Derek Johns tell how his father discovered in one of Tuckmill's fields the body of a crewman from the German plane. As he spoke in the dusk, an aeroplane bearing the Luftwaffe insignia flew over the Valley and the crash was simulated by sound and lighting effects. The programme also takes in this September's production of *They Dream of Home*, a promenade play written and directed by John Somers to commemorate the Payhembury men who fought and died in WW1. The programme will include material spoken by Caius Nicholas, the actor who played the lead role of Bertie Willis. Bertie's niece lives in Australia and the nephew of Thomas Dimond, who also featured in the play, lives yards for the memorial bearing his uncle's name. 
