

Dear Friends,

How is Lent going? What have you given up or taken on? Are you finding it easy or hard? Perhaps you haven't bothered this year or never bother. I have to say as a religious tradition it is certainly not as popular as it was. In some traditions people still do fast, they may give up meat or dairy products, they may eat a particular type of food on a particular day, they may restrict the times they eat, etc. but for many Lent may pass unnoticed.

I think that is a shame, just as we have seasons of the year, we have seasons in the church, times when we may concentrate on something more intently. Having seasons in our weather breaks up the year and at this time of year gives us something to look forward to. I have spoken to people in other countries who have very few seasons or just rainy or dry seasons and they envy our variety. So in the church year it is helpful to have seasons to give us a variety of ways of doing things and encourage us to think more deeply.

Lent for many is a time for deeper prayer and study, a time for reflection, reminding us how Jesus spent 40 days in the wilderness reflecting, thinking deeply before he started his ministry. Does giving something up help us to do that? What do we do with the time we may gain?

I have to say I prefer in Lent to take on something extra or to change a habit. It takes effort, it's often not easy and I occasionally find that what I try to do in Lent carries over after Lent has finished and that a bad habit has been lost. We have encouraged the children to look at 40 Acts of Kindness, one for each day of Lent. It can be a challenge but it has long-lasting effects, we hope these acts of kindness will continue.

So as we move through this season of Lent we look ahead to the next season, that of Easter, reminding us of new life and the light of the risen Jesus Christ. But we shouldn't want to rush towards it but take each day as it comes, think about what we have and what we do for others, as we should enjoy each day of our four seasons. Lent may feel a time of darkness just as winter does but at the end of both is light, the wonderful light of spring but most importantly the wonderful light of the risen Christ bringing God's love to each and everyone not just for a season but for all eternity.

Yellingham Farm Diary – February



The first day of lambing is just around the corner and preparations are nearly finished. The last job is to build the individual small lambing pens. These are the pens that the ewe goes into once they have lambed. This gives the ewe a chance to mother up with her lambs and it also gives us the opportunity to make sure the lambs are

would be very grateful. Babs

sucking well and that the ewe is eating, etc. Building the pens sounds like it is a simple task. Relatively speaking it is, but problems can occur if they are not built properly. We are now talking about tight security and I don't mean we are protecting against sheep rustlers!

The pen needs to be totally secure so that the little new born lambs can't escape. A ewe is normally very protective once she has cleaned up her lambs and they are sucking. However, a very new born lamb who hasn't quite got the hang of things can escape through any tiny gap. That's when the trouble can occur. If a ewe has not had the opportunity to bond well with a lamb, there is a chance when the escapee is returned to her she can reject it. If that happens it is a nightmare. The ewe can sometimes, but not always, get very aggressive and believe me, she will thrash the living daylights out of it. Not nice. If all else fails, the lamb has to be taken away and either fostered or put on the jolly bottle (please no!) So, as they say, prevention is better than cure and it will be belt and braces as the pen building takes place.

Here's to a successful lambing and no rejects!

Nature Notes Observations from February

Hello again

I'm writing these notes on February 9th (my birthday as it happens!) because we will be away for a while.

On a recent good day, weather-wise, Margaret and I decided to go down to Budleigh Salterton for a walk along the Otter Estuary. It's a good place to see



birds, particularly at this time of the year. A lot of winter visitors arrive there from colder climes. In the fields adjoining the river there were lots of wild duck, including teal, wigeon, shelduck and, of

course, mallards. Also, a heron, two egrets and a pair

of mute swans. One year we were lucky enough to have a very good sighting of a water rail there. These birds are smaller than moorhens and normally they are notoriously difficult to see because they skulk around in the reeds. We also saw three deer grazing at the field edge which I think were fallow deer.

Tony Lister tells me that he had two goldcrests in his garden. They are Britain's smallest bird and I have never seen one here in Payhembury! On a walk down to Tuck Mill, I saw my sparrowhawk at Willands Ash, plus two mistle thrushes in the field near Blue Anchor.

I recently put some fat balls out for the birds and they have attracted lots of long tailed tits which come every day.

Rainfall: Both January and February have been wet with twice the average rain fall for January. Saturday 6th February was particularly wet with 34mm of rain falling resulting in some local flooding. I now have another rain gauge so hopefully the values will be more accurate from now on. Treat the real time rain values on my station web site with caution.

Temperatures: Both January and February had well above average temperatures although the middle of February cooled down to more like typical winter values. Maximum temperatures have exceeded the 1960-90 climate values.

Weather elsewhere: The ninth storm of the winter *Imogen* on February 8th gave Devon very strong winds which downed trees and fences. Further afield heavy snow in northern Spain brought chaos in mid-February whereas in Crete it was 28°C. Earlier over the north-eastern US storm *Jonas* produced 76cm of snow in New York City on 24th January close to an all time record.

HANDS-ON HORTICULTURE

Hands-On Horticulture for Health and Wellbeing is a start-up Social and Therapeutic Horticulture project now recruiting volunteers to get the ball rolling on its land between Feniton and Talaton. Our volunteers will prepare the site to make it accessible to vulnerable or frail users, particularly those with restricted mobility, including wheelchair users. This will involve laying paths, refurbishing outbuildings, and landscaping. As funds allow, we will create special areas for those with sensory loss and those with dementia. Half the

site will be devoted to growing vegetables and fruit as encouraging healthy eating is part of our promotion of wellbeing.

We hope volunteers will enjoy helping others, seeing the project come to life, and the social side of being part of a team. Anyone willing to engage in outdoor gardening and landscaping will be very welcome, as well as those interested in land-based or environmental art. Basic DIY skills would be an advantage!

Hands-On Horticulture is on the County Council's preferred supplier list, allowing social services and other agencies to refer service users for days that mix gardening and creative activities. It is part of a non-profit Community Interest Company which runs the Honiton Youth Drama programme and works with local Memory Cafes leading creative storytelling for those with dementia.


Ottery St Mary Tennis Club
