Dear Friends,

It seems a long time since I wrote my last letter; in fact it was at the beginning of April as I was going away on a mission to Melanesia, going on the long trip to the Solomon Islands. You may wonder why, holiday perhaps? No, certainly not. As many of you know Feniton has a close link with Melanesia in the South Pacific. John Coleridge Patteson, who was brought up at Feniton Court, became the first Bishop of Melanesia and took Christianity to the Solomon Islands. I have for many years been interested in this link and when the opportunity came to represent Exeter Diocese at the enthronement of their new Archbishop, the Right Reverend George Tekali, I was excited to make the trip.

It is a long way, first having to travel to Brisbane and then onto the Solomon Islands. Our return trip was 44 hours door to door! It was certainly worth it, however what really struck me was the welcome. After our long trip over there we were met with a continual stream of open and encouraging welcome from a wide variety of people, the like of which I have never received before. Their genuine excitement and joy at greeting us with garlands, handshakes and song was overwhelming. Their unique outpouring of cheer and joy was something to behold. So different from our formal greetings and handshakes, with the occasional smile!

More than that however, was their generosity and hospitality. The islands are poor and not very well developed, there a few natural resources and so much of their daily needs are imported, but wherever we went we were given the most amazing hospitality. People would give you their last crumb and go without themselves. From their basic existence they would provide us with such a welcome of food and entertainment that it was truly humbling. Nothing was too much trouble and nothing was expected in return.

I have returned with much to think about. Our comfortable existence in rural Devon is a joy but do we express it? We have so much in comparison but do we openly share it? Are we as openly hospitable to the stranger in our midst or welcoming to those in need of refreshment of all kinds? Those of us of faith, do we share it joyfully and truly live our faith? All difficult questions and ones which I am pondering on because of my experience but ones which I am sure we could all spend a few moments reflecting on.

PAYHEMBURY PROVISIONS NEWS

It's summertime and the shopping is easy! We have stocked up on all sorts of summery goods from beach balls, fishing nets and crab lines for a family day at the seaside to everything you need for a barbeque in the garden. We have fresh meats, salads and bread as well as frozen desserts, lollies and ice creams including the locally made Otter Valley ice cream. After a hard day at work what better way to unwind than picking up a chilled bottle of rosé from the shop and enjoying it in the garden in the evening sunshine. And don't forget we have croissants and pastries for leisurely weekend breakfasts too.

Finally a quick word about our customer accounts, these have proved a very popular way to help make your life simpler. For just £5 you will be able to buy a share in the shop and open your own account. The credit limit will normally be about £100 to start with but may be increased later if you wish. Any purchase you make in the shop can be added to your account and, with your agreement, your immediate family, including your children, can also use the account. Every time you put anything on your account you will be given a receipt which clearly shows what has been added and the amount of credit left. All we ask in return is that you settle your account at the end of each month. Not only is it an easy way to keep track of what you are spending on everyday items but it is also very handy when you're out and about with no cash and you remember that pint of milk or loaf of bread or impulsive chocolate bar you meant to buy! Try doing that at the big supermarkets!

Yellingham Farm Diary - May

Lambing seems light years away and the lambs are growing on strongly and look wonderful. After a few weeks of calm, the sheep now become fairly labour intensive. Sheep do love to die for no reason whatsoever, so we do everything we can to avoid it

happening. Today we have vaccinated all the lambs with their first dose of 'Heptavac-P Plus' which is a vaccine against clostridial diseases and pasteurellosis. I liken it to vaccinating our children when they are young. The sheep get a second dose 4-6 weeks later. Poor things being jabbed!

The other thing we are now planning for is shearling the ewes. More on that next month. But the danger for the ewes and lambs now is every shepherds' nightmare - fly strike. Hot damp weather and the bluebottles love a damp fleece and will lay their eggs by the hundreds, which of course then develop into maggots which are potentially so dangerous to sheep. Good shepherding, clean sheep and a spot of good luck and we pray for the best.

The bullocks are now looking stunning and for those of you who walk past the farm, have a look - their coats look like they are wearing a mink coat!

Nature Notes Observations from May

Hi there

Spring has well and truly arrived, hasn't it? The swallows are about, particularly around the piggery at Spence Cross! We went for a walk through the woods at Escot and heard the blackcap singing, plus chiffchaffs and willow warblers. We were disappointed that the bluebells were not yet in flower on the 30th of April.

I walked up the lane as far as Cook's Farm the other day. It was lovely and sunny which brought some butterflies out. Two peacocks, small whites, a red admiral and several orange tips. The lanes are a picture at the moment with lots of wild flowers in bloom, such as bluebells, campion, stitchwort, buttercups and dandelions.





Guess which bird Roy has had in his garden - a cuckoo! I've not heard one in the UK for many years, never mind seen one. I've heard them abroad but that's as near as I've got! Biddy tells me she sees nuthatches in her garden and they produced young last year. Kirsty Cann and Ray Granger

have both seen siskins in their gardens. These are small green finches, very dainty and pretty.

Yesterday, there was a slow worm in the middle of our lawn. It was about a foot long and very alive! What was it doing there, right out in the open? It must have been caught by a cat, or a bird, who dropped it on seeing me approaching. I saved its life by placing it in the long grass behind our compost bins!

At the Parish Council community coffee morning we recruited two young reporters to find out more about some of the organisations taking part.

Thank you Thomas and Ellie! This is what they discovered:

- The bell ringers are looking for new members and you can go and try it out at any age from 13 up. You don't have to be massively strong although the heaviest bell weighs as much as a small car. There are six bells and the oldest was made in 1430.
- The Tale Valley Trust has been going for 14 years and has helped to save water voles from being eaten by mink and has cleaned up the River Tale which was very polluted. They have helped lots of people too.
- The Community Theatre was started in 2000 to celebrate the new millennium and they have done about 15 plays. John Somers' favourite was the first play.
- The church started to be built in the 12th century and was rebuilt in the 19th century. It costs £25,000 a year to keep it going. Families and older people go to church.
- Payhembury Provisions was started nearly 5 years ago. There are nearly 40 volunteers and the Post Office is open there on Mondays. They sell a lot of Tango!

Rainfall: April and the first half of May have had less than the normal rainfall although very heavy downpours experienced and local flooding in Feniton on the evening of 11th May.

Temperatures: Daytime temperatures were above average in both months but the April night-time temperatures were cooler than normal and some Spring frosts were experienced. We did experience a warmer spell at the beginning of May.

Weather elsewhere: April was the seventh month in a row that broke global temperature records and this was one of the factors leading to the Canadian Wildfires with prime tinder for fires to start. As a result 80,000 people were evacuated from the town of Fort McMurray in Alberta



Supporting Sally

An Interactive Theatre Programme on the onset of dementia

Sally is 66 and has had a successful career in a marketing company 'POSTBITS'. She was persuaded by the company's owner to continue working part-time, post-official retirement age as he did not want to lose her knowledge and skills. She obliges but finds she is missing copy deadlines and just not coping with the challenges of the job. This upsets her as previously she has been a model of professionalism and efficiency. A change of management brings things to a head. Sally knows she is not coping but does not want the shame of withdrawing from the job under a cloud.

As we live longer issues concerning memory loss are becoming more common. This Interactive Theatre Programme shows Sally's story and depicts how her waning memory affects her relationships with her husband, granddaughter and her life in general. An embarrassing incident out shopping is the tipping point. Instead of the storyline resolving the problem, audience members are invited to question the people in the story before suggesting a positive way forward for Sally. This is then carried out and afterwards all discuss the usefulness of the advice the audience gave.

Written and directed by John Somers (http://www.tvctheatre.org/personnel/), this Interactive Theatre Programme was performed successfully in three venues last year. It will happen at Payhembury Parish Hall at 7.30pm on **Saturday 18th June**.
