Dear Friends,

By the time you are reading this the EU referendum will be over. I write this on the 19th of June in order to get the letter in time for publication. There will of course be those who are happy about the result and others who are saddened. I do hope, however, that the animosity and vitriol which preceded the election will now have stopped, but I wait to see.

What I must say saddened me in the time leading up to the election was the sheer aggressive nature of the campaign from both sides. Is this an indication of how our society is moving, that we just accept that even political debate will be aggressive? We see so much aggressive behaviour on our screens, from games to TV drama, from daily news to historical serials that we are immune to a certain level of aggression and violence or even see it as the norm. It would appear that it is a taken that if you don't agree with someone's ideas or beliefs agreement to differ is met with challenge. Where, I may ask, is the concept of tolerance and acceptance of difference?

I am sure none of us would want to live in an homogenous society where everyone thought the same and believed the same; debate is good. Sadly, however, if debate descends into argument and argument is transferred into aggression, then there are so many consequences.

I often get a statement put to me, sometimes quite aggressively, that religion is the cause of all wars. I refute this by responding that it is not the religion itself but those who have certain strongly held beliefs who are unable to see that there might be others who have different ones and that there must always be a winner – one must be proven to be better than another. Beliefs can be shared amicably in sensible and controlled debate and we can learn from each other. The problem arises when there is a lack of tolerance and prejudice slips in.

Whatever the outcome of the EU referendum, I hope and pray that each side will accept the result and show tolerance to the other. That we can all settle down to work together for the good of all both near and far. Some will be disappointed, some elated but let us all respect each other, tolerate each other and work towards a less aggressive society where we can all rejoice in the joy of life and God's creation.



Tiramisu Recipe (serves 6 - 8)

At the Italian evening, we had some requests for this recipe. So here you are!

Christine

Ingredients

200g (8 oz) sponge fingers

300ml (10 fl.oz) strong black coffee

8 x 15ml (8 tbsp) Tia Maria (or rum, or brandy)

400g Carton of Tesco Fresh Custard

250g (10 oz) Tesco Mascarpone Cheese (not 'light')

142ml (5 fl.oz) whipping cream

2 x 15ml (2 tbsp) cocoa powder

Method

Pour strong black coffee and Tia Maria into a glass jug and stir. Arrange half the sponge fingers in the bottom of a deep glass dish and pour over half the coffee and Tia Maria mixture so the sponge is well soaked. Allow to stand for 10 minutes.

In a separate bowl, add the fresh custard to the mascarpone and beat together until smooth. Spread half over the sponge fingers.

Dip the remaining sponge fingers into the coffee and Tia Maria mixture and layer on top, followed by the rest of the custard mixture. Chill for 2 - 3 hours.

Lightly whip the cream and spread over the top. Dust with cocoa powder. Chill for 1 hour.

Serve!

Nature Notes Observations from June

Hello again

Not very summery, is it? Very wet and miserable!

The wet weather has badly affected the butterflies that we should be seeing in big numbers in the middle of June. However, there are some about the other day, I saw two painted ladies, two orange tips, and two speckled woods up the lane. We visited Ashclyst Forest, and saw a few small pearl bordered fritillaries and a couple of broad bodied chaser dragonflies. There were plenty of wild orchids in bloom there, and we heard the lovely song of the willow warbler.





This is the month for the new young birds to be seen. Our feeders are full of them — blue and great tits, goldfinches and sparrows. I counted five young blue tits at one feeder. We also have young blackbirds and dunnocks. It's great to see them pestering their parents for food.

The other morning, I decided to add kitchen waste to the compost container. On peeling off the cover, what did I see, but a slow worm PLUS a grass snake basking in the warmth of the compost. The snake

quickly shot away (I checked my trouser leg!), but the slow worm stayed put, so I picked it up and placed it in the hedge. It's amazing how strong these little creatures are — I had to hold it firmly, but carefully.

Yellingham Farm Diary – June

I rang the shearer and asked him to give me a date when he could come and shear. As usual, I got a swift reply and an even swifter date. "How about tomorrow afternoon?" There is no way you can say no as you never know when you might see them again and given the forecast looked good as well, I said yes immediately and then worried about cancelling my planned activities for the next day.

We got the sheep in early, as there was a dampness in the air and you can't shear wet sheep. It was a noisy affair as the ewes have still got their lambs at foot.

Two shearers arrived later than planned, as the job before had taken longer than expected, apparently the farmer couldn't count and there were more sheep to shear than anticipated. In no time at all, they were set up. So it wasn't long before they were shearing faster than we



could role the wool and in about an hour the job was done and dusted. Lambs bleated so loud as they tried to recognise their mums without their winter coat. The four mature rams we pen up tightly for a while, as they take an instant dislike to each other once shorn and with large horns they can easily hurt each other as they sort themselves out and decide that they do actually know each other.

With the wool placed into the wool sheets and the shearers packing up, it was time for a long cold drink. Thanks to Charlotte and Libby for helping. It's always so much more fun when there is a group of you – the hot work and the smell soon become irrelevant as you all have a good laugh. I was also very pleased that we had no signs of flystrike.




