Dear Friends,

Imagine my delight when shopping recently I came across two different sorts of nativity scenes for sale in a well-known kitchen store. For the past few years I've been deliberately looking in shops for nativity scenes but to no avail. What is that all about? Are we too embarrassed about the real meaning of Christmas, have we forgotten what it was all about? Are we being too politically correct? Or what?

I have to say that I have become more and more frustrated that the most important religious festival, the coming of God into the world in human form, has been overlooked. It would appear we celebrate Christmas just with reindeer and lots of unrelated animals, Father Christmas and if we're lucky the odd angel or cherub. I'm not saying all these glittery things shouldn't be included but it's sad that the representation of God's wonderful gift to us is either overlooked or ignored.

Without the event of the nativity we would not be celebrating. We may perhaps have a winter festival, but the whole concept of Christmas, with its sharing of God's love and celebrating the greatest gift of all, would not take place. In fact without the arrival of the Christ child, Jesus, life for us would be very different. I can hear people say well perhaps that would be better, hasn't religion caused more conflict in the world than anything else. My reply is always it's not Christ who caused the problem, religion is often blamed for many acts of violence, but we have to remember that Jesus Christ taught about peace, he brought God's love directly to us and wanted us to share it. Sadly humankind, in the exercising of faith and belief, has in some instances been clumsy and dictatorial and has not appreciated differences. It is not the religion, the belief and faith that is at fault, but humans wanting power and often using the practice of religion to achieve this. We can see examples of this in the Middle East so clearly.

You could accuse me of being hypocritical, decrying the fact that a religious scene has appeared to have been phased out, that it is an affront to people of other faiths and none. I'm not advocating that only nativity scenes should be available but the lack of availability of nativity scenes makes me sad. We should also at this time of year be celebrating the most amazing thing that happened 2,000 years ago which is the basis of the culture of many in this country. The cliché 'Jesus is the reason for the season' rings true for many of us and we should be proud to say so. The nativity scene represents the coming of God's love into the world, so let's celebrate that and be confident to display our nativity scenes.






Constance Hiller 1930—2016

Constance was for several years the editor of this Parish Paper. She took on the job with her usual enthusiasm when in her sixties. Undaunted by the complexities of her new Publisher software she produced an interesting and well put together paper every month. She was a great supporter of village life in so many ways, a regular church-goer, a kind neighbour, a loyal customer of the village shop and also a volunteer there when in her eighties.

She was a hugely talented artist with solo exhibitions to her credit, whose works were displayed in The Six Bells Inn and can be seen on the cards she produced for the shop, and also she was a highly valued and respected member of the village art group. Her life was packed with her many interests from archery, amateur dramatics and sailing to tennis, dress-making and fly-fishing. She loved her garden too but above all she was interested in people.

She had a variety of jobs before she married, as a nanny in Egypt, a maker of wedding dresses and a PA in the glass and china department of Harrods. She met George when, as a handsome young land agent, he helped her over a muddy stile; that was the beginning of a devoted 59 year partnership. They lived near Llandudno for many years and brought up their three children there before moving to Colestocks in the 1980s.

Any difficulties that she faced in later years were met with stoicism, maybe some annoyance but with no self-pity at all. She was hugely proud of all her family. Constance was a quintessential English lady, there are many of us who will miss seeing her driving through the village in her determined way in her Morris Traveller and we feel honoured to have known her.

Nature Notes Observations from November

Hello again

The winter thrushes have arrived, all the way from Scandinavia! They are really called fieldfares and are lovely big thrushes that are very strong flyers. They spend the winter here, in our warmer climes, feeding on the fruits of the hedges, trees and the orchards!

Margaret and I visited North Wales recently, and we went up the Conwy Valley, in Snowdonia. It was a beautiful day, and the colours were magnificent - green hills, blue skies, silver lakes and lots of bright red berries on the rowan trees. Hundreds of fieldfares and redwings up there. We were treated to the super sight of a red kite, which was being mobbed by a couple of crows.

Toni Lister was telling me she's got goldcrests in her garden. These lovely little finches are uncommon round here. They like conifer trees. Her husband, Paul, is a butterfly and moth enthusiast. He has seen over 450 species of moth in their garden, including the rare Clifden nonpareil!

Some years ago, I visited Aylesbeare Common, an RSPB Reserve near here. I saw a rare bird, one I haven't seen since, a male hen harrier. Recently, Mary and Jim Whiting went there, and you'd never believe it, they also saw a male hen harrier. The males and females of this species are very different. The male is a beautiful pale grey, almost white, whereas the female is a dowdy brown! These rare birds of prey pass through Britain on their way south at this time of year.


