We have joints, steaks, mince and casserole beef for sale on a first come first served basis so hurry down to the shop, when it's gone, it's gone!

Payhembury Broadband Update

The installation of the cabinet in the centre of the village by BTOpenreach has given access to much faster broadband speeds for many in the village. If, after signing up, you are not benefiting from faster speeds then you should contact Emma Howarth at BTOpenreach (Tel: 01275-342179, Mob: 07795-981983) who has agreed to resolve any issues.

However the location of the cabinet means that 34 properties in the north western part of the village (including Barrow Road and Warren Close) cannot be connected to fibre and there are no plans to connect these properties in the foreseeable future. This limited broadband coverage for the village was not advertised until the work had been completed on the cabinet. Residents affected are being consulted on possible solutions, and their likely cost, and asked to lobby our local MP Neil Parish (email: neil.parish.mp@parliament.uk). The Parish Council have contacted *Connecting* Devon and Somerset to try to rectify the situation and Neil Parish is monitoring their response. **Roger Saunders**

About Community Theatre 4All

Community Theatre 4All is a theatre company that is 'open to all, without audition'. Membership is drawn from the villages of Talaton and Whimple and the surrounding areas. Membership is not based upon any specific geographical area. The group aims to provide an opportunity for all participants to develop a wide range of theatrical skills in the areas of performance, costume creation, make-up, technical theatre, direction and production. The company, lead by Tom Samson, a retired Drama Teacher, was formed by him and Julia Green (leader of 'Orchard Harmony') in September 2015. The company was created with the specific aim of staging the musical 'Godspell' as its first production. Four sell-out performances were given in St Mary's Church Whimple during Eastertide 2016.

Following 'Godspell' the second project undertaken by the group was the performance of an original piece of theatre entitled 'In Remembrance of a Lost Generation'. This play, which was performed in both Talaton and Whimple during November 2016, drew together the stories of the men from both villages, along with those from the Escot Estate, who fought during 'The Great War'. These local stories were linked to the wider national and international picture using projected archive photographic material, eyewitness reports and songs from the period. The Musical Director for this production was Emma Palmer, leader of the 'Tale Valley Choir'. Again the group's work drew high critical acclaim.

Planning for future projects is now well developed and will be first publicised in the programme for 'Midsummer Night's Dream'. We would encourage all those who are interested in possibly joining the group to attend, without any commitment, our next 'project launch workshop', the date and content of which will also be given in the Midsummer Night's Dream' programme and on the company's Facebook page, "Community Theatre 4ll".

I now have a new better weather station on which to base the observations reported below so although the July temperature readings are still suspect from 1st August they should be trustworthy. The real time temperature data on the web is still affected though. I am hoping to fix this soon.

Rainfall: The rainfall has been well above average in July and so far in August as the jet stream has stayed over us bringing in low pressure systems over the country. Some of the rain has been very heavy in short bursts causing local flooding.

Temperatures: No temperatures recorded for July though nothing exceptional occurred. For August the first 2 weeks have been cooler than normal resulting in a disappointing end to the summer.

Weather elsewhere: In contrast to the U.K. it has been very hot in Mediterranean countries and also further north (e.g. Poland) over the last few weeks with temperatures in the 40's due to the heatwave dubbed "Lucifer". Many people were admitted to hospitals after suffering from sunstroke and other heat-related problems. Landslides in Sierra Leone have also been causing many deaths due to heavy rain.



Yellingham Farm In August .

Interestingly, the month of August is very quiet for us in farming terms, but around us the big farms are working flat out. When we moved here some 20 years ago, we made all our own hay, with the help of our neighbours to bale it, but bought in our straw. Today, it is more economic for us as we are so small, just 46 acres, to contract out or buy in hay and straw. It is such a lovely landscape here at Yellingham as we overlook 3 farms, some big, some small, but the good news is, the land is still being farmed. The weather is so up and down at the moment that my heart goes out to all who work the land. Making that decision to cut hay, silage, corn etc.is always in the hands of the Gods. We have all cut hay and it just needs one more day of sun and the heavens opens. Makes you want to cry. The longer the crop stays cut in the field, the more expensive it gets to harvest. But back to Yellingham. For us, it is a pleasure to watch our lambs growing on strongly. The constant sun and rain means the grass is in abundance. We have a good trade selling the last of our Hogget meat locally and to B and B guests. I must admit that my preference is for lamb to be mature, Hogget is my favourite. There are many definitions of what Hogget actually is, depending on who you speak to, but for me I simply like lamb which is approaching a year old – good, size, excellent flavour. I do smile when I read that "grass-fed" lamb and beef is fetching a premium price - I can also understand it. Grass fed for me is natural, and what we practice at Yellingham, but it takes time. In today's market, finishing livestock for many farmers is make or break financially, the quicker it is done helps the cash flow and 100% grass fed animals may not be an option. With September approaching, the first of this year's crop of lambs will be finishing ready for slaughter. However before selecting lambs for slaughter, we carefully select replacement ewe lambs to put into the flock for breeding. We don't buy in any female breeding stock, we just rear our own. We do however, every couple of years, replace our rams to introduce a new bloodline as a means of continually trying to improve the flock. This year we are looking to buy in replacement Black Welsh Mountain rams. August and September is a very busy time for the sheep industry as Breed Societies hold their Annual Show and Sales. A time when top breeders display the best of the breed. Let's hope we can find and buy a couple of good stock rams. Janet East

"Shakespeare's Will" A historical play by Canadian writer Vern Thiessen, touching on the little known life of William Shakespeare's wife, Anne Hathaway. Performed by Sally Hyde Lomax, the play starts immediately after Will's funeral. Anne has been handed Shakespeare's last will and testament by one of her least favourite people, his sister Joan. She initially ignores the will itself and instead spends an hour reminiscing about her life with, or as it turns out, largely without, Will. After an hour, she finally reads the will and finds some unexpected surprises.
