HAPPY NEW YEAR

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The beginning of a new year is an ideal time to stop, look up, and get our bearings. To pause and think of those things that have passed....To look around at the present, the here! The right now....And to re-set the compass of our hearts, for what is to come...

Rather than a New Year's resolution, I much prefer to think about a new year recipe for 2018. Perhaps you can imagine Nigella Lawson or Jamie Oliver, in their kitchens, talking us through these next steps for a new start to a new year.

Recipe for a Happy New Year. . . .Take twelve fine, full-grown months; see that these are thoroughly free from old memories of bitterness, cleanse them completely from every clinging pain; pick off all specks of pettiness and littleness; in short, see that these months are freed from all the past— have them fresh and clean as when they first came from the great storehouse of time. Cut these months into thirty or thirty-one equal parts. Do not attempt to make up the whole batch at one time (so many people spoil the entire lot this way), prepare one day at a time. Into each day put equal parts of faith, patience, courage, work, hope, kindness and rest (leaving rest out is like leaving the oil out of the salad dressing— don't do it). Pray daily. Put in about one teaspoonful of good spirits, a dash of fun, a pinch of folly, a sprinkling of play, and a heaping cupful of good humour.

In the psalms, we have some wonderful words to take us into another new year, a prompting to invite God into the recipe of our own lives... 'Open your mouth and taste, open your eyes and see—how good GOD is. Blessed are you who run to him'. (Psalm 34:8 a translation from The Message). The best resolution, I ever made, was my decision to become a Christian, a life- long resolution – the only resolution that I have ever managed to keep; and the teachings of Jesus Christ, the best recipe for following the God of love, who longs to be part of our present and future – to be the compass, which sets the direction for our lives, not just at the beginning of each new year – but step by step, day after day.

So, for 2018, I leave us all with a prayer for peace and hope, for the year that is to come. *[See page 4 for the New Year Prayer]* **Rev Leisa**

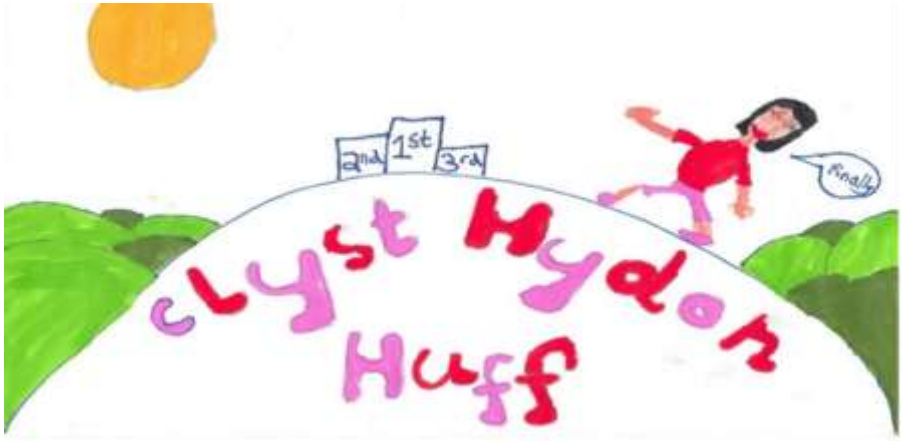
always end each session with prayer and some of the children are getting bolder in saying aloud their own prayers too.

Special thanks to the Friends of Payhembury School for also supporting our venture at the same time as their own Christmas Fair, which was another memorable event.

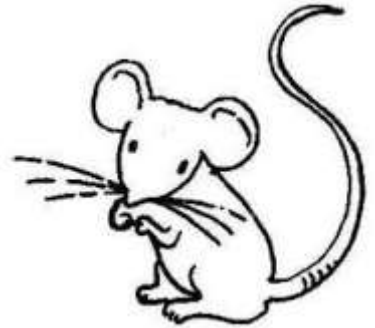

Nature Notes

Hello Everyone Well, we've had some really cold days recently, haven't we? Also, some sunny ones---a bit like winter really! I've noticed that the cold days bring long tailed tits into the garden and on to the feeders. Did you know that on these cold nights, they sometimes roost in large numbers, huddling together to keep warm.

Leonard tells me he's seen a red kite, over Colestocks. I hope it stays around. He's also seen a barn owl and three muntjac deer nearby. Christine has lots of fieldfares and redwings in the field near her house. These winter visitors will stay around until spring, when they will return to their breeding grounds in Scandinavia. Ray had four greenfinches in his garden recently. I only get one or two at a time.

When walking along the prom. in Sidmouth, we were pleased and surprised to see lots of small waders on the prom., running about amongst the people, looking for titbits. These are very small black and white birds, called turnstones, because they turn small stones over on the shore, looking for grubs, worms and any other bugs to eat.

Yellingham Farm in December

December has seen the grass disappear and we are now supplementing

the in-lamb ewes with hay which they are certainly enjoying. The cattle have started to poach the ground where they have been grazing down in the river field, so they are now up nearer the farmhouse, where again they are enjoying hay. In the next few days we will house them until the weather improves. We bed one of the barns for them but they have access to the yard and can wander in and out to their hearts' content and can enjoy the sunshine when and if it shines.

It won't be long before we will start to set up the barns for lambing. It's always a long job, as we seem to collect so much clutter over the year which has to be sorted and tidied away before the sheep pens can be erected. The biggest job this month has been to bring home a massive oak tree which fell a few months ago.

The tree was huge and it always seems such a shame when they fall down. The boys have been chain-sawing for what seems years but finally we are nearly there. There is plenty of oak to keep our open fires burning for years. To ensure that there are plenty of trees for future generations to enjoy, we have planted another 50 trees to include cherry, oak, birch and some firs.



It just remains to say thank you to all of you in the community who have supported the farm this year by purchasing beef and lamb and our lovely apple juice and also for sending your friends and relatives to stay with us in the Bed and Breakfast.

Travelling with your pet

Now is the time of year when we look forward to the summer holidays and for lots of us, that can mean taking our furry friend along too. The Vale Vets team are here to tell you what you need to know before you go. Since 2000, the Pet Travel Scheme (PETS) has allowed cats, dogs and ferrets to enter the UK from certain countries without being placed in quarantine. Animals resident to the UK can now travel to most European countries as well as more distant destinations. From 1st January 2012, the PETS travel scheme changed such that dogs and cats can move freely between PETS-scheme approved countries provided the following conditions are satisfied:

- 1) The pet must have a permanent microchip implanted, which lots of animals already have.
- 2) The pet must be vaccinated against rabies after microchipping. This can be done any time over 12 weeks of age using a licensed vaccine. Boosters are given according to manufacturers' recommendation.
- 3) The pet must have a PETS passport signed by an official veterinary surgeon, confirming the above conditions have been met.
- 4) Some destinations require an additional export certificate. It is important to check with DEFRA for specific conditions requested by the country you wish to travel to.
- 5) There is a 21 day wait after rabies vaccination before travel abroad and/or entry into the UK is allowed. This is to allow time for the vaccine to take effect.
- 6) There is a requirement for a veterinary certified tapeworm treatment 24-120 hours before return to the UK. Travel companies and ports will often help you locate a veterinary surgeon for this.

If you are travelling to a country not listed on the PETS scheme, additional conditions must be met. This means starting this process at least 4-5 months before you expect to travel. A blood sample must be taken a minimum of 30 days after rabies vaccination. If the test is successful, a three month wait must be observed following the date of the blood sample before your pet would be allowed back into the UK. If the blood test does not prove adequate antibody levels, your pet would require a second vaccination and blood test. It is also important to contact DEFRA and check for any additional requirements of travel to specific countries. We recommend making sure your pet is protected against ticks and sand-flies during their period of stay outside the UK, as these can carry a variety of diseases which we rarely encounter in this country. It's also important to consider whether your pet enjoys travelling, changes in environment and temperature or whether they may prefer to stay at home. If you have any questions, please contact your vet.

Above all, enjoy your holiday!

Rainfall: November was a dry month with only just over half the rainfall. December has started wetter close to the average with nearly 20mm on 10 December. No significant snow, just the odd flake on 9 December.

Temperatures: Both November and December so far have had below average temperatures, bucking the warming trend this year, especially at night leading to some good frosts.

Weather elsewhere: Storm Caroline passed by on 9 December bringing strong winds and arctic air to all of Britain and significant snow north of the M4. Some areas had power cuts and schools were closed for several days. The rest of N. Europe suffered similar snow chaos with transport affected. It does however suggest a good season for the Alpine ski resorts.
