By now we are well into the season of Lent. For Christians the main thing about Lent is that it is a journey towards Easter.

For the first followers of Jesus the journey to the first Easter was an actual journey. Jesus and his disciples walked from Galilee to Jerusalem. For a long time, though, the disciples had been on a journey of faith and understanding.

When we read the gospels, we see that the first the disciples met this man called Jesus, a Jewish Rabbi, and he invited them to follow him. There was something different about this rabbi, though. For one thing he spoke real authority. More impressively, he backed up his teaching with miracles. Jesus' disciples began to wonder if there was a bit more to this charismatic man.

Imagine, then, their utter devastation when that actually happened. Their whole world must have been shattered when Jesus was arrested, tried, sentenced and crucified.

Little did they know that within the next forty-eight hours Jesus would reveal his greatest miracle of all, and a new journey would begin.

A NEW VICAR FOR ESCOT, FENITON and PAYHEMBURY

The Churchwardens of Escot, Feniton and Payhembury are pleased to say that a new vicar has been appointed for our three parishes. He will join the Otter Vale Mission Community of which we are a part. The announcement was made at the services on Sunday 11th February.



Our new Vicar is the Rev'd David Carrington who is currently the Team Vicar of Appledore, Northam and Westward Ho! Rev'd David will be joining us later in the year, possibly in September, but until then we will continue with the pastoral support of the Mission Community.

Like Rev'd Cate it will be a 0.5 appointment, which means only half his time will be allocated to the three parishes whilst the other half of his role is Lay Director of Education for the South West Ministry Training Course, (SWMTC). This is a training organisation for students to learn from experienced ministers about the planning and practice of liturgical, educational and pastoral tasks which can lead to a University of Exeter award.

Prior to becoming ordained, Rev'd David worked at the Met Office eventually becoming head of the Met Office College; he has an MSc in Meteorology.

Rev'd David wishes to return to a more rural parish ministry and fortunately for us he has wide experience of working in schools including serving as a school governor. He says his outside interests are music especially playing the viola, cycling, hill walking and sailing. He is married to Dawn and they have two grown up sons.


Big Thank You from The Payhembury in Need Relief Fund



On a dark and stormy night, three ladies were making their way home from an evening at a friend's house, when they chanced upon a 150kg saddleback sow in the road. They encouraged her into a neighbour's driveway, parking their car to help keep her there. A knock on the door of neighbour 1 brought no result, so one of the ladies went to the next house up the road, where neighbour 2 agreed to help, armed with large boards. Eventually neighbour 1 appeared, in dressing gown,

having just got out of the bath. After some trouble the chains on a field gate were opened and the sow went in. Although it was late, a phone call was made to farmer 1, who keeps a few pigs. He was on a posh evening out and did not get the message until the early hours, when he called his workman, to go and investigate. The outcome of this was that farmer 1's four pigs were all found to be present. Next morning a call was made to farmer 2, who said he did not think any of his 4000 pigs would have walked over a mile. Eventually farmer 3 (large dairy farmer) was found to be the owner of the sow. By this time, she had rooted her way down into a nice cosy bed in a ditch and neighbour 1 feared she had actually died. A kick roused her. However, she refused all temptings with food to go back up the hill to her field. She insisted on going in the opposite direction. With no one to help, farmer 3 followed her and managed to get her into another of his fields and then back across to his farm. After much frustration, the sow was finally housed, not to be let out again. She and her friend are about 8 years old and are really outgrown pets. Whenever in season, their instinct is to go off in search of a mate. It is unlikely that either will see the green of the fields again.

Nature Notes

Observations from February 2018

A huge flock of lapwings flew over the other day---three flocks, in fact. The number in the biggest flock was about three hundred birds. Lapwings used to be common birds of the fields in Britain, but have declined in recent years, so it was great to see so many.

I saw a little owl the other day, on the roof of Shoots Barn, in Colestocks. Again, we could often see them there when I first came to live here, but not in recent times. I understand that Shoots Barn is ripe for development, so that will probably be the end of these owls. There is often a buzzard sitting atop a post in Colestocks---he will probably be staying!

We have hundreds of fieldfares living in this area, at present. I don't see so many in my end of the village these days, but they are often in the Mead field, accompanied by a few redwings.

Bill, at Upton, tells me he's had a couple of goldcrests in his garden, plus a sleepy wren in his garage. He also gets a pair of swallows, every year, which raise two of three broods in his garage.

The weather is getting a bit more Spring-like now, which is lovely---in a few weeks it will be the best time of the year!

YELLINGHAM FARM IN FEBRUARY

I am seriously considering donning my wetsuit and snorkel to do my daily rounds of the farm – goodness me, will it ever stop raining? There are 6 individuals in this household who actually don't care what the weather is like. My 6 lovely dogs. Well, that's not strictly true – Lilly, my beautiful Jack Russell does spend most of her day curled up in front of the Aga. I just wish they were all short haired like her, but my collies are all long haired and they do get in a real mess, to the extent that when they manage to creep into the kitchen and wag their tails ferociously, my cream walls have artistic brown brush strokes all over them – abstract art at its best.

Given most of our stock are now housed indoors, the work for my collies is minimal. It's also a shame the fields are so wet with a layer of water just sitting totally still on top, because the training programme for my young brown and white collie Ralph is at a standstill. It is totally unfair to run a dog with the conditions as they are, as it trashes the little grass that there is and also it's unfair on the sheep, particularly as Ralph is in the early stages of training, so to him speed is of the essence.

Ralph is a wonderful addition to my tribe and is showing real promise of being a very talented, loyal dog. The 4 main commands we teach a young dog are 1 – to stop, 2 – go right, 3 - to go left and 4 – to walk on. He is coming on well and is now starting to respond to whistle commands.

Training and using a dog to work sheep is one of the most rewarding challenges I have ever undertaken. I have trained many dogs over the last 30 years and I think that Ralph will be my last and potentially one of the best. They have all been the most loyal, hardworking friends I have ever had the privilege to work with.

Rainfall: The rainfall over the past 2 months has been close to average but has mainly been concentrated in heavy rainfall for a few days. For some reason the fields seem to be saturated even though the rainfall has not been exceptional. No significant snowfall in Payhembury so far this winter.

Temperatures: January was definitely a warmer month than average but February has started off rather cold with even a few snow flurries seen especially on the morning of 12 February with a light dusting.

Weather elsewhere: Freezing rain and heavy snow killed one person in Moscow and downed over 2,000 trees. Over half a meter of snow blanketed the Russian capital on 5 February in what was dubbed a "snowfall of the century" after an unusually snow free period. In Paris heavy rain in late January caused the River Seine to reach dangerous levels with the Louvre closing some of its basement displays to the public.
