## **Parvovirus update**

### **LOCAL VETS URGE DOG OWNERS TO CHECK THAT THEIR PETS' VACCINATION IS UP TO DATE**

Following a recent case of Parvovirus, the vets at The Vale Veterinary Group are raising awareness of the importance of pet vaccination for dogs. In an attempt to prevent further cases of the disease, all owners are being asked to check their vaccination records; if they believe that their dogs may not be currently covered, they should contact their veterinary practice.

Vet Alan Benson explains "Parvovirus is usually spread by environmental contamination with dog faeces. There does not need to be direct dog to dog contact and it can be brought into the household on shoes. Unprotected dogs, especially the young, develop severe vomiting and bloody diarrhoea, and in most cases, despite the best veterinary care, the dog cannot be saved." Alan continues, "The distress to the dog and their owners is obvious. Unfortunately there are still a large number of dogs which have never been vaccinated or whose vaccinations have lapsed, making them vulnerable to infection. We believe that preventive care including regular vaccinations and health checks are the best way an owner can actively help their pet's long-term health" concludes Alan.

# Nature Notes

## Observations from March 2018

Well, we've experienced some extreme weather recently, haven't we? The heavy snow, which kept us locked in for a couple of days brought in some interesting birds. I saw a brambling, a siskin, three redwings, two fieldfares and a song thrush---all in our garden at the same time. Apart from the thrush, these are all Winter visitors from the north. I haven't seen any of them since!

We fed apples and seed to the birds on the coldest of days. All of the birds' colours showed up beautifully against the white snow. Fieldfares are extremely aggressive birds, chasing each other and the blackbirds round the garden---it was quite a sight.

Now that the snow has gone, and we have had some warmer days, the bird count in our garden had dropped considerably. A couple of finches, a few tits, the odd blackbird and that's about it. Have they all been building nests in preparation for the Spring?---it can't come soon enough for me!

## YELLINGHAM FARM IN MARCH





# Payhembury Weather

**Rainfall:** The rainfall in February was below average but the beginning of March was marked by heavy snowfall (around 20cm) followed by freezing rain. On the 2<sup>nd</sup> March you could almost walk on the layer of ice above the snow and many surfaces (horizontal and vertical) were just covered in ice. This was the heaviest snow in the village since 2010 and the freezing rain almost unprecedented. Heavy rain caused localised flooding on 14<sup>th</sup> March.

**Temperatures:** The 'Beast from the East' really depressed the temperatures at the end of February before the snow came with daytime temperatures only just above freezing. The 1<sup>st</sup> March was exceptional with temperatures only reaching -1.4 degC.

**Weather elsewhere:** Most of northern Europe experienced the abnormally cold temperatures at the end of February from the strong easterly winds with temperatures colder than in Britain. Once the thaw set in here the river Otter was close to breaching its banks. High tides resulted in flooding on the south Devon coast.
