As many of you know, I had an emergency cardiac bypass operation just before Christmas. Thank you to all of you who sent cards and best wishes, or who prayed for my recovery; Cathy and I are very appreciative. What happened to me was a very unsettling experience! I didn't feel ill at all before the operation – I had what is known as a "silent condition" to which no symptoms are attached. What happened was this; in the run up to Christmas I started a slight wheeze, and I went to the Coleridge Medical Centre with what I thought was a chest infection. They took a blood test, and the following day, 13th December (after a full morning including taking a large funeral) I was rushed into hospital. I thought my heart was fine! – but an angiogram indicated there were critical blockages in the supply to the heart, and the consultant said I would need a bypass operation, which should ensure that my heart would be as good as new. And, following surgery and a short stay at Hammersmith Hospital – as far as I am able to tell - it is! (though at the moment my energy levels still drain very quickly...)

At the time of writing we are in the period between Ascension and Pentecost – and as I write, it appears that creation has come alive all at once in the May sunshine after a very long winter. At morning prayer today we read a passage from Ezekiel, including the verse "A new heart I will give you, and put a new spirit within you" and "you shall be clean from all your uncleannesses". The coming of the spirit reminds us that we all need our hearts operated upon by the divine surgeon to become part of God's new creation, forgiven and restored to new life. We may not realise anything is amiss, but we should trust God for his diagnosis: it is far more serious than any physical condition; our hearts are dead – like stone – until they are changed to being alive to God by the operation of the Holy Spirit within us. If you have never signed the consent form for this procedure (!!) – don't delay.

- A home-made slug trap
- An iced cake including vegetables in the recipe
- A basket of veg
- 5 beans!
- The best begonia (grown from a supplied corm)
- 5 sweet pea stems
- A piece of garden art. This can be in any medium, such as willow, metal, wood, glass etc. as long as it is suitable to withstand the outdoors. It can be purely decorative or have a function too – as long as it looks good and that you have made it yourself.

Payhembury Tennis Court Update

It is that time of the year again where we wait to see how much sunshine the summer will grace us with, rummaging around in the garage to find if your racquet still has strings and then being inspired to play tennis after watching Konta, Watson, Murray or Edmund!

Maintained single tennis courts in villages are on the decline in England and it is something to celebrate that Payhembury still has a court that is available for all the community to use. The biggest factor towards the maintenance of the court is its proximity to the hedge and the constant weed killing. This is the main reason we charge a small yearly subscription of £30 for a family, £25 for a couple, £15 for an individual and £10 for an U16/Student or OAP. The court is sprayed for weeds about 3 times in the season and the hedge is cut back regularly to stop more incursions. We also get the court sealed every few years and have built up funds to respond to any serious issues that require action.

However it has been a tough few months for the court with the extreme changes in the weather and some damage to the fence. Due to the rain the weeds and hedge are bigger than expected and the perimeter fence has been damaged by someone(s) who have created a hole to enter into the court. This is unfortunately the first significant damage for a few years but should all be fixed soon.

We will still operate a lock and key for the court to avoid further damage. It is really to get access just fill out a membership form (available on the Payhembury website) pay the subscription and contact the chairwoman, Jane Wood, on 01404 841843 to get a key. Existing keyholders will need to pay the annual fee but can retain their current key.

Booking sheets so that you can guarantee a playing time are on the notice board outside the village shop. Fill this in so you have peace of mind and priority over others.

We did not have an annual clear up this year due to the poor weather but we welcome any help from the community in the future. Please keep using this community facility and we look forward to seeing a full booking sheet this summer.

News from the Hall...

The Hall in Payhembury is a fantastic community asset which is available for all residents in the Parish. It's origins are in the former 'Memorial Hall', built for the community on land generously donated by the Leach family. The old building came to the end of its life and so the land that it stood on was traded for the land and the build of the new Hall. The new Hall is a modern building built to last, and commissioned in 2008 - a challenging and fantastically well-managed project by the then Committee - Louise Granger, Alan Jones, Di Somers, Fred Worman, Sally & Alf Boom, Sandra Ford, Robin Stanes, Bill Garvey and Rob Holman.

The Hall has always been run by volunteers (Trustees of the Hall, which is a registered charity) on behalf, and for the benefit, of the Hall 'members'... if you're reading this you are almost certainly a 'member' as the Hall is there to be an asset, facility, and community hub, for all the residents of the Parish. The Hall finances have always been managed prudently and sustainably, with no reliance on outside funding - a good strategy as there is rarely any available these days. The present Hall Committee (named below) are aiming to carry on the good work of the Committee that organised the building that we have today.

Relatively recently, the Hall was fitted with solar PV panels, giving renewable energy and a significant source of year-round income which benefits everyone in the community by helping keep hire costs low. We are looking into further investment into renewable and sustainable technologies to ensure that we are dependent on fossil fuels and their price variations as little as possible - this may soon include a rainwater harvesting system to cut down on water bills.

Most of all though, we want to increase usage of the Hall by people that live in (and outside) the Parish - for all ages and events that promote community spirit, participation or simply the wellbeing of individuals, families and groups. At the moment it is regularly used for Pilates classes, short mat bowls (Wednesday evening), and has facilities and court markings for badminton, along with table tennis table, bench seating, a bouncy castle, and a beautiful indoor canopy donated by Di and John Somers. The Hall is also used regularly by the school, youth and church groups, and annually for village events such as the Spring Bulb Show (of course), May Day, and the school Xmas bash, and is occasionally used for weddings, parties (for children big and small), music events, and other gatherings for clubs and societies generally.

The Committee is embarking on a range of initiatives to get more people involved using this fantastic facility to both improve the Hall, and encourage wider participation and use, bringing the community together more often. We have made a start by repainting the inside of the building last year and, more recently, replacing the old Hall sign - we decided to go with 'Village Hall' as the Committee unanimously agreed that the word 'village' sounded more welcoming and friendly than 'Parish' - of course, the Hall remains a facility for everyone in the Parish. Later this year our action plan includes:

- improving the look of the interior small 'welcome' room, and the outside/front of the building;
- the fitting of phone line and broadband (aimed at occasional business use and emergencies, rather than standing around looking at phone screens :)

- launching a Hall website (June) and marketing and event information, to help people know what is going on, not just in the Hall, but also elsewhere in the village and the region; and,

bringing more music, and maybe the cinema and arts events (and anything else interesting) into the village.

The rationale for the above is to get more use and participation while increasing the income of the Hall, towards continuous improvement and assured sustainability. We are looking for people with ideas to work with the Committee, especially young people, or any groups who would like to see more going on for them or others. For this we will need more involvement, ideas, energy, and maybe even financial donations or

pledges, from people who want to see this great facility be even better. Please get in touch if you want to be part of it and make our Hall more action-packed and more beautiful!

Payhembury Weather

Rainfall: April was a wet month with several days of more than 10mm rain at the start of the month keeping the fields very soggy. May has been much drier so far.

Temperatures: For most of April it was an average month but between 19th and 21st April there was a record breaking heatwave for April with maximum temperatures reaching over 25 degC. It didn't last long and by 22nd April the temperature was back below 20 degC.

Weather elsewhere: At least 95 people were killed and dozens more injured in a violent sand storm that hit Uttar Pradesh and Rajasthan states in northern India. The storm occurred on 5th May disrupted electricity, uprooted trees, destroyed houses and killed livestock. Many died while asleep when their home collapsed.

Payhembury Monthly Temperatures degC

The Vale Veterinary Group Parvovirus update

**LOCAL VETS URGE DOG OWNERS TO CHECK THAT THEIR PET'S
VACCINATION IS UP TO DATE**

Following a recent case of Parvovirus, the vets at The Vale Veterinary Group are raising awareness of the importance of pet vaccination for dogs. In an attempt to prevent further cases of the disease, all owners are being asked to check their vaccination records; If they believe that their dogs may not be currently covered they should contact their veterinary practice.

Vet Alan Benson explains "Parvovirus is usually spread by environmental contamination with dog faeces. There does not need to be direct dog to dog contact and it can be brought into the household on shoes. Unprotected dogs, especially the young, develop severe vomiting and bloody diarrhoea, and in most cases, despite the best veterinary care, the dog cannot be saved." Alan continues, "The distress to the dog and their owners is obvious. Unfortunately there are still a large number of dogs which have never been vaccinated or whose vaccinations have lapsed, making them vulnerable to infection. We believe that preventive care including regular vaccinations and health checks are the best way an owner can actively help their pet's long-term health".
