Rectory notes



One of those blue historical plaques, increasingly common on old buildings, humorously says 'Jacob von Hogflume 1864-1909, inventor of time travel, lived here in 2189'. If only we could travel forward or back in history. What would we tell the future, or the past?

November 2018, 100 years on from the end of the Great War. What would we tell those celebrating the end of those tragic four years? What would they be keen to tell us?

November is a month of remembrances. 'Remember, remember, the fifth of November,' and all that. Not that on the 5th we think about gunpowder, treason and plot much these days. It's more likely we are delighting in the bursts of firework colour in the night sky, or preparing for the next ear-splitting bang as we comfort a cowering pet. On 11th of the month we will be marking the moment with greater thoughtfulness.

Across the country there will be silence, wreaths, the tune of a bugle, and this year church bells, muffled and later in full voice, marking the movement from war to peace. A strange and contradictory moment: the end of death, whilst its deep scars remain. Do we remember so that we don't repeat our mistakes? Or do we remember to remind us that we do?

Jesus was sparing in his instructions about religious remembrance. Just the one act. Bread and wine (our Communion). Simple, earthy, powerful. Resonating with Jewish remembrance of their great moment of release, looking back to their past in the Passover. But in Jesus' hands, not just looking back – now to the Cross – but looking forward. 'I will never again drink this wine,' said Jesus, 'until the day I drink the new wine with you in my Father's Kingdom.' Our present is now rooted not just in remembrance of the past, but in future redemption.

Our folly is surely that, despite all our technological advances and cultural sophistication, we so often don't learn from the past. But there is relief, and it is whispered by the myriad little crosses scattered across Northern France: that we are redeemed, from our past, present and future.

As November closes, we step into Advent. The days shorten and the darkness grows. Yet the first glimmer of dawn is already showing. If you'll forgive the premature mention of Christmas, we will soon be gazing at a little blue plaque on a Bethlehem stable wall: 'the inventor of time itself was born here.'

Neighbourhood Plan Update

Thank you to everyone who read the consultation version of the Neighbourhood Plan during May. Based on the feedback received (mostly from East Devon District Council), we updated the plan and formally submitted it on September 19th. It has taken two and a half years work for us to reach this point and we'd like to again thank those who have given their time to get us here. It now becomes the responsibility of East Devon District Council who have started their own consultation which will run until November 30th. To view the submitted version or provide comments on this round of consultation, please visit <http://eastdevon.gov.uk/planning/neighbourhood-and-community-plans/neighbourhood-plans/neighbourhood-plans-being-produced-in-east-devon/payhembury>. After this, EDDC will take it to a government examiner to review, make any recommended amendments and then arrange a referendum of the parish to approve the plan. We understand that these outstanding stages are expected to take 9-12 months.

Broadhembury and District Gardening Club



Nature Notes Observations from October

It was just a case of unintended consequences when earlier this year I invested in a bat detector, but did not get around to using it until very recently. This is a small hand-held device, which converts the non-audible ultrasonic calls bats make into a series of clicks, each unique to the particular species. Unfortunately, there is some overlap between the different frequencies and I do not yet have the expertise to separate them with certainty. Now, I am used to seeing the odd bat or two and have been aware for a long time that there were at least two species in the garden, one much larger than the other, no doubt attracted by the abundance of food around my moth lights.

In early September, as good weather had been forecast, we decided to have one last family BBQ and around 22.00 we remembered my new toy. What happened next stunned us all – Noctule bat, Serotine bat, Barbastelle bat, probable Common Pipistrelle, probable Brown Long-eared bat, Soprano Pipistrelle, and Greater and Lesser Horseshoe bats – dozens of them in clear view feasting on all those poor moths!

The UK only has 18 species of bat and we had recorded 8 on our very first attempt in about half an hour. The next night some Nathusius's Pipistrelles arrived, although over the following weeks the numbers fell away quite dramatically.

As autumn draws on my thoughts return to birdlife. There have been persistent reports of Red Kite sightings in this part of Devon. Once extinct in this country, reintroduction programmes has seen the return of this species, which is no longer considered to be endangered. We used to count them as we drove through the "Oxford Gap" on the M40 when visiting my late in-laws in the Midlands from where we then lived in Sussex. Our record was over 100 birds. Another great place we once visited was Gigrin Farm in Wales, where they feed the birds every afternoon.

As the end of September loomed we were treated to the sight of hares in the field opposite our house and were privileged to see part of a massive swallow autumn migration. We became aware that swallows were lining up on the wires outside. Slowly the numbers built and then they were spooked. Almost immediately more and more joined them until the sky was black as they hawked around for insects. Then, as suddenly as they had appeared, they were gone, drifting away to the west prior to their long trip south.

Andrew Vincent was kind enough to share with me a photo he took of a Convolvulus Hawk-moth, taken somewhere near Powderham Castle. This is another huge moth, occasionally seen at the end of summer, when a few will fly over from continental Europe.

Yellingham Farm

Last month I talked of the imminent process of putting the rams in. Well the job is done and the boys seem to be relishing their task. The rams were certainly ready to work as they started to smell distinctly "rammy" – a smell I cannot really describe other than quite vile! Their top lips were curling up and heads very much poised as they could certainly smell that ewes close by were coming into season. Getting the rams and the ewes in good condition prior to mating is so important – fit but not fat.

Before putting the rams in with the ewes, we mix up a coloured paste which we apply to their breast bone – commonly known as "raddle" paint (see photo showing raddle paint being applied). This year the first colour is yellow. After the first night we had a few ewes with yellow bottoms so the rams were definitely at work. However, whilst the ewes would appear to have been "covered", there are some occasions when this is not the case. The worst scenario is that the ram is working but is infertile, or indeed the ewe is infertile. My rams are proven so hopefully that eliminates one potential problem. So as a safeguard, we change the colour of the raddle paste after a couple of weeks. If a ewe is marked a second time with a different colour it highlights that there is a potential problem as the first mating probably didn't work. The heat cycle lasts approximately 17 days so if the ram misses a ewe the first time, hopefully they get marked with the second colour in the second heat cycle. We normally leave the rams in for a maximum of 3 heat cycles and anything not in lamb then would suggest it is infertile or there are other unforeseen problems. But being positive, we normally have a good strike rate.

Also with a nice drop of rain, lovely days and heavy dews, the grass is growing.

Rainfall: September was much drier than average but the first half of October was nearly twice as wet as normal partly due to Storm Callum resulting in 24mm in one day on 12 September. Luckily the ground is still not saturated so flooding was limited.

Temperatures: September and October have continued the warm theme on average with maximum values close to records. The first 2 weeks of October experienced especially warm days.

Weather elsewhere: Storm Callum caused flooding in S. Wales and also resulted in the main train line to Cornwall once again cut for a while due to track damage. Deadly flash floods also caused havoc in Majorca on 10th October and Southern France on 14th October and several other locations around the globe. Florida was hit by Hurricane Michael the strongest US storm since 1992 with winds up to 155 mph.

It may be a little early to talk about Christmassy things in the shop, although I have noticed that we already have brandy soaked Christmas cakes in decorative tins and a good selection of special biscuits and sweets in beautiful packaging that would make lovely gifts. We will also be taking orders for our ever popular Christmas turkeys and geese soon.



Instead I thought I would share a recipe for a really delicious warming soup which is perfect for this time of year. All the ingredients are available at the shop of course!

Curried sweet potato soup

- 2 tbs olive oil
- 2 onions chopped
- 4 garlic cloves finely chopped
- 4cms ginger grated
- chilli flakes to taste
- 1 tbs garam masala
- 2 tsp curry powder
- 3 sweet potatoes (about 700g) peeled and diced
- 1 litre veg stock
- 400ml tin coconut milk
- juice of 1-2 limes
- salt and pepper, plain yoghurt optional.

Heat the oil over a low heat. Add the onions and cook for about 10 minutes until soft. Add the garlic, ginger, chilli, garam masala and curry powder and stir for a minute. Tip in the sweet potatoes and stir until they are well coated in the spices. Add salt and pepper and pour in the stock. Increase the heat to a simmer and cook until the sweet potatoes are very tender, about 15 minutes. Remove the soup from the heat, cool slightly then whizz until very smooth. Return to the pan, stir in the coconut milk and warm through gently. Take off the heat and add the lime juice. Adjust the seasoning if necessary. Serve the soup topped with a good dollop of yoghurt if you like and a sprinkling of black pepper.
