Imagine for a moment you're a Roman citizen in AD 320 or so. All your life, you've merrily celebrated on December 25th the feast of the birthday of Sol Invictus – the 'Invincible Sun' and patron deity of the emperor. Now, though, Emperor Constantine has rebranded it the Feast of the Nativity, for his new upstart deity Jesus Christ, the true sun god so he claims. You are irate. How dare he trample over our festival? OK, so he's the emperor; he can do what he wants.

You share your grievances over a jug of beer with a Germanic pagan a few years downstream, and you have an instant ally. His Yuletide festival has similarly been born again as Christmastide. "Put Yule back into Yuletide!" "Put Sol back into Sol Invictus!" your banners proclaim.

We sometimes brandish the slogan "Put Christ back into Christmas!" Some historical realism is needed. We Christians did rather steal the festival in the first place! We can't complain too much if it gets subsumed by some later ideology.

And subsumed it largely is. The new gods of consumerism have no shame in which festival they appropriate. Recently celebrated Halloween has exploded commercially in recent years. I write this just before so-called Black Friday, when retailers sell at wildly marked-down prices.

The marketing people have scored another extraordinary success; in the US, Black Friday is the day after Thanksgiving, somewhat like our Boxing Day sales – we don't even have Thanksgiving yet have been sucked into the commercial vortex. Christmas shopping now almost seems calm in comparison. Somewhere under all these layers at this time of year, Jesus's 'birthday' is buried.

Does he mind? Or is he too humble? A stable in an unknown village to poor parents, hardly the background of someone who wants to make a fuss. He would rather we remember his death and resurrection. He'll be happy, though, if we do celebrate his birth. After all, God's incarnation as one of us is a remarkable moment in time.

Meanwhile, we have long dark nights and winter's cold to get through. Bonus food and drink may ease the passage. The Romans and Pagans got some things right.

I hope you have a restful and enjoyable celebratory Christmas.

News from Yellingham Farm

Firstly, I must correct a typing error of mine from last month's article. I stated that we leave our rams in for three heat cycles – not on your nelly! Two heat cycles is long enough otherwise I could be lambing forever.

The rams' time is nearly up and their job done for another year. We will take them out this week and put all the in-lamb ewes back together. The rams will spend some time back together in a small pen before letting them back out in the field. Even though they live together for most of the year in harmony, after being split up and put in with their respective breeding ewes, they soon forget each other. So on putting them back together, their immediate reaction is to fight and exert dominance. This can be very nasty, quite frightening and if not managed, can lead to a ram being killed. So by putting them in a tight confined space for a couple of days together, they will still butt and barge each other, but cannot get a run up and really fight. After 24 hours, we make the pen a little bigger and increase the space a little each day until they seem at ease with each other. It's then back out in the field until next October.

This week also saw the sale of some of our store cattle through Exeter Livestock market. It was good to sell them before the winter sets in, as it has been an expensive autumn with us having to dip into our winter feed supplies earlier than we have ever done due to a lack of grass. They sold well and as always I was pleased to see them looking extremely clean and healthy. We are now looking forward to replacing them in the early part of next year with more lovely calves.

Paul's Nature Notes

Observations from November

The robins at both ends of our garden have become very tame indeed, doubtless seeing me as a source of constant food. I have to be extremely careful when releasing moths from the traps, as they haunt my footsteps. One false move on my part and they pounce on some poor unsuspecting moth.

The Roe Deer continue to be seen in the garden both in daylight and after dark. For now they are confining themselves to the windfalls, but it will be different next spring. I am already working on a pungent smelling and tasting deterrent to spray on the roses, so fingers crossed this will work.

In early November the nights were freezing but we had lovely sunny days and I enjoyed the high pitched squeaks of the Long-tailed Tits all around me – quite unmistakable once you get your ear in. We do not feed the birds at all in the summer months, but recently I filled up our many bird feeders. It only took the Great and Blue Tits about half an hour to realise there was food around, whilst the Goldfinches, called jam-faced finches by our younger daughter, arrived within the hour. David Curran told us he has seen Coal Tits in his garden for the first time. They have yet to reappear here, but now the feeders are full again, doubtless it will not take them long. Unlike most birds they will take just one seed and then immediately disappear into deep cover to devour it.

Andrew and Cherry reported the first arrivals of Fieldfares in early November, all busy feeding on the apples in their garden. It should not be too long before the Redwings show up. Strangely, we only see them on the northern and eastern sides of the village. There have also been reports of influxes of Waxwings into the UK, but few have been seen so far in the SW. It is worth keeping an eye on any rowan with berries, which is their favoured food. Finally, there are reports of the arrival of Avocets on their wintering grounds on the River Exe

Rainfall: October was pretty average for rainfall but November has started very wet with almost 30mm falling on 9th November resulting in a lake by the shop in the village. We have had the normal monthly rainfall for all of November in the first 2 weeks. The forecast for the second half of the month is dry though.

Temperatures: October started very warm but had some cold nights going down to -3.6 degC, a record low, on 30th October resulting in air frosts. The first half of November by contrast has been warmer than average although the forecast is for cooler temperatures for the second half of November.

Weather elsewhere: The Californian wildfires after months of hot dry weather are resulting in widespread devastation all along the coast. With winds at 50mph causing the fire to grow rapidly residents were forced to abandon vehicles and escape on foot; some were not so lucky. In contrast, Melbourne experienced more than 30mm of rain in 3 hours on Melbourne Cup Day, causing local flooding. Meanwhile, a \$30M research project is studying the megastorms experienced in Argentina in order to improve forecasts of severe weather.
