

Just under 30 years ago I met Margaret Thatcher. Well almost – I was in the same room. Whatever you may think of her, she was a scientist, and thankfully understood at a pivotal stage that we humans may be changing our climate. She was therefore a strong advocate for new government funding of research, and the creation of a centre to do this: the Hadley Centre for Climate Prediction and Research at the Met Office. In 1990 she formally cut the ribbon. My first Met Office job was in the Hadley Centre.

Roll on nearly 30 years. Two Anglican Bishops from the South Pacific islands of Melanesia visit Feniton in February. They speak of how climate change is affecting lives on their islands. Rises in sea-level are changing the shoreline. Fish stocks are depleting partly because the local sea temperature is changing. For them climate change is a living reality. Those who live on the 'margins' of our wealthy world are usually the first to suffer when things go wrong.

Do we listen enough even now to the vigorous voices of scientists sounding the warning bells? Did we listen back in the colonial era to the voices of indigenous peoples who understood the Earth better than us Westerners, as we confidently rolled out our programme of industrialisation and cultural and religious 'advancement' across the world? The voices of aboriginal cultures – in Australasia, the Americas and elsewhere – were usually ignored. They spoke of God differently, but they had spiritual antennae still sensitive to the sacred nature of the Earth, its fragility and its interdependence with us.

Thankfully there is fresh listening, and young people are leading the way. In February, children across the country took part in the first 'climate strike' in the UK, missing a day's school to protest at the low level of serious government action on climate. Any detriment to their schooling and inconvenience to their schools are surely mere ripples compared to the tsunami that is global warming.

Artists have also responded. 'The Last Fish Supper' is the wonderful title of a recent satirical painting. Based on Leonardo da Vinci's famous 'The Last Supper', artist Gina Parr has superimposed on the heads of Jesus and the apostles the heads of fish. Dwindling global fish stocks is her focus; many of the apostles were fishermen, of course. Yet in the middle of the picture is Christ. With arms outstretched – and with fish and chips in place of bread and wine – he still places himself at the heart of the world's brokenness, and offers redemption for our warming world.

Paul's Nature Notes

We spent most of January in Ethiopia and my thoughts keep returning there. One vivid memory is of a young barefoot boy, dressed in rags and none too clean. We had stopped at some random location in the rocky highlands and, as always happened, people just materialised out of nowhere. He was not begging but merely sought the comfort of standing next to someone other than from his own tribe. His life is harsh. He lives, as so many do in those remote areas, in a thatched, mud hut bare of anything except for a cooking pot and some bedding. His first task as day breaks is to carry home a heavy container of water which is strapped to his back forcing him to bend double, after which he forages for wood, returning at dusk staggering under the weight of a huge bundle across his shoulders. Here there was no farming mechanisation and all harvesting is done by hand, squatting down with a tiny billhook to cut acres of wheat. This young boy had nothing and it brought it home to me just how much 'stuff' I have but, more importantly, it made me realise the things that are most precious to me in life: my family, my friends and my health.

There are many iconic species. The Ethiopian Wolf is highly endangered with possibly no more than 200 still living in the wild and we saw three one morning. Another is the vegetarian Gelada Baboon, which hangs out along the rim of the Rift Valley, and we had amazing close views of Spotted Hyenas. We had travelled to Ethiopia in search of its exotic birdlife. In the Bale

Mountains we encountered Ruspoli's Turaco (right). A genuine member of avian royalty, its underwings flash crimson in the sunlight as it flies. It is one of the most beautiful birds in the world and incredibly endangered. For years I have wanted to see such beauties as the Northern



Carmine Bee-eater (left) and was rewarded with amazing views and there were countless others: Hornbills, Goshawks and Bustards, to mention just a few. One of the things we did was engage in a 400 mile round trip to see just one very rare and endangered lark. How crazy can anyone get!



In the meantime, Brian Hill in Colestocks has reported the amazing sight of 21 Blackbirds in his garden all feeding at the same time and here at Moorside our robins started to nest build on 4 February

Rainfall: January 2019 was a dry month with only half the normal rainfall but February is on track for being more typical. Snow made a brief appearance in the village right at the end of January but it was soon melted so no 'Beast from the East'.

Temperatures: January was about average for temperature with just a cold snap at the end of January and beginning of February when the snow came. So far the rest of February has been warmer than average.

Weather elsewhere: Although the end of January was cold here, it was nothing compared to the temperatures being experienced in the USA in particular in Minnesota where it was minus 36.4F (-38C) and Niagara Falls was frozen. It even snowed at higher levels in Hawaii which is unusual. In contrast at the same time there was a searing heatwave in Australia that cooked Marble Bar to 120F (49.1C) and broke records. Bush fires are now a real hazard in several Australian states.

Yellingham Farm

Valentines Day has passed me by yet again, but one can continue to hope. The trouble is, the word “hope” always has “less” added onto it. At least the 14th



February is not a one off and there’s another ray of hope for next year. But with that disappointment gone and forgotten, there is real hope around the corner as we start lambing at the beginning of March. The ewes are now in and looking extremely smart as I hope the photo shows.

We had them dagged out recently so that their rear ends are free of wool which means we have lovely clean sheep for lambing. Whilst the shearer was here he also dagged and removed all the belly wool from my 20 remaining lambs from last year, the majority of which have been selected to go into the flock and who will be put to the ram this autumn coming.

The abattoirs are now very strict on the cleanliness of sheep and so dagging and belying is now par for the course. Interestingly, I recently sent some lambs to the abattoir but wanted the skins back for tanning. If the lambs had been bellied out they would have been useless for tanning, as half the sheepskin rug would be devoid of any wool! So lo and behold we ended up washing their bellies to free them of any mud and debris – not a job I would like to do regularly but needs must and all was well.



The skins were then salted immediately and we took them straight to Devonian the tannery in Buckfastleigh. Unfortunately, there are so few tanneries left that the turn around time is quite long.....when they told me my skins would be ready for next Christmas, I laughed and thought they were pulling my leg. They were deadly serious. The wait will be worth it, as Jacob Sheepskin rugs are really something quite special.
