One day the new Vicar said, ‘We need a strapline.’ ‘What’s one of those?’ came a sensible enquiry. ‘Keep up!’ piped another up cheekily, ‘it’s one of those trendy phrases people feel they have to have these days.’ So the parishes talked amongst themselves and said, ‘How about Love, Hope and Faith? What things could be better? – and three to match the three parishes.’ ‘Excellent!’ cried one, ‘Bingo!’ cried another. ‘But we can’t just have three words floating in nothingness,’ a voice protested, ‘we need to *do* something.’ ‘Grow – that’s what we’re doing,’ came a wise reply. ‘So that’s what it will be, then,’ the parishes concluded. “Escot, Feniton and Payhembury parishes in the Otter Vale team – growing in Love, Hope and Faith.” And so the strapline was born, to nestle down and become a lovely part of the three lovely parishes. (A little poetic licence has been employed in the telling of this tale of the three PCCs’ discussions.)

Once upon another time, many years ago in a land far away, a man stuck a stake in the ground. He strung garlands of love over the stake. As nails were driven into the wood through his hands and feet, all people could see were the garlands of love. As darkness fell, the man heaved his tragic final breath. The garlands fell from the stake, all hope falling with them. But the love flowed unnoticed down the hill from where the stake stood and quietly hid in a tomb. It paused for new breath in the earth. Then it burst gloriously out into radiant garlands to festoon the sky. The garlands showered down on the man’s friends, new hope born. DCS now offering better broadband scheme vouchers

The Connecting Devon and Somerset (CDS) broadband programme is now offering vouchers through the national BDUK Better Broadband Scheme.

All homes and businesses in the region with broadband speeds of less than two Megabits per second (Mbps), without a published delivery date for superfast broadband within the next 12 months, are now eligible to apply for an interim solution under the voucher scheme.



The Better Broadband Voucher Scheme, administered by BDUK, helps provide access to a broadband service offering download speeds of at least 10 Mbps. Vouchers worth up to £350 would contribute towards the cost of equipment and installation of a 4G, Fixed Wireless or Satellite solution. We have, for example,

Farstrete free-range eggs from Whimple; has anyone else had the excitement of finding a double-yolker in their extra-large eggs? From Clyst Hydon we have honey made by bees kept by the Mitchem family, and near Dunkeswell the Common Loaf bakery make the most moreish cheese crackers you're ever likely to sample. Probably our nearest suppliers are Tuck Mill beef and the East family from Yellingham Farm who make apple juice and also rear beef; Janet tells us she'll soon have more beef for us, so we'll keep you posted about this.

One of our Somerset suppliers, Jon Thorner, really hit the headlines last month. His company, based in Shepton Mallet, make the pies, pasties, ham and sausage rolls we sell and he has caused a huge stir among the big cheeses of the pie world by winning top prize out of 900 entries in the British Pie Awards with a VEGAN PIE! We are hoping to be selling this curried sweet potato and butternut squash pie by the time you read this but we think you'll find all his pies deserve a prize.

Paul's Nature Notes from February

We deserted Devon in mid-February for a 70th birthday celebration in a cottage at RSPB Arne in Dorset. The weather was marvellous and we saw many of the species for which this reserve is renowned: Spoonbills, Dartford Warblers, Goldcrests, Firecrests, Sika Deer, the strange woolly coated Mangalica pigs and a few thousand over-wintering Avocets. Returning via Weymouth we met up with our co-grandparents. Here there are two urban bird reserves, Radipole and Lodmore, and quite unlike most RSPB reserves, you can actually get close to the birds. We quickly tracked down a Ring-necked Duck, a rare North American migrant, at Radipole, then relocating to Lodmore

brought an immediate sighting of a Eurasian Penduline Tit (right) and shortly afterwards another rare North/Central American migrant, a Lesser Yellowlegs (picture left). Three incredibly rare UK birds all in the space of a couple of hours! There were also excellent views of Ruff, Snipe and Mediterranean Gulls.



The glorious sunny weather at the end of February had an immediate effect on the wildlife: the frogs mated and produced masses of spawn, birds put on mating displays, our Long-tailed Tits started to nest build, a pair of Tawny Owls called, a male Great Spotted Woodpecker began drumming and a pair of Nuthatches appeared. Is it possible they will take over the woodpecker's nest from last year? Mary Whiting was delighted to tell me that a beautiful Bullfinch put in an appearance in her garden, although she feared for her blossoms. An exultation of Skylarks sang over the field opposite and Redwings and Fieldfares clouded the skies preparing to return to Scandinavia for the summer.

More importantly for us, Friday 22 February was a huge red letter day. We saw the arrival of about 80,000 grandchildren, as our daughter Wendy refers to them, two hives full of bees. She and her husband Joe have moved to the village, but do not have room for them in their new garden. The bees arrived early on a cool, grey day and settled in very quickly. By day 2 the sun shone and there was a steady stream of bees doing their orientation flights, spiralling upwards in ever increasing circles. By day 3 foraging parties were setting off to explore and returning with nectar and within a week the workers were bringing back large amounts of pollen – a good sign that the queens are alive and well and egg laying. This really is a very exciting time for us all.

Tuck Mill Cricket



As I type I'm looking out at the still highly illegal cricket field, brimming with ewes and lambs as they seem to think its breakfast time. You might at this point be thinking something along the lines of "why on earth doesn't the old boy stop banging on about planning permission?" The answer is simple, by the beginning of last summer we had reached a position with EDDC whereby they were insistent that to play cricket legally in the field we needed a "Mixed Social and Sporting Use" Permission. By the end of the summer, in order to satisfy the demands of the Environment Agency, we had been advised we would need a Flood Risk Assessment for the Club House. The Flood Risk Assessor then needed a Levels Assessment before he could proceed. We then spent all of the money raised last year on these surveys and submitted them to the EA in October.

Now bear in mind, please, that I've never worked for a council, but how in any self respecting organisation can it be that, after harassing ("We must request that you cease playing cricket in 28 days or apply for the relevant planning permissions") an applicant, it can then reasonably take quite so long to respond? Answers on a post card please! Obviously we don't have the same person looking after our "case" who's been put in charge of selling off playing fields and childhood obesity. On a positive note the very same organisation have renewed the alcohol licence for the club house that doesn't exist. You are allowed a wry smile at this point. Anyway, the season will hopefully shortly be upon us, it seems like only a few weeks ago that Ian Scott was pulling Oli Kittows van out of the mud after the season opener last year, hopefully the spring will be a little kinder this year.

Cricket Force Day this year is on Sunday 14th April at 10am and hopefully, once we've seen off Libby's sheep, we can get the field up together. We then have an open net session on Wednesday 17th April for all who want to get involved.....we could do with a few more bodies, as a few of our members have moved on in different ways so do please get in touch if your interested. Your ability is unlikely to be questioned. We then kick off the season away at Clyst Hydon on 24th April followed by the trip to Cullompton on 1st May. The first home game is on Tuesday 7th May at 6pm and the full list of fixtures is available on the village website.

Rainfall: February was drier than normal but March has started wet with a whole week of strong westerly winds bringing down telephone lines at Tale and numerous branches around the village. Storm Gareth contributed to this with winds of 30 miles/hr on 10 March.

Temperatures: It felt like summer had come early with the last week of February breaking records throughout England due to the warm Saharan air. It rose to 16.7 degC here on 27 February and in London above 20 degC! Since then the temperatures have returned to normal though.

Weather elsewhere: An avalanche on Ben Nevis killed 3 climbers on 12 March. In contrast the warm weather at the end of February resulted in heath fires in West Yorkshire and there were many forest fires in N. Spain due to the very dry conditions which is unusual for these winter months. There was much worse in Australia and even in New Zealand where people had to abandon homes due to widespread fires.

Definitive Map Review – next stage

The Definitive Map Review of the public rights of way in Payhembury has now started with a presentation by Tom Green from Devon County Council (DCC) on the processes involved, which took place on 13th. There is now a 3-month period in which you can submit any evidence and other information you have about existing, or possibly forgotten, public rights of way in the parish. This information needs to be submitted via User Evidence forms and Landowner Evidence forms and copies of these can be downloaded from The Definitive Map Review section of the DCC website - <https://www.devon.gov.uk/prow/the-definitive-map/definitive-map-review/> . Forms should be completed and returned to Tom Green at DCC either by post to Devon County Council Public Rights of Way Section, County Hall, Topsham Road, Exeter, Devon.
