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# Rectory notes



January: we turn over the page of our life story to a new chapter. What was 2019's story for you? Who entered your story for the first time – new friends? a family baby? a close relationship? What were the ups and downs, the joys and sorrows, the moments you'll treasure – and those you'd rather forget? And so to 2020...

A short while ago I penned twelve creative stories about people's lives. They're written from the perspective of characters in the Old Testament: What was Noah's experience of the flood like, when he lost his community, his country and everything else he knew except immediate family, to wash up on a foreign shore? What was it like for a young woman starting out on life to cross the Red Sea? What did Jonah and his ship's captain talk about? How did the wife of Babylon's King Nebuchadnezzar cope with his mental illness? And so on. We can't answer these questions but we can imagine.

Unique people with unique stories. Yet also not so different from us: the Bible and its characters can be closer to us than we think.

Each month in 2020 I plan to circulate one of these stories, to those on the email list I use for my occasional "Vicar's circulars" and to anyone else interested. I'll post them on Facebook too. I've sought to retell the ancient stories through contemporary eyes; this includes sketching natural events (such as floods) without such a stretch on scientific credulity. Most of the stories have yet to see the light of day; time will tell if it were better they'd stayed that way!

A theme of all the stories is hope. Our churches' strapline is 'Growing in Love, Hope and Faith', and of these three, hope feels the least tangible. It cannot be manufactured, and comes as a gift. I suspect that hope will be a particularly valued commodity this year.

So, some stories offered to run alongside ours in 2020. But more important are our own stories: what high and low points await us? who will enter them, who will depart? In whatever way your story unfolds this year, my prayer is that love, hope and faith blossom in new ways for us all.

4. A pot of Narcissi – Any type dwarf/small/minature

7. A flowering plant in a pot
8. A foliage plant in a pot
9. A succulent or cacti in a pot

#### *Clarification of Classes:*

Class 2: "long trumpet" means that the trumpet must be as long as, or longer than, the petals of the flower, e.g. King Alfred, Golden Harvest or Rembrandt.

Class 3: "large cup" means that the cup of the flower must be more than 1/3rd of the length of, but not as long as, the petals, e.g. Carlton, Professor Einstein or Sempre Avanti.

## Yellingham Farm

With the rest of the world going crazy at the moment preparing for Christmas, life on the farm is actually quiet and serene. The rams have done their job and are back resting until next autumn, this year's lambs are growing on nicely as are the cattle. The constant rain has put a lot of pressure on the fields, with the river Tale rising and falling daily. Fortunately, we are not overstocked and all of our stock including the cattle are still out. With the warm, damp weather, pneumonia is always a threat so we try not to house the cattle in particular, unless absolutely necessary. We are however, putting hay out for everything and you might wonder why when there is so much grass – it basically gives the animals dry roughage which can reduce the possibility of the very wet grass going straight through from one end to the other.....if you know what I mean!! Lameness in my sheep is a bit of a problem but we keep on top of it as required. So if you see a lame sheep in one of our fields and it has a large red spray mark on the leg in question, we have treated it – a very simple but easy method to let everyone know what's what.

By the time you read this we will all be looking forward to 2020 and it is certainly going to be an interesting one but let's hope a really good one.

Disturbing the ground was just what they wanted and they came within inches of our hands uttering a delightful contented sub-vocalisation, which in some ways reminded us of the sound of a cat purring.

# Payhembury Weather

**Rainfall:** November continued the trend of above average rainfall with nearly twice the normal amount although December has so far been closer to the norm. The fields are now saturated. A hail storm on 14 Dec caused the Exeter Chiefs to pause their game for a while.

**Temperatures:** The temperatures for both months have been close to the average and so far we have avoided icy roads with only a few frosty mornings.

**Weather elsewhere:** The bush fires in Australia continue around Sydney with residents choking on the pollution, fire alarms activated etc. In Iceland a 'bomb cyclone' on 11 December closed most of the roads with heavy snow and high winds. The death toll is still rising after the eruption of New Zealand's White Island volcano.
