Rectory notes October 2020 – Three short words

How often in a typical day do I 'judge' someone? Many times, probably. There's the car driver who's too fast / too slow (compared to my own perfect speed, of course). There's the inconsiderate neighbour – not that I've ever been one myself. The Government gets a good dose of my judgements on their decisions. And the Opposition. And the judgemental person on social media. I could go on.

Three short startling words of advice Jesus gave us: 'Do not judge'. Is this perhaps his most overlooked instruction? Yet it's one I see increasingly as being of the highest value, even central value. The words are given not stridently, but gently, advisedly, even imploringly.

What did he mean? He's clearly not referring to the vital role of a judge in a court of law. Nor is he speaking of the judgements of situations and people we need to make to form views of the world and guide wise action.

What we see instead is Jesus himself not judging the people he met – their history, their past decisions, even the way they lived their lives. Ironically it was the religious leaders who did this, feeling they had a platform to do so. No, he took everybody as they were, never mind their past, and gave them assurance in the present and hope for their future.

In doing so, he invites us not only not to judge other people, but also not to judge ourselves. How easily regret of a past decision, guilt for a past action, or simple self-recrimination can burden us, even for years. 'Do not judge yourself,' says Jesus too.

Jesus is revealing God's character. He doesn't judge – at least not as we often think. Judgement – and justice – are for him about restoring and reconciling, not recrimination. 'Do not judge' steers us away from harming relationships and ourselves.

I suspect I may be not alone in jumping rather readily at times on my high judging horse! We're human, it can be hard not to. Meanwhile I'll practise making my driving less perfect compared to everyone else.

The route follows public footpaths with some road sections, so please follow the country code and the highway code. High vis. jackets are recommended. The Route is roughly 9 miles

Leave Payhembury Village Green between 9 and 10am. Upon registration you will be given a map and description of the route. If you wish, you may of course do only a part of the route, starting at any point but we hope you will join us at the end in Payhembury. As the road from the eastern end of Escot Drive to Toolgate Corner, Feniton, is particularly narrow and busy with traffic, we have special permission from Colin Gibbins to walk inside the hedge in his fields for this morning only. Directions will be marked on the map. The route map and description will be on the village website, so you can study it in advance www.payhembury.org.uk.

We now have Langage Farm yoghurt and ice-cream in the shop, it's made with milk from Jersey and Guernsey cows near Plymouth and is proving very popular. The ice-cream comes in many luscious flavours, try the white chocolate and raspberry..... mmmm! It's good to see that local companies are considering ways to reduce the use of plastic packaging, Langage Farm fruit yoghurts come in dinky little glass jars which you can recycle or re-use.

In September we had a visit from our MP Neil Parish. He came to find out more about our difficulties getting supplies from our large wholesalers over the last few months and to reassure us that he is working to try and avoid the same problems happening in the future. Thank you to everyone who wrote to him on our behalf, I think he received a lot of emails from Payhembury. The beautiful fresh flowers grown by Jenny and Tom in Colestocks have now reached the end of the season but will be back next Spring giving us all something lovely to look forward to.

Towards the end of this month we are expecting more local beef from the Slade Farm herd in the village. Last time this sold extremely quickly so please keep an eye open for the notices in the shop and on our Facebook page so you can be sure of getting your choice of tender, tasty, grass-fed South Devon beef.

Christmas Shoe Box Appeal 2020

In last month's magazine I said that more information about this year's appeal would be forthcoming, so here goes!

So much has happened this year and some people who have previously filled the children's Christmas shoe boxes have asked "Are we sure the boxes actually reach the children of Moldova and are not purloined by what has been described as a somewhat corrupt government"

To answer this question I have contacted the organisation who we support which is Christian Response to Eastern Europe (CR2EE), and asked again the question. Hugh Skudder the main front man, behind this charity, which is based in Exmouth and completely run by volunteers, assured me yet again the answer is yes. Hugh came to the church when we first started sending boxes and gave a talk on the charity and the measures they take to organise the delivery to Moldova and the distribution of them to the children. The people who distribute the boxes are known and trusted by the charity. Hugh went on to say that if further assurance was needed we could provide his telephone number for a one to one chat with any concerned donor.

To quote from their summer newsletter "As a charity we pride ourselves on being very "hands on". We know all the families we help and every project we are involved with. We visit often to ensure we are achieving all we can".

Another point raised by some people is that at this time we, the community, should be giving to our own UK children and not to children abroad. I can understand this point of view, all needy children should receive help but it is an individual's decision as to which charity they support. If CR2EE is not their choice I am sure other UK charities would welcome Christmas gifts. Meanwhile our three local churches will currently continue to support CR2EE.

A few pre covered shoe boxes may be available but if you can please cover your own. Mark on them the age group and gender to which the contents apply. Rather than buy warm hats for the children I have a plentiful supply made by our Knit and Natter group as well as knitters outside the Parish.

Should you be unable to shop for items and wish to donate money instead I will purchase items on your behalf, or if you are unable to completely fill a box give me the items you have and I will make up boxes from smaller gifts.

I will be delivering all the boxes to the CR2EE store so if you could let me or Becky Gammon have them by the very latest by **Saturday 31st October** as they have to be with CR2EE by the 4th of November.

I know the charity and the Moldova children appreciate all you do so I thank you on their behalf.

Paul's Nature Notes August/September 2020

I feared for our House Martins when those August storms hit. All my fears proved to be needless, however, as somehow the parents found enough insects to feed their young, a small miracle in itself. As their poo piled up beneath the nest, they prospered and by mid-September they fledged, all returning to the nest for one last time late one evening. The next day they were gone, soon to start their long migration to Africa. How I miss their quiet “chuntering” and am looking forwards to their return next year.



I much regret to report that there will be no Payhembury honey on sale in the shop this year. We have only managed to harvest some from one of our hives, barely enough to cover our own needs but we are really hopeful that matters will improve next year. Our second hive, which was so productive last year, lost its old queen but she was replaced and the workers are now busy building up sufficient reserves to see them through the winter. We managed to capture three swarms this year, but two of them have failed. The trouble with many swarms is that the queen is often too old to survive very long and she can leave behind a weakened hive which does not have sufficient resources to survive and can, as was the case here, fall prey to swarms of wasps, which seem to have been around in huge numbers this year. On the other hand the third swarm has prospered and the hive is building up really nicely in size. This means that with three hives on the go and disbarring any further setbacks the future looks brighter for next year.



The trial wild flower strip I told you about last year did really well, which has encouraged me to expand the area for next year. More seeds have been purchased from Goren Farm and sown and I am hoping that germination will be as good as earlier this year, especially for the Yellow Rattle, which has done really well.



Another success has been our Joe Pie Weed, which we bought from High Garden Nurseries in Kenton, my favourite nursery in Devon by a long shot. This plant is tall, up to 8ft or so, and is covered by a mass of frothy pink and white nectar-rich flower heads greatly loved by butterflies and bees.

Rainfall: Taking August as a whole there was nearly 3 times the usual rainfall with the biblical rain on 13 August ending the heatwave and there were some other decent downpours later in the month. September has been pretty dry for the first 3 weeks.

Temperatures: August was warmer than average mainly due to a heatwave around 11 August which lasted a few days with near record temperatures at 31.9 degC. The middle of September has also produced some very warm days for September reaching 26.9 degC on 14th.

Weather elsewhere: Several Typhoons in the Pacific have been affecting Japan and the Korean peninsula. Typhoon Maysak sank the Gulf Livestock 1 cargo ship which was carrying 43 crew members and 6,000 cows with many drowned. Elsewhere 2 million acres were burned by wildfires in California which surpassed all-time records set in 2018 and there were several fatalities. The smoke from the fires was seen as far east as New York. In contrast Hurricane Sally has caused serious flooding in the southern U.S.

Allotments, car park, football pitch and the Watermeadows

Thank you to everyone who submitted their views and thoughts about the idea of possibly putting allotments, a car park and/or a football pitch on the Watermeadows site. Thank you also to those who attended the Parish Council meeting on 9th September to give their comments and thoughts. At the meeting the Chairman gave a brief explanation of the current position which is that the land had been offered as a gift to the parish as a potential solution to a perceived requirement for allotments, car parking and a football pitch, that free pre-planning advice was sought from EDDC to see if the idea was feasible and that the Parish Council is now at the stage of engaging with the parish to find out people's views about the use of the site for any or all of those ideas.

There was a wide-ranging discussion between Councillors and members of the public covering the suitability of the site, the need for each of the three ideas individually, the need to adhere to the Neighbourhood Plan and the need for the Parish Council to seek further views from the parish. The requirement to engage with the wider parish and especially with age groups not currently well represented was stressed, as was the need to improve engagement with the parish generally.

The requirement to consider the provision of allotments has already been established, with a waiting list of nine people so far. There has been a long-standing issue with parking in the village (which was also raised as part of the Neighbourhood Plan) but the level of need has not been quantified. The requirement for a full-size football pitch has not yet been established. The Parish Council have decided to set up a working group, to include volunteers and representatives from village organisations, to look into the requirements for each of the three ideas with car parking as the top priority. If you are interested in being involved with the working group please let the Parish Council know (payhemburypc@googlemail.com). If the final decision is that the site is not suitable for any of the three ideas, or that there is no requirement for any of them, then the area will remain as farmland.

Bonfire night and Fireworks

It is that time of year again when Bonfire Night is approaching and, with it, fireworks. Last November I was contacted by people with various concerns, including not knowing fireworks were going to happen, how long firework displays went on for, how late they happened and the debris from the fireworks landing in peoples gardens (in one case the stick was embedded very deep in the ground so could potentially have punctured the flat roof of the nearby extension if it come down a few feet from where it did). If you are planning to set off fireworks this year, please could I ask that you let your neighbours know in advance, especially those with pets. Thank you.

Volunteers wanted - to help with filling sandbags and maintenance of the bus shelters, etc

The Parish Council are looking for some volunteers to help with a couple of things that need doing in the parish. Firstly, the Parish Council has a supply of sandbags for parishioners to use when there are issues with potential flooding. All of the full ones were used during the downpour back in August and the empty ones now need filling with sand in preparation for the next event. East Devon District Council are supplying a batch of empty bags in early October and Rob Leach is providing the sand. If you would like to help with filling sandbags in readiness for the next flood, please can you let the Parish Council know so a suitable date or dates can be arranged.

Secondly, the bus shelter and fencing at Waterloo Plot and other wooden structures need some maintenance, including cleaning and painting the wood with suitable preservative. Developments on making Ottery St Mary and surrounding communities Dementia Friendly

The progress to achieve this goal has not developed quite as planned but we have worked on various aspects of the project which includes:

- The open event held at The Institute on March 7th which was well supported locally with representations from many professionals and local providers. One of the outcomes was the need to provide more support for those who care for those with Dementia, meeting times for carers allowing them to still pursue aspects of their previous life, a trip to the pub, attend a much loved book club, a walk along the river the ideas are endless. This often is only able to occur if there is someone to sit with their loved one. The OHS offers such a service. So you see things start to become joined up!
- Working very closely with Ottery Help Scheme, The Ottery St Mary and District Health and Care Forum, The Coleridge Medical Centre, East Devon Community Network, Rowan and Linden and other statutory services and other providers and small groups in our communities who support our residents in OSM and the surrounding villages served by The Coleridge Medical Centre.
- Setting up the training for a group of volunteers this came about through the dedicated work of the Ottery St Mary Health and Care Forum. The training, funded through the Imagine If initiative has been offered to 8 local volunteers. Whilst the current situation prevented us from meeting physically we soon became competent Zoom users until relaxation permitted us to meet at a distance and further our training. The impact of Covid-19 on our community has led us to appreciate while Dementia Friendly status is our initial aim, there is a role for this group to develop further with scope to promote communication with those experiencing a wide range of issues and assist to direct them to specialist support or voluntary providers who offer a helping hand at difficult times. We are not a group of experts but we all come with experience from our lives; some with a professional background, personal experience or just an interest to improve the way we support and communicate with those in our communities. The training is nearing completion we are now preparing materials to circulate with prompts, such as how can we all support those in our community who are experiencing difficult times?, how to start conversations with those who are feeling vulnerable where to signpost them to support mechanisms and being that friendly face, something we can all take on board! We will in the next few weeks be completing the preparation of materials, being approaching retailers and businesses to support the launch of the publications and in time offer some get together sessions to share what we have learnt.

Axminster, Seaton, Honiton and Sidmouth have all worked in a similar way through the Imagine If programme each focusing on a different aspect of community need it is proposed eventually to share information and materials to benefit all in our communities.

Most important is whichever direction we move it is in conjunction with well-established charities, statutory providers and the voluntary sector and local businesses.
