## Rectory notes for November 2020 – A Silent Remembrance

2020 has been different in so many ways. So let us make our village Remembrance commemorations this year different too. Let us make it a 'Silent Remembrance'.

Silence: the silence of a First World War battlefield when the guns have ceased and the scattered dead lie still. The silence of a COVID intensive care ward, save for the wracked oxygen aided breathing. The silence of grief of loved ones, bereaved by war or by disease. The silence of a peaceful country lane with wayside summer flowers mingled with birdsong, more still this year in lockdown. The silence of sunset, as the blazing orange ball slips below the horizon to close the day. The silence of dawn, light wordlessly welcoming the day's new life.

We can gather on Remembrance Sunday this year as is customary in our public spaces in Feniton and Payhembury at 10.55am (provided Government rules remain as they are when this goes to press). But we can't gather in our usual manner. In Payhembury, as a public gathering, household groups (or six at the most) are not permitted to interact. Across the green and the road, we must distance. In Feniton, we will gather within the churchyard, offering a more open space than the lane, similarly distanced and separate.

We cannot gather in our usual manner. So let us do so silently. Not that Remembrance is ever a chatter-y affair. But this year, let us come together in silence, and hold this silence throughout, save the liturgical words of Remembrance. Let us allow the Two Minute Silence to sit within a broader ocean of stillness.

Some will wish to stay distanced in their homes, and mark silence there. Some will wish to continue into the church for the Remembrance service. These services too will be the same yet different. Social distancing and the absence of permitted congregational singing offer a poignant symbol of our connection with all who are distanced by death and lie in peace. Fewer people will be possible in our churches. But we can still commemorate together, gathered or not.

'And after the fire a sound of sheer silence...'. It wasn't in the earthquake, wind or fire that God spoke to the ancient prophet Elijah in a transformational moment. It was in the silence. Silence embraces the deepest of pain like no words can. And from its stillness beauty and new life arise too. Let us this year mark a Silent Remembrance.

## Remembrance Sunday 8th November, 10.55am on the village green

Remembrance Sunday falls on Sunday the 8<sup>th</sup> of November and, as normal, the church is organising the wreath-laying ceremony at the Village's War Memorial at 10.55am, followed by a church service. If you are planning on attending the ceremony at the War Memorial, please remember the Government's rules about social distancing and ensure your household group of 6 or fewer people maintains a 2m distance from all other groups. The Government's legislation that came into effect on 14<sup>th</sup> October 2020 places Payhembury in a Tier 1 (Medium) area. Even if this is raised to Tier 2 or Tier 3, the Remembrance Day commemorations can still go ahead as this is one of the exemptions listed with regard to gatherings.

If at all possible, could you please avoid parking near the War Memorial between 10am and midday on Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> November and minimise any vehicle movements during the event. Thank you.



## News from Payhembury Provisions

The government's mantra of Hands, Face and Space is of course important, but a few months ago who would have thought that Keys, Contactless card and Mask would be essentials on everyone's 'things to remember when going out' list?

Whilst we can't help much if you forget your keys, we do have ideas to help if you forget the other two. Most of you will know by now that we have a simple and convenient accounts system for customers, but if you are new to the village we should probably explain; you just need to come into the shop, sign the paperwork and you will have an account set up in your name with £100 credit to spend in the shop.

At the end of each month, or sooner if you have reached your limit, we ask that you pay off your account. We are also able to take card payments over the phone if you can't come into the shop to settle your account at the end of the month. No more worries about forgetting your card or cash, you can let a trusted family member use your account and you can keep a track on your spending over the month.

If you forget your mask, and it's bound to happen to the best of us sometimes, please don't come inside the shop but just wave to one of our volunteers and when they have a minute they will be happy to bring your shopping outside to you. Putting it on your account will be easy or you can pay with cash.

Eat, Treat and Greet is going to be important to get us all through the next few months. At Payhembury Provisions we have a great selection of fresh fruit and vegetables as well as local meat, eggs and cheese for home cooked meals, and pies, pizzas and frozen food for when you are pushed for time.

For treats, and heaven knows we all need them at the moment, we recommend hot buttered crumpets or toasted tea cakes, hot chocolate and a nice packet of biscuits, maybe Maple, Pecan and Dark Chocolate digestives, or perhaps you are veering more towards the good bottle of wine with a few cheese and sesame crackers or a handful of Kettle crisps?

Perhaps the most important bit of Eat, Treat and Greet for us all is Greet. We aim to make our shop a place where everyone is warmly welcomed and we will do our best to help each other through the coming months by continuing to deliver shopping to anyone who has to isolate and by providing a safe, friendly, convenient and well-stocked place to shop for everyone.



## 'Medium tier': What does it mean?

The government's new three-tiered system of local COVID alert levels is now in force in England. Devon is at 'medium' alert level. According to Devon County Council, this means:

- You must not socialise in groups larger than 6, indoors or outdoors (other than where a legal exemption applies)
- Places of worship remain open, subject to the rule of six
- Exercise classes and organised sport can continue to take place outdoors, or indoors if the rule of six is followed.
- You must wear a face covering in those areas where this is mandated

You should continue to:

- follow social distancing rules
- work from home where you can effectively do so
- when travelling, plan ahead or avoid busy times and routes. Walk or cycle if you can.

# Paul's Nature Notes

September/October 2020

Following on from last month, we have suffered the loss of yet another bee hive. This one was overwhelmed by huge numbers of wasps, which have proved so troublesome this year. So, we are now down to just two active hives!

Those August storms also hit us badly, as we have lost two old favourite apple trees. They were both leaning over at an angle of 60° and were far too large to make any recovery feasible, but the apples have been harvested and the wood is now being seasoned in readiness to use in our log burner.

Andrew and Cherry have been telling me how much they dislike the tractor-driven flail machines that give the local hedges such a severe cutting and prevent any trees growing up out of them. Hedges cut this way are not at all ideal for wildlife and in particular their dormice who feed on brambles, hazel nuts and hips amongst other things. Andrew has decided not to cut the tops of theirs and he is going to leave selected trees in his hedges. The proposed ELM (Environmental Land Management) scheme that will replace the CAP will pay for environmental protection and enhancement and Andrew is hopeful that local farmers will also be aware of this and take action.

Do you remember this time last year local buzzards were grouping together in the large field close up to Colestocks and were visible quite close up from the path? We walked the "Upton Loop" the other day and this year they are gathering in large numbers in the recently planted large field to the north of the village, mainly juveniles judging from their generally paler plumage.

A bright yellow and black caterpillar turned up recently. It turned out to be a larva of the Pale Tussock moth with its really hairy abdomen and red 'tail' stuck out at one end, so no touching!



One of the pleasures we enjoy is sitting eating meals in our conservatory overlooking one of our garden ponds, which attracts all manner of wildlife. One October visitor was a female Southern Hawker Dragonfly, which began ovipositing, not in the water but on the wood log roll edging the path, which is nicely porous.

After the eggs hatch, the nymphs will live in the pond for up to three years; then when the adults emerge from the exuviae life expectancy is only a matter of a few weeks.

During this time, the adults will only have one thing on their minds – to reproduce and secure their genetic future.



## Tales from Yellingham Farm



It's October...it's really exciting, and it all kicks off at Yellingham Farm. I expect most of you are thinking a big party, a celebration, a celebrity coming to stay at the B and B. It's much more exciting than any of those events.....it's time to put the rams in! Please don't be disappointed and stop reading because it really is an exciting time when that circle of life for the sheep starts again in earnest, and who knows you might learn something.

But of course, before we put the rams in with the ewes, normally around early October, there is a little bit of shopping to do and that's something that even Amazon can't provide or deliver – a new ram, or in the trade we call him a “Tup”.

This year, I was only in the market for a new Black Welsh Mountain ram and of course, where are the best ones bred?... Wales of course. The Main Show and Sale in Monmouthshire came and went, and I was still without what I wanted. So, what did I want?

When buying a ram there are 3 vital things you need to consider. I always liken it to a MOT on a car, but I call it the 3 Ts. Let me explain.

The 1st “T” is for teeth – sheep only have teeth on the bottom and a pad/gum on the top and it is important that the lower teeth hit the top pad just back a little so they can graze well – if his teeth are too far forward or too far back, it is a big NO. Dodgy teeth in any male – definite NO!

The 2<sup>nd</sup> “T” is for toes – well feet really. A

ram must have good sound feet given that in the next 6 weeks of his life serving his ladies, he will spend a great deal of time balancing on his back legs – enough said!

OK.... the 3<sup>rd</sup> “T” needs no further explanation. What I am about to write is absolutely true, so please do not be embarrassed and read on. They must be nice and large, of an equal size and firm to the touch. Phew. Done.

I was lucky enough to find just the boy I was looking for at a fabulous small farm near Bristol and collected him this week. We pasted a lovely orange gunge type paste on his breastbone and let him into the field with 14 Black Welsh ewes. No one was more excited than me...well for about 5 minutes when “Colin” was definitely more excited than me and set to his task with gusto. The gestation period is 147 days or thereabouts, so we should start lambing early March 2021.

So when you walk past the farm and see ewes with a lovely orange bottom, you know that “Colin” has been a good boy!

PS Some 40 years ago as a newcomer to shepherding, when I first learnt of the absolute need for vigilance when selecting and buying rams, I happened to pay a rare visit to my Doctor. He was always interested in my activities on the farm and when I explained about the 3 Ts he smiled and said.... “In terms of the most important “T”, the human male isn't so complicated – any shape or size will do!”

## Reporting road and other issues

With winter approaching, it is likely that you may find things around the parish that need fixing, be it potholes in the roads, blocked drains, dodgy streetlights or various other possible issues.

Many of these things are the responsibility of either East Devon District Council (EDDC) or Devon County Council (DCC) to fix and both of them have online ways for you to report them. I have tried to bring together as many of these links as possible onto one 'Report It!' webpage on the Parish Council's website - [www.payhemburyparishcouncil.org.uk/Report\\_It!\\_28626.aspx](http://www.payhemburyparishcouncil.org.uk/Report_It!_28626.aspx)

For EDDC, you can report noise, smoke or light pollution issues, or problems to do with rubbish or recycling not being collected or concerns about dogs or dog poo bins.

For DCC, you can report potholes, overgrown vegetation, faulty streetlighting, defective road markings or signs, empty or damaged grit bins, debris or obstructions on the road, issues with public rights of way or fallen or hazardous trees.

Please let me know if you are aware of any other links that I can add to the webpage. Please report any issues you find using the above links or by sending the information to me ([payhemburypc@googlemail.com](mailto:payhemburypc@googlemail.com)) and I'll submit it for you. Hopefully the more times things are reported the sooner they can be fixed.

# Payhembury Weather

**Rainfall:** There was a lot of rain at the end of September and beginning of October (due to Storm Alex), but overall September had only half the normal rain whereas the first two weeks in October had twice the rain.

**Temperatures:** September was a very warm month with a record 26.9 degC reached on 14<sup>th</sup> September. In contrast so far, October has been a cool month with a near air frost on 10<sup>th</sup> October.

**Weather elsewhere:** The UK had its wettest day on record after Storm Alex hit with enough rain falling to more than fill Loch Ness. Saturday 3 October, the day after the storm, was the wettest day in records dating back to 1891. The Met Office issued an amber warning and the river Brue in Somerset flooded. In contrast, California's year of wildfires has spawned the first "gigafire", a blaze spanning 1m acres, in modern history.
