Weather for April 2022

Rainfall: A dry month with less than half the usual rainfall in April. There were only 8 days of any significant rainfall. More recently the 1st of May did at least have over 6 mm of rain but since then May has continued the fairly dry weather up to 15th May.

Temperatures: Another very warm month for daytime maximum temperatures but cooler than normal at night. There were 7 nights of air frost with the 2nd and 3rd April down to -3.5 degC which caught my hydrangeas.

Sunshine: January and February were average for sunshine but March and April have been above average.

Weather elsewhere: The east coast of Australia is continuing to experience flooding this time in Queensland. Rapidly moving bush fires in California are destroying many homes and large-scale evacuations of residents. Major dust storms hit large parts of Iraq, including the capital Baghdad, in early May turning the skies over the country orange and causing respiratory problems hospitalising many people.

Paul's Nature Notes

At a recent parish council meeting a few of us were treated to an intriguing talk about the Poffit Lane Rewilding Project. Now, like many others I have heard about herbal leys but had never actually seen any. What an incredible rich habitat they create, an absolute haven for insect and birdlife and when cut the fodder provides a far superior food source for the cattle that feed on it. The use of flails on most of the hedgerows will now be curtailed, which means that the hedges should thicken out and grow upwards, again to the benefit of all the wildlife in the area.

The planting of new hedges has commenced with 2,000 assorted whips and a further 3,371 hardwood trees have been planted, mostly along the wet flood plain. A combination of drainage pits and a series of leaky dams constructed from alder have significantly slowed the flow of flood water during periods of heavy rainfall at the same time filtering out sediments and greatly reducing soil erosion. This has meant that by the time this water enters the Tale it is almost crystal clear. The beavers and otters will love that!

On the home front we are going flat out preparing for the village open gardens in aid of Devon Hospiscare in early July. A lot of careful plant selection has been

carried out with the candelabra primulas since the last time we opened and I have been delighted with starting to build up stocks of beautiful pastel coloured varieties, other than the more usual lavender or mauve ones. The astilbe collection has also been greatly extended with now more than 40 different varieties and these should be at their peak in July.

We have also been delighted to watch a female blue tit building a nest in one of our bird boxes which has a camera, and now feeding the hatchlings – only a mother could love these birds at this stage. Breaking news as we go to press, our house martins have returned – All is well with the world!

With the help of a small dedicated group of wildflower enthusiasts the project to record all the flora and fauna of the parish is progressing well, but there is always room for many more helpers. Is there anyone with a bird list in the Tale and Hembury Fort areas? If so please do let me know (I can be contacted on paullister175@gmail.com). I am also always interested to hear of any unusual wildflowers in any of the lanes.

It's quite likely to be June by the time you read this, I'm not sure where the time goes and I've just heard that mother is already working on next Christmas's hand illustrated Christmas card! Whilst we haven't had a home game

just yet the Miller's whites were first seen this year as far back as 20th April, when we made the short trip to Clyst Hydon on a beautiful sunny evening, ending in a three run defeat but more importantly some jolly tasty hot dogs being served up. Runs for Jason Wood, Sam Franks and Jon Pengelly and two wickets for "Hammer" Hammett. One of our number also bowled out a poor little nine year old and when questioned his only defence was "well he's a very good batter" – pretty poor really! (The bowler in question is old enough to remember bowling out his father and even his grandfather). Clyst Hydon 152-4, Tale Millers 149-7.

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Playpark Improvements update

The new toddler area is due to be installed in the playpark in the week commencing 13th June. Some of the existing equipment (the rotator pole and the teen multiplay unit) will need to be removed for now to make room for the new equipment. This preparatory work is expected to happen on Sunday 29th May so there will be about a two-week gap when the playpark has less equipment than normal.

Once the toddler area is completed, work can start on raising funds towards phase 2 of the playpark improvements - the installation of a zip-wire. This was a popular request in the survey the Parish Council carried out a couple of years ago. Some funds may be available towards this, however, to access those funds, the Parish Council will need to check with teenagers in the parish that they still want a zipwire. If you have any suggestions for other ways of raising funds for phase 2, please let the Parish Council know.

Playpark bin

Despite assurances from EDDC that they would get their contractor to empty the bin in the playpark, this has not been happening. The contractor has again recently stated that it is not their responsibility to empty this bin. Whilst this is resolved, please can you take your rubbish home with you for disposal. In the meantime, the Parish Council has emptied the bin for now.

Payhembury War Memorial - Grade II listed

Earlier this year the Parish Council applied to Historic England for the War Memorial in the centre of the village to be added to the List of Buildings of Special Architectural or Historic Interest. Historic England undertook an assessment of the War Memorial and research into its history and recommended that that it should be included. On 13th May the Parish Council received notification that the Secretary of State has approved this recommendation and the War Memorial is now a Grade II listed monument. Halina's Herb Corner

Lemon Balm (*Melissa officinalis*)

Lemon balm is never far from my thoughts at this time of year, but it reminded me of its presence this morning when I almost tripped on a clump that is growing in between some paving stones in the garden. Yes it's time to start harvesting lemon balm...which means picking the top 3-4 leaves before flowering.

Like many Mediterranean plants, lemon balm was introduced to England by the Romans. A member of the mint family the leaves have an irresistible scent of both mint and lemon.

Known as lemon balm, it also goes by the names of bee balm and Melissa. The Latin name Melissa comes from the Greek word for honey bee – melittena as bees particularly love the plant's pollen. Since classical times, lemon balm has been grown near beehives, and the crushed leaves rubbed onto the hives to ensure the bees would never desert the hive. It seems that the scent contains similar chemicals to those found in bee pheromones..... who knew?!

Apart from the wonderful scent, why put up with this quite invasive plant?... there are many reasons, here are just a few...

Throughout history Melissa has been associated with the nervous system and has since been shown to be an excellent central nervous system relaxant. Traditionally taken for 'melancholy', we now know that the volatile oils found in plants like Melissa have a direct effect on the limbic system i.e. the part of the brain that controls emotional behaviour.

In addition to calming the nervous system, lemon balm also reduces spasms, so can be helpful with migraines, and is a must for nervous digestion as seen in irritable bowel syndrome (IBS).

Along with rosemary it was taken to 'strengthen the memory' currently researchers are looking into whether it could be beneficial in Alzheimer's disease.

According to Mrs. Grieve, 'lemon balm as a drink induces a mild perspiration, makes a pleasant, cooling tea for feverish patients, and, if used with salt, can be used to ease gout.'

An infusion of fresh leaves works as an effective antiviral against cold sores and can help reduce shingle flares.

Historically, it would have been given to calm heart palpitations, anxiety and diarrhoea: all symptoms of an over-active thyroid. Research has shown that Melissa inhibits the release of thyroxin from thyroid follicles meaning it can help with hyperthyroid conditions **but must be avoided in those with underactive thyroids.**

Fresh leaf infusions are the most effective way of using Melissa, but due to its limited growing season, the leaves can be carefully dried away from sunlight below 30°C. Stored in a paper bag, in a cool dry place the dried leaves will keep for a year until the next harvest is ready for picking.

Please remember because we are all unique, we can have different responses – do not replace medication. Always ask a qualified health professional if unsure.
