## Rectory notes – A community treasure

In reflecting last month on the life of Queen Elizabeth II, I drew on a fairy tale about an unbreakable thread laced as a daisy chain to appear unassuming. What other such threads give us continuity in our changing and turbulent world?

Marking Remembrance Day is one such. Some will gather at war memorials, and most of us will wear a poppy. Sacrificed lives are reverently remembered. But Remembrance Day is about our future as much as our past. We hold out our hopes that the vulnerable values of peace and freedom fought for will continue.

Welsh poet and priest R S Thomas wrote, in a poem drawing on a parable of Jesus, about treasure present and future – 'The bright field':

I have seen the sun break through to illuminate a small field for a while, and gone my way	on to a receding future, nor hankering after an imagined past. It is the turning aside like Moses to the miracle
and forgotten it. But that was the pearl	of the lit bush, to a brightness
of great price, the one field that had	that seemed as transitory as your youth
the treasure in it. I realize now	once, but is the eternity that awaits you.
that I must give all that I have	
to possess it. Life is not hurrying	

Our village churches are rather like this bright field, sometimes forgotten, yet then remembered as holding treasure. For some, the beautiful historic building is the 'pearl'. For others the pearl is the community of people. For many the building is a reminder of eternity, and of a life more radiant than now. Our church buildings are surely one of those threads that give stability. Yet they are vulnerable too. No central funds protect them for future generations – all income to maintain these listed buildings must be local.

We are hugely grateful to all who contribute financially to our local churches' upkeep. This is far from a good economic time to hoist a financial flag, and some won't remotely be able to consider this. But for those who can, I encourage consideration of a one-off donation, regular giving, or legacy in your will, to your parish church for future generations. A confidential conversation with the respective PCC treasurer\* will guide you. May our church buildings be treasure for generations to come.

## Payhembury Weather www.payhembury-weather.co.uk Weather for September 2022

**Rainfall:** Finally some precipitation in September giving above average rainfall for the month. The deluge on the 4 September contributed a lot but there were 14 days when it rained. The first half of October has resorted to being fairly dry.

**Temperatures:** As seems to be a trend recently, the daytime maximum temperatures are warmer than average for September and the night-time minimum temperatures are cooler than average. There was nearly an air frost early on 18 September and again on 11 October when the air temperature hovered just above freezing.

**Sunshine:** The Payhembury sunshine monthly totals for this summer revealed only August was significantly higher than normal with all the other months from May being around the average.

**Weather elsewhere:** Hurricanes are in the news this month. Fiona was exceptional in that it reached as far north as the Canadian Atlantic coast on 23 September with torrential rain and winds of up to 99mph, resulting in trees and electricity cables felled and houses washed into the sea. Hurricane Ian, a mega-storm, which passed over Florida on 29 September was devastating with 150 mph winds and took the lives of more than 100 people, causing tens of billions of dollars in damage, and changed the face of south-west Florida forever. It then moved into South Carolina causing more damage.

## **Payhembury Parish Council**

#### Meeting - Wednesday 9<sup>th</sup> November at 7.30pm

The next Payhembury Parish Council meeting will be held on Wednesday 9<sup>th</sup> November 2022 at 7.30pm. The meeting will be a hybrid meeting with members of the public able to attend either in-person in the Parish Hall or via Zoom (Meeting ID = 831 9897 3834; passcode = **560654; webpage =** www.zoom.us/join) or via telephone (contact the Clerk for details). #### Applications for a grant from the Parish Council

Each year Payhembury Parish Council award a number of small grants to voluntary organisations and groups that support the residents of the parish in various ways. #### Parking in the centre of the village

There are times when parking on the road, from the village green up to the school, leaves a lot to be desired. Events at the pub, church, school, village hall or swimming have all meant that at times there are increased numbers of vehicles trying to find somewhere to park. Some of these have parked dangerously on corners, causing other vehicles to swing out into oncoming traffic in order to get around the parked ones. At these times the risk to pedestrians is clear. The Parish Council have tried to get yellow lines painted around the corner opposite the village green, but Devon County Highways wouldn't allow it. They have also tried putting cones out to stop people parking in the most dangerous places, but these cones have often been driven over, removed or just ignored. They are currently trying to get a 20mph speed limit past the school so that, if (when) the worst happens, hopefully the outcome will be less severe that it might otherwise have been. There is little else the Parish Council can do at present, especially as many of the people who are parking in this way are not necessarily from the parish. If you are organising an event in the village that lots of people may need to drive to (and therefore need parking), please can you encourage them to park safely, or better still carshare to reduce the number of vehicles looking for somewhere to park.

#### Sandbags and flooding

The Parish Council has a supply of sandbags for when flooding issues occur. Some of these are stored at Lower House and the rest at Slade Barton. If you have need of any sandbags, please collect from either of these places or contact the Parish Council and they will arrange for you to receive them. #### Christmas Tree on the village green

Last year's Christmas tree on the village green was fantastic thanks to the hard work of Rich and Nan and their wonderful team of elves. The plan, like last year, is to put the tree up on the first Saturday in December with a grand switching on of the lights at 5pm on the same day (note the date on your calendar – Saturday 3<sup>rd</sup> December, 5pm).

The tree is coming from 'Higher Willand Farm Christmas Trees & Gift Shop', which will be opening for business on 12<sup>th</sup> November. ## Tips for Growing Larger Onions for next year ????

Onions grow well in cool weather, so plant now.

- Purchase healthy onion sets that are known for large bulbs.
- Space onion sets at least 6 inches away from each other so they have plenty of space to grow large bulbs.
- Before planting onions set, remove all rocks and hard soil from bed, dig a trench and fill with loose fertilized soil.
- Onions are heavy feeders and like lots of organic matter. Fertilize with lots
  of nitrogen or bone meal, add chicken or steer manure and some sand to
  the soil.
- Water frequently, at least an inch deep every other day but watch bulbs to make sure there is no sign of rotting. If rotting is noticed, remove rotting bulbs and reduce water.
- Remove weeds. Onions hate weeds, their roots can't compete with them so remove them frequently.
- As onions grow remove soil from the bulb, this helps the bulb form nicely round onions and also encourages growth.
- Once your onions have been growing for several months cut half the tops off, this will spark the onion to keep growing.
- As onions grow, sprinkle azomite on the soil bed and mix in around the onions. Azomite is a mineral and onions love it, they will grow like crazy when this mineral is added to the soil. You can do this throughout the season to help onions grow larger.

Halina's Herb Corner

## Apple (Malus domestica)

"Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness ....To bend with apples the moss'd cottage-trees, And fill all fruit with ripeness to the core;"

This beautiful verse has been coming to mind as I've been driving each morning to drop my son at Feniton Station. We lucky ones are currently drowning under the bounty growing and dropping off our apple trees. We are picking them, eating them, cooking with them, fermenting them, storing them, feeding them to livestock, giving them to anyone who doesn't say 'no' immediately....

I remember being surprised when I discovered that apples belong to the rose family, with more than 7,500 known cultivars. Indeed there are more than 2000 varieties grown in the UK alone, thanks to preserving our older, heritage varieties.

This popular and most commonly eaten fruit in the UK has been linked to healthiness for many years ... most of us will be familiar with the saying "an apple a day keeps the doctor away". Eating good food results in good health. This may seem contradictory when talking about apples in that they have high sugar content; but this is offset in the main by the fibre present resulting in a relatively low Glycaemic Index. This fibre is the soluble fibre – pectin, which evens out sugar peaks and troughs in our blood stream. In addition to slowing down the digestion of sugars, polyphenols - another constituent found in apples stimulate insulin receptors found on each cell in our bodies so improving their sugar uptake.

Pectin increases stool bulk aiding their passage, helping to reduce the occurrence of haemorrhoids and constipation. It also binds fats and toxins which are then excreted in the stools, meaning that less fat remains to potentially deposit in the arteries, thereby reducing the risk of heart and circulatory disease.

Soluble fibre remains undigested until it reaches the bacteria of the large bowel, known as the microbiome. We are only starting to discover their importance. Vitamin K is synthesised by these bacteria but they also make up a considerable part of our immune system and can even affect our mood. Being packed with anti-oxidants, apples can protect the whole body, including the ageing brain where free radicals can lead to degenerative conditions such as Alzheimer's and Parkinson's diseases. ...and these are only some of the health benefits ..

A word of caution – Eating an excessive number of apples per day may lead to weight gain and abdominal discomfort. Additionally consumption should be moderated if you are insulin or leptin resistant especially after a calorie rich meal, in this situation it's best to eat it as a snack or after exercise.

Please remember because we are all unique, we can have different responses – always ask a qualified health professional if unsure.



## Paul's Nature Notes September-October 2022

As September wore on reports were coming in about the lack of flocks of sparrows, which have in the past been such a common sight in our hedgerows. Ours seem to have had a reasonable breeding season, so perhaps the reason could be avian flu. Let us all hope that this is not the case.

As predicted last month, our second brood house martins fledged just before my birthday and are now probably well on their migration to their winter quarters. The strangest thing is that scientists do not fully understand this species' migration and do not know exactly where they go, although it is thought that their destination

could be somewhere in eastern Africa.

I love those calm, warm autumn nights. I generally check my moth trap just before retiring to bed and the garden at this time of day is so peaceful. Occasionally I experience a great wildlife treat, such as the one a few nights ago when I heard a tawny owl calling in our large ash tree and then moments later saw it flying over my head towards the village. One of these days I will get a photo....

I love my wildlife photography and never more so when I can approach really closely to a large raptor or an owl. I can still remember those days when to see a buzzard was really rare. They had been hunted almost to the point of extinction and the only location where you could be sure of seeing any was in rural Wales. They slowly started to return from the 1990s until now they are a common sight, and sound, here in Devon, but as for getting really close to them is quite another matter. A juvenile bird has been hanging around the garden for some weeks but on my birthday it settled on a climbing frame in the garden next door. I crept outside under cover of a hedge, found a small window in the foliage and got the closest shots I have ever managed – such a thrill for me!
