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Rectory notes - Garden tales

Isn't it wonderful how our gardens come alive in April! New buds, new green, new life. So a tale of two gardens, with two trees, and two choices.

The first garden? Mythical Eden, the perfect paradise – until the tears, that is. The tree? Befitting paradise, it bears its enticing knowledge-of-good-and -evil fruit. But the golden fruit, it turns out, complicates life more than we can handle. The choice? We opt to take our life in our own hands – what could possibly go wrong?

The second garden? Gethsemane, late one foreboding Middle Eastern night – the garden of God's tears. The tree? An ancient gnarled olive where a man kneels beneath, weeping. The choice? He offers his life into the hands of Another – "thy will be done," he cries into the darkness. But what could conceivably go right, in the face of such crushing odds?

The story twists, and there's a third garden, on the third day. No tree but a tomb. And the tomb does this garden proud! For from ground watered with the tears of God and of humankind bursts forth miraculous new life. The man steps out from the tomb, and the garden blooms with joy.

"An Englishman's home is his castle," we quoted last month – but an Englishman's castle is not complete without its English garden. Stately-home or Barratt-home, how we need our gardens. They mark our seasons, and watch our coming and going. They take our hopeful plant-growing efforts, and reward us with colour and delight (and a sprinkle of weeds for company).

"Thy will be done," we pray on automatic, "...but I don't truly mean it, for you know what I really want is my nearest to be well again" "Thy will be done?" we stutter, angry and confused at a world where evil's will appears to prevail.

But then we stop, and breathe. We breathe, and remember – and relax a little. For we've remembered what can happen when life is held in the hands of Another, even against the worst of odds. We remember which garden guides our story now – that garden of resurrection. Tears may have watered the ground, but new life has a miraculous habit of walking out of the tomb.

Payhembury Weather Weather for February 2023

Rainfall: February was a record dry month with only 13% of the normal rainfall. The few days of limited rain were on 21-23 February. On 8-9 March we finally had some significant rain of 30 mm which filled the rivers once more. Some of this fell as snow on the Blackdown Hills but Payhembury just escaped it.

Temperatures: The first half of February experienced some cold nights down to -5 degC but with warm days and the second half was very mild resulting in a near +3 degC anomalously warm month.

Weather elsewhere: In the U.K. snow caused disruption on 10 March with travel across the Pennines being difficult. Further afield Cyclone Freddy which formed off the west coast of Australia on 5 February travelled across the Indian Ocean becoming the longest lasting cyclone of up to 40 days after causing devastation in Madagascar and Mozambique by ping-ponging between them. It is being called a 'zombie storm' and is still active as I write this.

THE DEVON ARCHAEOLOGICAL SOCIETY SECURES OWNERSHIP OF PREHISTORIC HILLFORT WITH FUNDING FROM HISTORIC ENGLAND

The Devon Archaeological Society is delighted to announce their purchase of Hembury Hillfort near Honiton after almost a century of involvement with the site. The hilltop has been acquired to conserve its important archaeology and nature. The site was home to some of Devon's earliest prehistoric farming communities and, later, the Roman army. Historic England supported with a grant of £73,047 and will also help fund the management of the monument for the next three years

The Devon Archaeological Society is the new owner of Hembury Hillfort, an outstanding prehistoric monument near Honiton in Devon, having purchased the site with some of its own funds, alongside substantial donations from some of its Trustees and members, and with a £73,047 grant from Historic England. Hembury Hillfort survives in an exceptionally good condition. Its massive defences are well-defined and form a complete circuit. It offers valuable evidence about the lives, economy and landscape of Neolithic and Iron Age communities and the Roman military occupation of the South West. The purchase is the culmination of nearly 100 years of the DAS's close association with the hillfort, from early excavation to ongoing survey and site management.

Next steps

The DAS hopes to manage the site for its nature conservation as well as for its archaeological significance, and to this end has recently signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the Devon Wildlife Trust with a view to securing joint management. The DAS will work with Devon County Council, the Devon Wildlife Trust and the Blackdown Hills AONB Partnership to achieve this. Hembury Hillfort is open to visitors using public rights of way, as long as they respect its archaeological and nature conservation importance.

Managing the site

Historic England and the DAS, along with many partners and dedicated volunteers, have been involved in the management of Hembury Hillfort for many years. In 2008 Hembury was in poor condition with limited access, and it was added to Historic England's Heritage at Risk register. Following this, a Countryside Stewardship Scheme was agreed for the site, which secured funding from Natural England to support management works at the hillfort. Historic England also funded conservation works and other improvements, including new signage. Following years of careful conservation, Hembury Hillfort was removed from the Heritage at Risk register in 2018. The Society continues to organise working parties to control scrub growth as well as carrying out archaeological fieldwork.

Paul's Nature Notes - March 2023


Clearly my optimism last month that spring might be just around the corner was misplaced. Instead we have suffered more than our fair share of cold nights, many of them icy. This has not had as much impact on the frogs mating as I would have thought, with the first spawn appearing on February 19th, only five days later than last year. On the other hand, and far more worrying, we have only had two frogs in our pond. In previous years there have normally been around twenty. A disease causing mass deaths has arrived in this country and so it is to be hoped that this is not the cause.

Cold it might have been, but this brings many more visitors to our bird feeders and it has been really interesting to watch the different behaviours. In the past we have occasionally seen bramblings and serins when the weather turns really cold, but this year they have been absent. Rulers of the feeders are the numerous goldfinches – considering their small size they are really quite feisty. They will tolerate greenfinches, which after all are a lot larger and, to a certain degree, siskins but will quickly see off any chaffinches and tits. These birds are left lingering in the background until the goldfinches eventually decide that they have had their fill and move on to the next location. In the meantime, all the tits have learnt to only go the feeders when nothing else is there. Our long-tailed tits appear to be nest building and they have developed a taste for peanuts, which

most other birds now shun, preferring the higher energy sunflower seeds.

For us though, the real stars this winter have been a pair of bullfinches. We have seen bullfinches most years but only ever very fleetingly about once or twice and not that close to the house. This year has been different and we have watched how their approach to the feeders has

changed over the last month. Initially they were very nervous of all the other birds and kept their distance. They did not

Yellingham Farm

I have literally just walked in from the lambing yard having seen yet another beautiful pair of twin Jacob lambs being born. Even after 40 years of lambing, that moment of new life, never dulls. If I was lambing 2000 each year, maybe my feelings might be different.... for me, it's still magical. At this time, it always provokes memories of moments when lambing wasn't always quite straight forward, emotional, or just hilarious. Here are a few examples:

A Doctor, her family and another colleague, also a Doctor, were staying during lambing and one evening after we had served their dinner, they willingly suggested that I looked very tired and they would keep an eye on proceedings for the next hour or so I could enjoy my dinner. I couldn't have wished for better qualified replacements. I knew one ewe was likely to lamb soon as she hadn't eaten her evening ration and was showing "nesting" signs. A good hour passed and no call from the medics, so I decided to stroll down and check. Sure enough they told me that a ewe was lambing and all was proceeding well. I must admit it was a bit dimpsy down the yard, but my eyes soon focused, and it was patently clear that things were proceeding, but blinkin' backwards. The perfect presentation is 2 front feet and a nose...... what was before my eyes was a long tail. in other words a breach birth. I jumped over the hurdle into the pen, asked one of my doctors to come quickly and hold the ewe whilst I lambed it. All was well and we did laugh when I commented that before tonight, I would have trusted them both with my life – not quite so sure now!

Another couple from the big city booked a couple of nights specifically to experience lambing. Neither had been on a farm before and were super excited. When I saw the big shining BMW arrive at the farm gates, my heart sank. They bounced out of the car, clad in white jeans, matching Barbours and sunglasses. This was not going to work. Before I said hello, my beautiful sheepdog, Kit, welcomed this immaculate couple with all 4 paws and a lick! On no. Back came a hasty, giggling reply: "Don't worry, these are only our old clothes!" I don't think they even knew what old clothes were. "Hi, I'm Jane and this is Derek, and we are so excited – our friends think we are daft coming all this way to get muddy!".

Keen was an understatement. I've never seen my pens and yard so clean. But not one lamb was born. My guests were disappointed, but still smiling as they packed their car. I felt awful. One ewe must have also felt sorry for them, so she decided to produce a wonderful water bag. Thank Heavens! I rushed back to the yard where my guests were packing their car. Excitement was an understatement. The welly boots got unpacked, the smelly clothes back on. Said ewe, got up, laid, down, pushed a bit, shoved her head high in the air, showed her teeth, before a lovely black nose and a pair of front feet appeared. I sensed something wonderful was happening. Derek's head was bowed, he was quietly crying. I just walked away. Lambing is a very special time, but for Jane and Derek maybe this tiny act of birth meant something more to them. I offered a lamb to each of them to hold. I will never forget the genuine joy this brought to a truly wonderful pair of guests. Jane and Derek were childless.

To finish, I must of course mention my poor husband Edward, who is very supportive during lambing. (I know I am running out of words and the Editor of the PM will ask me to edit so I'll make this one quick!) When we have a ewe who produces a single, I always take advantage of the spare teat and milk off that beautiful first important milk called colostrum – liquid gold for new born lambs. I hastily put the thick creamy colostrum in the fridge for emergencies, should we unfortunately have a ewe with no milk, or just one teat working. To my horror, the following morning, my bottle of gold was missing and I asked Edward, had he used it in the night for a problem....... total silence. With a swift movement nearer to a sprint, he rushed up to the dining room just in time before the B and B guests came for breakfast and removed said "liquid gold" from the breakfast table. Disaster averted – perhaps I should have left it and seen if anyone noticed Ha!

Halina's Herb Corner

Willow Bark (Salix alba)

Willow is a much-valued tree that has been used for centuries throughout Europe for making baskets, fences, cricket bats, lattice work and burnt to make high quality artist charcoal.

However, Willow shot to fame in the 1760's when Reverend Edmund Stone began using Willow bark to treat his parishioners when they were suffering from any form of pain. Little did he know at the time that his discovery would pave the way for the development of Aspirin! Aspirin is now one of the most widely used pain relieving drugs in the world today, the chemical makeup of which is produced from components found in Willow bark!

Willow bark contains very high levels of salicylic acid which is clinically proven to block the production of a variety of chemicals in the body that produce inflammation and pain. Modern day Aspirin works in the same way as Willow bark.

To harvest; once you have found and accurately identified the Willow tree, cut off branches around finger thickness. Score a cut down the length of your harvested branches with a sharp knife, then slowly and gently peel off the inner and outer bark (this peels off incredibly easily). Cut the bark into 10cm pieces, then dry them in a warm, airy room until the bark snaps like kindling (this can take up to two weeks). Once dry, store the bark in airtight jars in a dry dark place.

Simply add 1-2 teaspoons of dried bark into a saucepan, pour over one and a half cups of cold water and bring the water to the boil. Once it is boiling, cover with a lid and simmer for 10-minutes. Then simply strain out the bark, pour the tea into a cup. Once the tea has cooled to drinking temperature add a little raw honey to sweeten as some may find it slightly bitter. Drink as needed to a maximum of 4 cups per day.

Please remember because we are all unique, we can have different responses, if unsure – always ask a qualified health professional.

Caution: Willow should not be used if you are taking blood thinning medication, if you have sensitivity to sulphates, by children under 18 or during pregnancy or breastfeeding.

Annual Parish Meeting - Parish Council Chairman's report

The Annual Parish Meeting was held at 7pm on Wednesday 8th March in the Parish Hall. Cllr Tim Cox, Chairman of Payhembury Parish Council, gave a report on things that have happened over the last year, which have included:

- Installation of a new toddler area in the playground
- Tree planting the last few Jubilee trees have been planted together with extra fruit trees in the Community Orchard
- Potholes & ditch clearing some potholes have been repaired by DCC Highways and some ditches cleared, but more work is still needed
- Paytherden Solar Farm at Tale / Clyst Hydon approved by EDDC Planning July 2022
- EDDC Local Plan development currently on hold awaiting guidance from central Government
- Litter bins the missing litter bin at the bottom of Hillside is still being chased, without much success
- River Tale pollution incidents there have been numerous incidents of sewage overflow on the River Tale. SWW are aware and are working on a long-term plan to address the issue
- Leat to Tuckmill Farm concerns were raised with the Environment Agency regarding the impact of the new leat on the wildlife in the River Tale
- Village War Memorial Grade II listing was confirmed on 13th May 2022
- Hembury Hillfort now owned by Devon Archaeological Society who are keen to preserve public access to the historic monument
- Blackdown Hills Parish Network Payhembury parish is now a member. The BHPN represents all the parishes wholly or partly in the Blackdown Hills AONB.
- Christmas Tree on the village green (thanks to a number of donations from businesses and individuals in the parish) this will now be an annual event
- Jubilee celebrations last June, death of Her Majesty in September and upcoming Coronation in May
- Defibrillator relocated onto the outer wall of Payhembury Provisions, making it more visible and easier to access
- Planning applications a quieter year with only 24 planning applications, ten less than the previous year

And projects for the coming year, which include:

- A new picnic bench for the playing fields
- New goalposts for the football pitch
- Fund-raising for an aerial runway in the playing fields
- Replacement of some or all of the parish noticeboards with better weatherproof ones
- A nature trail along the Colestocks to Payhembury footpath

Thanks were also given to Andrew Renshaw (Snow Warden), Tina Humby (Telephone Box Librarian) and Bill & Olwen Eaton (Payhembury village sign gardeners) for all they have done over the last year.
