Are you ready for the Christmas soundtrack – piped in the shops, looped on the radio, blasted by someone in your home, perhaps stirring old festive memories? Whatever our sentiment about Christmas being every day, it is upon us. Christmas – the Power and the Glory of it. Ah, but we've done that bit of the Lord's Prayer already. How about a hybrid Christmas song, then – "I wish it could be Christmas every day! Forever and ever! Amen!" The secular meets the sacred.

Perhaps this mixture isn't so daft, for we know Christmas is a hybrid – a mishmash of culture, commercialism, religion, tradition. Sometimes the mishmash is glorious, sometimes painful. A child's words perfectly captured such cultural collision (non-Christmas-y) in the comedy series 'Outnumbered'. Let's put all the mishmash in a pan – historic and present. Let's put it on the stove and boil it down to its concentrate. What is its essence? "Love came down at Christmas," as the carol goes. The Christmas concentrate? Love. As one of those adverts goes, "I would do anything for love." And He did.

Our year's journey through the Lord's Prayer is ended. But as for the magi, the end of a journey may be a new beginning, as the year wraps round. The closing words of 'I wish it could be Christmas every day'? "Why don't you give your love for Christmas." And He does. Forever and Ever. Amen.

#### Winter Plans for Snow and Ice Conditions on Payhembury Parish Roads

It may be tempting fate to remind ourselves that the parish of Payhembury has not seen any really significant snow for four years. Occasionally we can see a dusting of snow on Hembury Fort located on the edge of the parish but nothing like the 'beast from the east' in February 2018 Although there may be no snow, frost, causing icy roads, is a much more likely danger. However, we can take precautions such as preparing a snow plan, ensuring that our grit bins are full and that we have residents willing to help where possible.

Devon County Council (DCC) is responsible for clearing and gritting major highways such as the A373, the A30 and from there to the level crossing in Feniton. With more miles of roads than any other single county, DCC has a huge task to undertake

DCC expects Parish Councils to be responsible for the roads within their parish boundaries and they expect each parish to appoint a snow warden, snow warden assistants and to produce a Snow Plan. The Parish Council has therefore produced a plan and appointed a Snow Warden. We have some volunteer snow warden assistants in several areas and new volunteers are always welcome.

DCC help with the provision of salt / grit as necessary. Currently there are six yellow/green salt / grit bins located in the parish. Clearly it would be neither practical nor cost-effective to treat all 15 miles of our parish roads in icy conditions. It is therefore planned to concentrate on a few significant places such as around the centre of Payhembury Village or on steep sections of road. In prioritising our actions, particular attention should be paid to access and safety for emergency services, key workers, vulnerable persons and for livestock.

As we have neither a snowplough nor a grit spreader, we must rely on volunteers, wheelbarrows, shovels and, importantly, the cooperation of residents. Residents have a personal responsibility to consider the implications of bad weather and to take precautions. Drivers should consider:

- Deciding if your journey is essential. Could you walk instead?
- Choosing a route that is likely to be clear without steep hills.
- Driving with caution, ensuring increased distance between vehicles, as well as using gentle braking.
- Being prepared with warm clothes, strong footwear and a shovel.
- Never assuming that a road has been salted.

Parishioners should be aware that, in icy conditions, main roads such as the A373 may not be gritted, and they should therefore proceed with caution.



#### Weather for October 2023

**Rainfall:** Another very wet month but with most of it in the second half of the month with storm Babet on 18 October resulting in 21 mm and another unamed storm on 23 October with 33 mm. November also started very wet with storm Ciarán providing 44 mm of rain with some local flooding. We are on track for a record wet year.

**Temperatures:** October was yet another warm month overall with a temperature of 25 degC reached on 9 October. In contrast on 15 October the temperature dipped to just below zero giving the first frost of the Autumn.

**Pressure:** The "eye" of storm Ciarán passed over Devon at 4am on 2 November with an exceptionally low pressure of 955.8 mbar. The previous record for Devon being 959.7 mbar. Boiling a kettle at that time would only achieve a temperature of 98 degC due to the low pressure. We were lucky the storm did not pass further north which would have resulted in even stronger winds over Devon.

**Weather elsewhere:** Two storms have dominated the weather over Western Europe this month. On 18 October, Storm Babet hit Torbay, with a beach bar swept into the sea in Torquay and major damage to beach huts in Paignton and Teignmouth, where a seaside skatepark was flooded. On 1 November Storm Ciarán resulted in widespread damage with 100 mph winds reported in the Channel Islands and a tornado, while 1.2 million French households were left without electricity. In Devon, 250 schools were closed.

#### Paul's Nature Notes October-November 2023

It's that time of the year again when buzzards gather together in the fields. They seem to choose a different field every year. Last year it was one adjoining the back lane to Upton, the year before that they were over at Colestocks and this year they are in the field leading along the lane to the pig farms.

I have enjoyed photographing them mixed in amongst all those herring gulls and pigeons. Silhouetted along the edge of the ridge they appear huge and once again there is a very white individual amongst them. At first glance it is very easy to think

that it is something else – perhaps a herring gull or even more exciting a hen harrier, but no it is just a juvenile common buzzard. I say just but I still love to see them, especially when they come closer to the lane. There are now so many around us it is hard to accept that they were extinct in most areas in the UK until the late 1980s.

Our bird feeders have really not ben that busy yet. We tend not to feed the birds during the summer months and this mild but really wet autumn has meant that there is still plenty of food about. The tit families



have so far been getting it all their own way, as very few goldfinches have found us again, but doubtless they will in time and add us to their daily itinerary.

Our local owls seem to have had a good year and although I have yet to actually see them, I hear the little and tawny owls calling a lot in the garden and around the village. They are far more likely to be heard than seen, although some folk have been hugely privileged to see them perched up during the day. I hear them a lot when I check my moth trap before going to bed, often very close indeed, but still no photographs! There have also been several sightings of barn owls quartering some of the fields in search of voles and mice. It has been so wet that they may well have had a difficult time of things recently.

Fieldfares have started to arrive from Scandinavia but there have been no reports yet of any redwings. It has been a marvellous autumn for berries but those pigeons are extra busy scoffing the lot and so if the thrushes want any they had best be quick! News is coming in of a massive winter influx of waxwings, countless hundreds of them, all in search of berries. Some have ventured as far south as Cornwall but I have yet to see any — I live in hope.

# Sage (Salvia officinalis)



Christmas must be coming as I noticed various festive items appearing in the shops (well, some shops have been building their displays since September, but we won't go there!). One such item was sage and onion stuffing; Sage wasn't only used in stuffing for the flavour it imparts but was recognised as a very effective meat preservative dating back to the ancient Egyptians and Romans. Sage, Latin name *Salvia* derives from 'salveo' meaning 'to heal' or 'save'.

Sage originated from the northern Mediterranean, but being a hardy evergreen perennial, grows successfully in England. The main harvest time is just before it flowers, I pick the bulk then, and dry it for later use, but also make tinctures, infused oils etc at this time. However, if fresh leaves are required, they can be picked throughout the year. In fact, sage was my 'best friend' whilst I was experiencing menopausal symptoms (sorry guys). A very respected traditional herbalist advised me to grow a sage plant outside my back door and make a tea from it. When I asked "how much should I use?" he replied "as much as you need". I didn't think this was very helpful at the time, but found that I would go out on one day and pick a handful, whilst the next day I fancied just a couple of leaves — but each dose was perfect on that day. Once my symptoms passed, I no longer felt the urge to drink the tea.

Sage helped with the menopausal symptoms on 3 levels, in that it reduces secretions, sweating and flushing. It has a normalising effect on hormones including oestrogen, which incidentally explains why sage has traditionally been used to suppress lactation. Thirdly sage is restorative to the adrenals, which can become depleted in females as they reach middle age.

Being high in volatile oils, sage is very anti-microbial and is a key treatment for infections and inflammation of the mouth, tongue, or throat. Typically, a tea made from sage and steeped for at least 10 minutes (always covering the container to retain the precious volatile oils) is used as a mouthwash or gargle.

Being related to rosemary, research is supporting the traditional use of improving cognition and concentration... maybe this is why wise people were referred to as 'Sages'? Sage can help in convalescence particularly where depression and fatigue are experienced post illness.

Due to the high volatile oils' sage should not be used during pregnancy or during lactation (unless mother wishes to stop feeding). Extreme doses should be avoided.
