Rectory Notes - Nul Points

Long silver boots stride onto the stage. A glittering star-shaped guitar is poised to play. The dinner jackets and ball-gowns in the audience stir uncertainly. A Swedish female duo clasp their mikes, and launch – 'Waterloo!' A new name enters history: Abba. That was 1974.

50 years on, the full Eurovision programme was recently re-broadcast. What a step back in time. The crisp BBC accents. The polite audience. Bow-ties. Hand-driven score boards (entertainingly making occasional errors). Only 17 countries. Due to the death of President Pompidou, France had withdrawn, perhaps providentially with 'Waterloo' the winning entry. Pleasingly no artist got 'nul points'.

It's Eurovision month. Probably you either love the annual bonanza of music and merriment, the blitz of light and languages, or you hate it. Maybe you're one who scores at home, struggling by the end even to recall the early entries, and finding there's no accounting for others' musical taste. Some Eurovision things have changed since 1974. Eastern European countries were notably absent then. Yugoslavia featured, now multiple countries. The staging and lighting now give sensory overload. Other things remain the same. The event continues to be a swirl of cultural change. 1974 artists split between the ball-gowned/DJ-ed majority and 'pop' dress – times they were a-changin'.

The equivalent in today's Eurovision scene is perhaps the LGBT dimension. The dreaded 'nul points' still stalks the score-board; writer Tim Moore tells in a humorous 2010 book of tracking down all artists who'd scored zero points – some bounced back, others never recovered. All Eurovision artists are brave. Midst the cultural changes, you can still detect religious echoes reverberating in seemingly secular lyrics. "That's where I found my kingdom come," bookies' favourite, Swiss artist Nemo, will sing.

If nothing else, Eurovision seeks to be uplifting. It falls in the Easter season (something only a vicar would think of!). The uplifting song 'You Raise me Up' (most famously sung by Westlife) wasn't a Eurovision entry, but (music trivia alert) its composer won the competition twice. "When I am down and, oh my soul, so weary, When troubles come and my heart burdened be, Then, I am still and wait here in the silence, Until you come and sit awhile with me... You raise me up to more than I can be." The song resonates with resurrection. Aptly it was played at a recent funeral. Whether you do Eurovision or steer well clear, may 'You raise me up' be our Easter song.

Payhembury Provisions

Five months into the new year already and a lot has happened and equally a lot has stayed the same!

Some of the 'happening' things are on the shop suppliers list. It's an ever changing world out there and we have to go with the flow at times and at others we make changes based on feedback from customers.

To that end we have recently swapped our bread supplier to Ryders of Dawlish - not quite so close as the previous bakers but their bread is distributed by J&R Foods who come to the village regularly and were able to deliver Ryders bread pretty well when we want it. Do let us know what you think and if there's a particular bread you like, as their range is quite extensive.

Bread is a staple and one of the backbones of a village shop, we need to always have some ready for you fresh and warm - well warm's a bit tricky except at the weekend when we of course bake a range of croissants pastries and baguettes ourselves.

If bread is the backbone then milk must be the village shop's blood flowing in and out, round and round, and again you need us to always have the fridge stocked. We have swapped out our Cotswold milk (bit too many food miles there) for Roddas, a Cornish dairy... as with Cornish dairy products don't forget to put your sugar in your tea first before the milk, just like a jam scone!

Bits of Cornwall can be a long way away so to offset that there is Oak Park Milk - only a few miles distant in real glass returnable bottles (but pop the tops in your recycling).

So now we have a skeleton and a circulatory system, let's finish this analogy with the flesh and that in this case isn't the quality meat from Veyseys but the fruit and veg which is now supplied by Frank H Mann of Torquay, with regular deliveries and a great price point. You'll see we have reinstated the price per kilo board so hopefully no shocks at checkout.

Hopefully these three changes will be another improvement in what we offer to our customers and keep you coming back (and passing the word on to friends and family) because shopping locally is simply the best...

Paul's Nature Notes

March to April... All the recent relentless rain and low light levels have left many of us feeling somewhat under the weather... I have retreated to my bunker to sort through the photos I took on a recent trip to Panama, our first overseas trip in over 4 years due to Covid.

It is one of the most diverse countries for birdlife anywhere on the planet but the writing is most definitely on the wall, driven by the usual combination of massive habitat loss and climate change. There is a huge amount of road building going on, doubtless driven by a looming general election, but in a country with a total land mass of less than a third when compared to the UK and a total population of only 4.4m, one wonders just where these new roads are going to.

Indigenous tribes continue their destructive slash and burn practices which have always led to soil erosion in a very short time-span. The native forests are being felled on a massive scale and replaced with a monoculture of teak - simply miles of it in and under which little lives. The hardest part was to see ancient Cuipo trees, sometimes called the giants of the forest, mindlessly felled in inaccessible parts of the countryside where the wood was simply burnt in situ. Stubble burning is carried out on a biblical scale - we passed through one area where the front of the fire was several miles wide.

Seeing birds in tropical rain and cloud forests is not for the faint-hearted. It is a challenge, even more so should anyone be interested in photography. Lighting conditions are extreme and most of the birds are small, frequently only seen at a distance against harsh light or skulking deep inside dense habitat. The two standout stars of the trip were the King Vultures and a female Harpy Eagle feeding her chick on the nest. Most vultures are large black birds with little colour on them and to be frank, quite boring. The King, however, is completely different. It is massive, a predominantly white bird with a wingspan of 6.5ft having a face brightly coloured in hues of red, orange, yellow, brown and black. It is simply awesome! The Harpy Eagle has an even larger wingspan of almost 7.5ft but it only breeds every 2-3 years and both species are now endangered. I would not have missed the trip for anything but it was wonderful to get back to our spring garden bursting with blossom and alive with the sound of our local birds all intent on mating and nest building.

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Halina's Herb Corner

Chives (*Allium schoenoprasum*)... With everything bursting with vigour and life at this time of the year it is challenging to focus on one plant... so I decided to look at a very unassuming herb growing in a pot outside my kitchen door. Many of us have chives growing in the garden due to it being very easy to grow, appearing year after year, and for its use in the kitchen. We often just think of chives as something to sprinkle on a salad or add to dips, but it has so much more to offer.

Chives are the smallest member of the Allium or onion family. They are native to Asia, Europe and North America and have been cultivated for thousands of years. The Latin name means 'rush-like leek'. I particularly love the blue-purple flowers that are so characteristic of the onion family, which are a favourite of bees and attract other beneficial insects into the garden. Regularly picking the leaves ensures that the plant sends out fresh growth throughout the year. They can deter aphids, snails, slugs and mosquitoes.

In the kitchen the subtle flavour works well as a garnish, in dips, sauces and dressings, with egg dishes, in stir-fries and noodle dishes, and makes great herb butters. Although not as potent as garlic, its milder flavour makes it more accessible than other members of this family. It contains protein, carbohydrates, and fibre. It offers a good source of vitamins and minerals particularly potassium, calcium, phosphorous, vitamins C and K. One of the most important organic compounds found in chives is allicin, which has been linked to reduced levels of LDL cholesterol so improving heart health. When combined with the vasodilatory effects of potassium this herb can have a major impact on reducing cardiovascular strain. Furthermore, another organic compound, quercetin, has been directly connected to lowering cholesterol levels and plaque in the arteries. The high levels of vitamin C in this herb help boost the immune system by stimulating the production of white blood cells and stimulating the production of collagen, which is an essential component in the creation of new blood vessels, cells, tissues, and muscles.

Chives have mild diuretic properties and combined with the other potentially free-radical scavenging and antibacterial qualities; chives are a wonderful way to detoxify the body. By stimulating urination, chives can help the body get rid of excess toxins, salts, water, and even fat, keeping organs running smoothly and clearing out any dangerous substances that could do us harm. Caution: Chives are toxic to cats, dogs, and horses. And finally: Please remember because we are all unique, we can have different responses.
