PORK STEAKS/CHOPS IN ORANGE SAUCE 4 Pork chops/steaks 2 Tabs flour seasoned with salt/pepper 1 Tabs butter 1 Tabs oil 1 teasp ground ginger 1 Tabs soft brown sugar 2 medium oranges	Line a roasting pan with foil (saves sauce sticking to the pan). Coat chops with seasoned flour. Heat butter and oil and brown chips well on both sides. Arrange chops on lined roasting pan. Combine juice from the oranges, ginger and sugar and pour over chops. Cover with foil and bake at 190 degC for an hour. Put a couple of baking potatoes in the oven at the same time When you put your veg on to cook, take the top foil off the chops to brown further and make the sauce lovely and sticky
Can't bothered with that - how about: 4 Pork chops/steaks Dijon mustard Demarara sugar ALL INGREDIENTS AVAILABLE AT THE SHOP THIS WEEK	Coat pork chops in mustard and sprinkle with Demarara sugar, put in oven at 190 degC for 30 - 40 mins with potatoes (see below). Cut baking potatoes in half and hedgehog them without cut- ting through. Rub some oil and salt into them. Place smooth side down in same dish as chops.



PAYHEMBURY SPRING BULB AND FLOWER SHOW



Nature Notes Observations from March

Hello everyone

It's the 19th March, and both yesterday and today are good sunny days. The Spring flowers are growing well at last!

Since 1st March, the birds have been getting into Spring mode, chasing each other about and singing more enthusiastically. We're still getting some colder days, and it's important to continue feeding birds regularly. I have added fat balls to my feeders this year, and the birds love them. The trouble is that the bigger birds, like jackdaws and starlings get more than their fair share! We were very lucky to have both woodpecker species in our garden the other day, the green one and the greater spotted one (black, white and red).

At Tuck Mill in late February, I came across a pair of mistle thrushes and a pair of grey wagtails, getting ready for nesting. A lovely male yellowhammer on top of the hedge near the old football shed in Haskins Lane and a song thrush singing at Little Fort.

On 9th March, our garden was positively humming with birds---blue, great and long tailed tits, chaffinches, goldfinches and greenfinches, blackbirds, jackdaws, dunnocks, house sparrows, and two female pheasants. In the field beyond us, two male pheasants and no less than seven females (pheasants!). The males are starting to get aggressive towards each other, and we've witnessed a couple of fights!

I had a shock one evening just this side of Luton. I caught a glimpse of a deer right by the side of my car, so we both stopped dead. He then turned round and headed off in the opposite direction. I'm now particularly careful at that spot!

We learned of the very restrictive rules in force then in order to become a member, many of which have now been relaxed and the strong link with the Church, which of course we benefit from to this day. A heartfelt vote of thanks was given to our speaker.

GARDENING WITH ANGUS

Previous comments about the usefulness of some sort of garden frame or plant protection system have been more than fulfilled this past

four weeks. Despite the weather I have been able to plant my very earliest potatoes, plant out previously sown lettuce seedlings and


broad bean plants. I have given up sowing broad beans in the autumn, they seldom seem to do well on my heavy clay and spring sown (in loo roll modules) catch up very quickly. Sweet peas sown in February are looking good and ready to go out in the next week or two.



The hellebores (lenten lillies) were looking very good at the beginning of March, but have not taken to the recent frosts very kindly, the flowers are a bit tatty round the edges. I am building quite a collection of these, I love them, they are such a welcome at this time of year... but disappointing for cutting for the house unless one floats the flowers in water.

Our bed of Margaret Merill roses are looking quite healthy, I pruned these with a hedge cutter quite severely in November, and the new growth has had no frost scorching. I have given them an early drenching spray with wettable sulphur as a first step to controlling blackspot. I also used this spray on the quince trees which can be quit spoilt by a sort of scab in the late summer. Hopefully this will help

Just before half term the school had a themed week all about Robin Hood. This was used to stimulate the children's learning in all aspects of the curriculum. Rainfall: Both February and the first 2 weeks of March 2013 have had lower than average rainfall which is a good thing given the saturated ground which is finally beginning to dry out. The rain overnight on 15th March brought the river levels back up though. No significant snow in Payhembury.

Temperatures: It has been slightly cooler than average in both February and early March. The 11-14 March period was particularly chilly with heavy snow in the south east and Channel Islands but it just missed us.

Weather elsewhere: The recent snow in Jersey broke records and it has caused problems for the Jersey Royal potato crop. The potatoes were already two weeks behind schedule after one of the wettest winters in 50 years in Jersey. The early potato plants are now at risk of damage because of families sledging in the snow. In New Zealand currently in drought, the cricket against England was abandoned due to rain.
