

PAYHEMBURY PRIMARY SCHOOL



There were several school trips after half term: Willow Class went to Plymouth Aquarium and Ash and Oak Class went on the steam train from Paignton and a boat trip. Everyone had lots of fun.

A big highlight in June was the Year 4, 5 and 6 residential trip to Hooke Court, what a great success!!! Despite a distinct lack of sleep on the first night for everyone, the children had a fantastic time embracing a range of outdoor activities from kayaking to a search and rescue activity. For many children this was their first time away; they all coped brilliantly and have been great ambassadors for the school.

We had a really great day at Sports day in June. As usual the children were super and we had lots of new records broken in most of the events. Sports day is all about the

children; everyone took part and really tried their very best. The children behaved impeccably and it was a relief to see the rain stay away. Red family group won the Sports Day cup with 701 points, Yellow family group came second with 563 points followed closely behind by Green family group with 503 points.

Also in June Year 6 went to the Donkey Sanctuary to participate in the county run Life Skills programme. It's a whistle stop carousel of activities which focus on raising the children's personal awareness on health and safety. It looks at traffic/road safety, beach and sea safety, washing hands and keeping clean, fire awareness in the home, Internet safety and building/construction safety. All the agencies involved give 15 minute interactive workshops for the children. The finale is always a demonstration of a chip pan fire by the fire Brigade. As you can imagine it is a fairly explosive and hard hitting show but the children are enthralled by what they learn through the demonstration.

The children have learnt the songs for the end of year service in Church and it was beau-

tiful. The end of year service is always quite emotional as the children prepare to say goodbye to the Year 6 children moving to Kings. Year 6 had their transition week at Kings in July, as well as the year 6 transition conference for the church schools. Tipton St. John and Feniton School came to our village Hall to take part in a joint afternoon of activi-



ties. The focus was to prepare children for Kings which isn't a church school.

It was very successful and Rev. Cate thoroughly enjoys running it. Congratulations to Year 6 for achieving such wonderful SATs results. 100% achieved





level4 or above in Maths and reading and 90% in writing. We have also welcomed into school this half term our new reception children, who will be joining us in September. Hopefully, this will help a smooth transition for both children and parents and we look forward to having them in school.

CHURCHYARD CLEANUP


This will be on Saturday 17th August and although the grass is not growing as fast now, it still needs a trim and tidy up.



Hello again



Firstly, my apologies for missing last month's Paper! My excuse is that we've been away on holiday. In Sweden, we saw a lot of fieldfares with their young. You will know that these are the birds which come here in the Winter in great numbers, to escape the ice and snow of Scandinavia. We also came across many

barnacle geese, with their goslings. Like the fieldfares, they also breed in northern climes.

In early June, the lanes around here were beautiful. Lots of wild flowers, swallows skim-

ming, wagtails wagging and small trout in the Tale. A green woodpecker in our garden, and slow worms in the compost heap---several of them. They look like small snakes, but they are actually legless lizards. I think they have their babies in the compost! We saw one on our patio sunning itself. Or, had it been dropped there by a large bird?





Gatekeeper butterfly

In early July, the local lanes were still lovely, with plenty of wild roses and honeysuckle in the hedgerows. More butterflies now, including meadow browns and gatekeepers. The trout in the Tale are now growing. Lots of young birds about, particularly goldfinches and blackbirds, who have eaten the early raspberries---such is life! This morning, I saw a spotted flycatcher in the oaks. Leonard tells me there are swifts flying round the church tower. They won't be here

for much longer, as they are the first birds to return to their Winter homes in Africa.

Notes from the Parish Council Meeting held Wed 10th July 2013 (Subject to approval at next meeting)

Public Session: Several members of the Parish were in attendance to discuss the road closure at Uggaton Cross. An e-mail from Richard Hosgood, DCC Highways confirmed that the road repairs from Uggaton Cross to Broadleaze Cross would not take place before July 2014 due to budget limitations, and the road would remain closed until this time. It was strongly felt that Broadleaze Cross is the safest outlet onto the A373, thus motorists now having to use more dangerous crossroads onto the busy road.

Correspondence was read out confirming that Natural England believe the badger setts to be no longer in use, so this does not dictate any work scheduling.

Cllr Diviani took the correspondence and photos and agreed to speed up the debate regarding this issue.

Parishioners were encouraged to write to the Parish Council with their thoughts on the issue, and to detail how the road closure affects their day to day life and business. The Council will collate all correspondence and pass onto Cllr Diviani, along with a covering letter supporting the need to press on with repairs based on the safety issue.

Further business during the public session included the problem with the T Junction in the village by Waterloo Plot due to an overgrown shrub on the junction and to inappropriate parking. Clerk to contact PC Anning and request he attend the village at busy school times to assess the danger. Clerk to write to residents regarding overgrown shrub.

District Councillor's Report: the possible re-location of the EDDC offices from Knowle, Sidmouth was discussed. Cllr Fowler asked the timescales of the draft local plan. The Inspectorate will look at it from October.

Matters Arising: *Cardboard Crusher:* Cllr Skinner proposed that he and Cllr Disney meet with Cllr Chubb, EDDC Environment Portfolio Holder, and then meet with Sita (waste management company).

Parishes Together Funding: Grab boxes progressing slowly. The fund will be available again next year, so the Council should consider options for spend.

Active Villages: an update confirmed that equipment had been provided to the youth club and the tennis club. There are still funds available to provide adult equipment, so suggestions welcome.

Tree Cutting: Home owners do not require planning permission in order to cut down trees unless the tree in question has a preservation order on it.

An e-mail was read out from a Parishioner regarding App. 13/1227/VAR. Cllrs discussed the case again, but concluded that their original support for the application should stand.

Finances: Bank balance as at 28th June 2013: £3,385.81

PC Assets register: Cllr Williams reported that most of the assets were in good order. However, the chains around the green need some attention and to be added to the PC's Asset list. Also, the wall on the green is in need of repair. Waterloo Plot is overgrown. Cllr Disney to contact 2 contractors with regard to the work required on the plot.

Telephone Box: A quote of £600 had been received to repair the telephone box. Clerk to obtain another quote to compare. It was agreed to go ahead with the disconnection of electricity to the telephone box.


Rainfall: June and so far most of July have seen well below average rainfall with water butts empty and ponds drying out. This is in contrast to early July last year when we experienced torrential rain and landslips. As I write this no rain is forecast for another week.

Temperatures: June and particularly July have been well above average temperature. On 13 July we experienced the highest temperatures I have recorded in Payhembury since records began in 2007 and more high temperatures are forecast. On 18th July the Met Office issued a level 3 heatwave warning for the southwest which alerts healthcare services to monitor high risk groups. This year the jet stream is further north allowing prolonged high pressure over the British Isles.

Weather elsewhere: England is not the only country experiencing a heatwave, Japan has also recently had record temperatures up to 39 degC and some areas of the US have heat advisories in force. In contrast there have been devastating floods in Nepal and north-west India and bizarrely these countries don't exchange hydrological data so Nepal had no warning of the flood waters from India.


Dear Friends,
