Dear Friends,

As I write this letter we are quickly approaching that mad and frenetic time of year - Christmas. Prior to this we have the lead up period of preparation which in the church is known as Advent. Traditionally at this time we have used imagery of looking for the light, seeking the light of Christ through the darkness of winter.

Winter this year has been slow in coming, the temperature has been slow to drop though the rain certainly hasn't. The leaves have remained on many of the trees longer than usual despite the winds. So we could say that winter hasn't really set in as it might. Perhaps we haven't really noticed the decline in the amount of light around us, or have we?

Light is essential for growth, we can't do without light. For many people the lack of sunlight causes great emotional distress so in fact light is essential for all of God's creation to flourish. We use light in many ways in religious practice. We light candles to remember God's presence with us, we light candles to remind us that Jesus is the light of the world and that he lights our paths, we light candles as a sign of prayer, we light candles to remember our loved ones departed and we light candles in celebration. The bringing of light into a situation is extremely important and uplifting both in its religious significance and its social significance.

At this time of the year as we enter Advent, the preparation period, we are moving towards that great celebration of the birth of Jesus, God in human form, who brought light into a very dark world. We celebrate this season by lighting up our houses with a variety of decorations and as we do so may we think about the lighting up of our world by the baby in the manger, who brought God's love into the world directly to each one of us and in doing so lights each one of us up with his love. As we dash headlong into this season, with all that it brings, let us just pause for a moment of wonder and be lit up with the reason for the season, Jesus the light of the world.

May I wish you all a very Merry Christmas and a Joyous New Year.

### CHRISTMAS TIME FOR PETS

Christmas time, full of joy and cheer with presents under the tree and Christmas dinner smelling better than ever! We as vets want to ensure you and your pets have a great Christmas without a trip to the practice.

Cats are often more fascinated by Christmas trees than us and like to



climb and explore. Make sure your tree is secure and any glass decorations or those with sharp edges are out of the way of your intrigued feline. Cats can also enjoy a nibble on tinsel. They tend to eat lengths of stringy material which then causes a concertina effect on the intestines. This can be very harmful and requires surgery to treat, so keeping tinsel and string out of harm's way is much safer!

What Christmas is complete without chocolate? Unfortunately many dogs, and sometimes cats, also believe this to be true! Chocolate can cause vomiting and diarrhoea and in larger doses, liver failure and can be fatal. The higher the cocoa content the more the risk so keep those expensive dark chocolate truffles out of the way of any investigative hounds in the house! Be wary of chocolates on the tree and wrapped in presents within reach. Remember a small number of extra treats can lead to rapid weight gain which can take a long time to lose.

Dried fruit is also a risk to dogs and can cause renal failure so keep Christmas pudding, mince pies and Christmas cake away from low tables or other places your crafty hound may be able to get to.

For some of us, it can all get a bit much at these festive times. We may like our house being filled with family, friends and music but not all our pets do. For some, the bustle and noise can be very stressful. If you have a timid pet who enjoys the quiet, make sure there is somewhere peaceful that they can go to not be disturbed. They may prefer to have their food and litter tray in a

hidden corner.

Most importantly, have a wonderful Christmas with your furry friends and if you have any worries or suspect your pet has eaten something they shouldn't, don't hesitate to call your vet for advice. Merry Christmas from The Vale Veterinary Group!

### **Nature Notes**

### Observations from November

Hello again

We'll start off with animals this month. I was passing the stream near Milton



when a slight movement caught my eye - a squirrel in the stream? - no, not a squirrel but a stoat! He (or she!) was having a drink, but shot away quickly on seeing me. I was very pleased to see it because one rarely sees a stoat. Ray tells me he saw not one but four deer in the lower mead field the other day.

Back to birds and I always take a look into the village stream when I'm passing by. The grey wagtails are about again and I was lucky enough to see a dipper in the stream one day in late October. If you don't know the dipper, it's about blackbird size, has dark plumage but with a large pure white round mark on its breast. It stays beside fast flowing water. Indeed, dippers walk along the bottom of streams to find food. It gets its name from its characteristic habit of bobbing up and down quickly, i.e. dipping. Or is it because it 'dips' in the water?

Anne tells me she's seen a kingfisher in her garden pond - how lucky! There was a green woodpecker climbing up Nan's tree trunk. Green woodies are normally seen here in summertime, digging for ants in the grass, so it's good to have them in late autumn. The great spotted woodies are back in our garden - one returned to a feeder several times yesterday! The last time I walked to Milton one flew into a tall tree followed by a jay



which landed close to it. There was a scuffle and the jay flew away quickly - woodies have very powerful beaks! I heard my first winter thrush cackling overhead. Looking up, I saw several in the sky. These are the fieldfares, our winter visitors from Scandinavia. We usually get hundreds of them each winter and they stay here feeding on the windfall apples in Angus's orchard.

# Payhembury Weather www.payhembury-weather.co.uk

**Rainfall**: October rainfall was close to the average but the start of November has been very wet with three times the normal rainfall. Local flooding was experienced around Payhembury on the 8th of November and once again storms battered the coast.

**Temperatures**: October and November temperatures continue the trend of being very warm with records broken for highest maximum in November and highest minimum in October. As a result lawn mowing has continued into November.

**Weather elsewhere**: Severe flooding in NW Italy on the 15th of November. The Met Office opened its Space Weather Forecasting Centre on the 8th of October. Space weather covers a variety of phenomenon including impacts from solar flares, geomagnetic storms and coronal mass ejections from the Sun. These can impact our satellite services, power distribution and exposure to radiation of flights over the poles. Finally a study has shown that the ozone hole is on track to recover in a few decades as a result of phasing out ozone depleting chemicals.

#### YOUR GUIDE TO WHO YOU SHOULD CALL

If it is an emergency and there is danger to life as a result of flooding you should not hesitate to call 999.

To report flooding of the highway and blocked drains contact Devon County Council's Highway Customer Service Centre on **0345 155 1004** or visit <a href="https://www.devon.gov.uk/drainage">www.devon.gov.uk/drainage</a>. Office hours are Monday to Friday 8am–8pm and Saturdays 9am–1pm. For emergencies outside of these hours call **01392 383329**.

For flooding on major trunk roads (the M5, A30, A38, A35 and A303) contact the Highways Agency on **0300 123 5000** (24 hours service).

To report flooding from sewers and water pipes contact South West Water on **0844 346 2020** (24 hours service).

For advice and enquiries about flood warnings contact the Environment Agency's Floodline on **0845 988 1188** or **0345 988 1188** (24 hours service).

For general queries about Main River or flooding from the sea contact the Environment Agency on **03708 506 506** or **0345 988 1188** or visit <a href="https://www.gov.uk/environment-agency">www.gov.uk/environment-agency</a>.

In the first instance of local flooding and for sandbag requests contact your local District or Parish Council Flood Warden to determine the availability of sandbags in your area. In Payhembury, if residents require sandbags, please contact the Parish Clerk on 01404 850094. Sandbags are kept at Slade Barton.
