

## Nature Notes Observations from December

Hello everyone

We have experienced some bright sunny days recently, and everything looks so much better in the sunshine, particularly the birds.

Walking up to Uggaton Cross, there were lots of fieldfares on the ground in the fields. Then, something spooked them, because they all flew up, chack-chacking away. You could see their lovely chestnut and grey colouring clearly.

On bright Winter days, the outlook from our bedroom window is interesting. On our feeders, we had goldfinches, blue and great tits, and house sparrows.

On the grass, underneath the feeders, picking up the seeds which have dropped, there were dunnocks, chaffinches, blackbirds and collared doves. In

the field opposite, a magpie, jackdaws, crows and wood pigeons. In the orchard across the field hundreds of fieldfares and a solitary buzzard.

Verbena says she saw a small bird of prey, which might have been a merlin, with a baby rabbit. Ray saw a bird which, from his description, could have been a turtle dove. (In the Winter?). Down at Tuck Mill, yesterday, a little egret was in the field by the river, his pure white body gleaming against the green grass. Not such good news is that the squirrels have returned to our garden, but I am mean, because I've invested in new squirrel proof feeders---so they claim! By the way, the male pheasant seems to have adopted us, because he jumps up on to the window ledge, and taps the window for our attention.

## GARDENING WITH ANGUS



Once we have had enough of the Christmas tree ,we cut off the branches with lopper, secateurs or axe, and use the branches in the garden as an ideal ground cover to protect border-line tender plants and ,or, their roots from the worst of the frost. The needles drop off eventually and in the spring the remaining twigs etc. make ideal plant supports . The trunk of course can be cut up and added to the log pile.



Time to start thinking of potatoes . As soon as available, buy ,or order ,at least a few tubers of the early varieties and set them to sprout in a cool but frost free place. I always take a big gamble and plant a few earlies long before recommended dates and cover with fleece , even the Christmas tree branches are a help. The first growth does not come through until mid to late march, by which time the worst of frosts are over and the fleece is more than enough to protect the young growth, even a little bit of frost scorch will do no great harm. This way one can start harvesting at the end of May, and then use the ground for another crop .... leeks for example.


It helps to put some cover over the soil early in January so the soil is in reasonable state. I often can plant in mid February.

I have finished making a new sizeable garden frame , I have always been fascinated by the various techniques used by horticulturists in past centuries to extend the seasons and make extra use of available space. I hope to elaborate on this in future months. Meanwhile Happy New Year !

# Payhembury Weather

**Rainfall:** After a relatively dry start the heavens opened on 21 and 24 November with record breaking daily totals over Payhembury. This resulted in the village being cut off for a short while on the morning of 21<sup>st</sup>. I recorded 39mm on 21<sup>st</sup> but I believe this was an underestimate as 60mm was reported at Dunkeswell. Some of the banks of the sunken Devon lanes are damaged. December has started with average rainfall but with so much water on the fields it doesn't take much rain to cause flooding.

**Temperatures:** November turned out slightly warmer than average but December has started cold with sub-zero temperatures at night causing the water still flowing on to roads to freeze and give picturesque air frosts. The second half of December is warmer making a white Christmas unlikely.

**Weather elsewhere:** Sunday 4<sup>th</sup> November saw snow in N. Somerset whereas here we just had heavy rain. Further afield a "super typhoon" hit the Philippines killing up to 475 people on 8<sup>th</sup> Dec. The unusual thing about typhoon Bopha was it formed so close to the equator at 7.4N. In the S. Pacific Tropical cyclone Evan is now lashing Samoa in the Pacific with waves of 10m and now heading to Fiji.
