

PET ADVICE FROM THE VALE VETERINARY CENTRE



Obesity in pets

Pet Advice 60% of dogs in the UK and 20% of cats are overweight and obesity can lead to many health issues to your pet including arthritis, diabetes mellitus, heart disease and some cancers.

Get your vet to weigh your pet to help you improve your pets lifestyle and quality of life; also rule out other disease factors with your veterinary surgeon before starting your bet on a diet plan.

Why do pets become overweight?

- Inadequate exercise
- Feeding food ad lib (treats, human foods, extra food above daily allowance)
- Age older pets have slower metabolisms
- Hormonal problems
- Breed disposition e.g. Labradors

Things to consider if you think your pet is overweight



- Body condition score you should be able to just feel your pets ribs and spine when you gently stroke them and they should have a 'slight waist'
- Do you know how much food you are giving & is it correct?
- Treats how many are you giving a day and are you reducing the food to allow for this. Human scraps add calorific content to your pet's diet
- Exercise how long are you giving as structured exercise a day?

Tips for helping your pet lose weight

- Use the recommended food guide on the bag of food to feed your pet for its ideal weight and weigh the food to make sure it is correct
- Don't feed human food one digestive biscuit is like us eating a burger
- Remember treats are extra to the daily diet so you need to allow for this, e.g. for every gravy bone biscuit you give reduce the food by 5 grams
- Hold back some of your pets daily allowance to use as a treat instead
- Dogs when out on walks get them swimming or walking through long grass it helps burn more energy

• Cats – trickle feed them their food, use a treat ball instead of in a bowl or put some food at the top of the stairs to make them work for their food.

Remember veterinary nurses are there to help support you and your pets through all aspects of your pets needs. If you are unsure of the right type of diet, how much to feed or you are unsure of the correct weight of your pet, have a chat with your veterinary nurse.

DO YOU VALUE THE ROLE OF THE ARTS & DRAMA IN OUR LIVES?

Many of you are involved in drama and theatre in a range of contexts, either professionally or in your community as a voluntary activity. Those who have children at school may know that the Government has announced several initiatives to change the school curriculum, most of which involve a diminution of the Arts and perhaps complete removal of Drama. As some-one who discovered Drama as a student and who has been working in it ever since (54 years) I am saddened and annoyed that this subject may die in schools. I believe that the weakening of art in education, including HE, will lead to a general slide in Drama's role in our culture and a narrowing of the kinds of Drama which are created. It is unlikely that everyone in the government will have experienced the kinds of Educational Drama which state schools use and only associate the subject with published scripts.

Rainfall: May experienced just below the average rainfall and June has started with a dry period reported in the table although recently more rain has fallen and is forecast.

Temperatures: Daytime temperatures have been warmer but the nightime temperatures colder than average in both May and June.

Sunshine in 2013: The first three months of 2013 had about 20% less sunshine than 2012 making it a dull start to 2013. April at least was slightly brighter than in 2012.

Weather elsewhere: The main weather news in Europe was the severe flooding of the rivers in S. Germany where 250-400mm rain fell within 3 days in early June. The high water levels in the Danube are now starting to threaten areas further downstream. In India the rain has been more welcome as the drought has been relieved with the onset of the 2013 monsoon which has now started in earnest.
