Dear Friends,

Where ever does time fly? No sooner do I seem to have written one month's letter then it is time to write the next. Perhaps it's old age or something that the time seems to pass by so quickly. Time of course is not something we can change, we can't add minutes or hours to a day even though we may wish to and we can't take minutes or hours away, but what we can do is to make the most of the time that we have.

We have many labour saving devices which should of course give us more time, but is that the case? I don't think so, we just fill up that time with other things. Sometimes it is those mundane things which make us slow down a little and allow us some time to think. I will confess to you that I like laminating, now to some of you that might seem very strange. But I often have to laminate, that is use a special heated machine to cover card or paper with a plastic film to make them more durable. I get great delight (I am really sad) in placing items of card or paper very carefully into fine plastic envelopes and then equally as carefully passing them through the machine that heats them up and seals the plastic to the paper. Now why should I get such satisfaction from this? I'm not sure, but you have to be very patient as the machine takes the plastic envelope very carefully in one side and passes it out the other. Waiting for this process I find very therapeutic. Why? It means I have to stop as this machine slowly processes each piece. I can't rush it, it takes its own time and I have to wait (not easy for someone like me who is impatient!) But when the finished item emerges there is a mild sense of satisfaction.

What can I learn from this? I suppose I learn that patience pays off and taking time for something to be done properly is never wasted and it means I have to stop rushing from one thing to another. Now that reminds me of how I need to approach a very important activity in my life; prayer. Prayer takes time, it can't really be rushed and we have to be patient to see how that prayer may be answered and time spent in prayer is never wasted, a time to stop and 'just be' in God's presence. I know I can't make more time in a day but I know that I can make more time to 'just be' with God and I also know that when I do I am refreshed to continue the daily rush, so why not try it regularly and see how you feel? Don't let time fly by without giving it a try.

Taking Care of our Older Pets

Do you own a dog over 7 or a cat that is over 10 years old?

Like us, as dogs and cats grow older, they are at an increased risk of developing common age-related diseases, such as:

- Cancer
- Kidney Disease
- Diabetes mellitus
- Dental disease
- Arthritis
- Heart disease
- Mental confusion
- Hyperthyroidism (cats)



Animals that are developing arthritis, for example, may be more reluctant to jump or run and you may see changes in their normal behaviour, such as sleeping in unusual positions and uncharacteristic grumpiness!

Other signs of illness can be increased or decreased appetite or drinking, weight loss or gain. Signs of disease can develop slowly over a period of time and sometimes go unnoticed. Early detection of these diseases mean steps can be taken to slow their progression and promote a good quality of life in old age. When diabetes and hyperthyroidism are caught early, they can be treated effectively for many years. Signs of kidney failure only start to show when 75% of the animal's kidneys has been destroyed, so the earlier this is diagnosed, the more of the kidney function can be saved.

If you feel that your senior pet would benefit from a check up, call your veterinary practice. Most practices will offer a **free senior pet check up with a nurse**, when your pet can be examined for signs of disease. Most practices will also offer discounted rates on blood tests and vet examinations to clients who have had a free check up where a problem has been found. Complimentary services such as physiotherapy and hydrotherapy can be very helpful and can help our oldies lead happier and more comfortable lives.

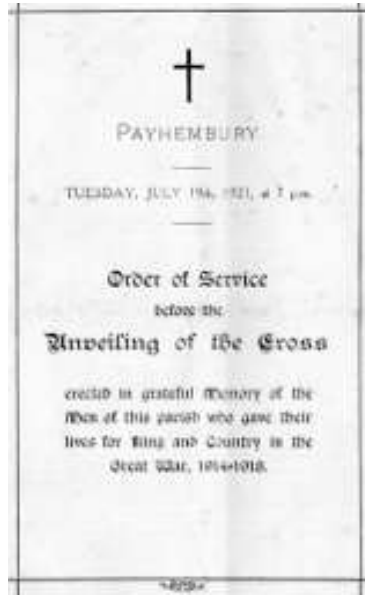

Payhembury War Memorial

On the 24th of June 1919 forty parishioners attended a meeting to consider the best way to commemorate the end of the 1914-18 war. It was decided that the first thing to do was to erect a memorial to those from the parish who had given their lives for their country. Various meetings followed and Messrs J Easton and Sons of Exeter were commissioned to make and erect the memorial which was to be a cross of rustic Blackenstone granite to stand eleven feet high on three octagonal steps. It was unveiled on the 19th of July 1921 with a service held in the church after which the congregation assembled around the memorial. The unveiling was performed by Cedric Drewe and the vicar

read the names of the men inscribed on the plinth before the Last Post was played by buglers of the Devon Regiment and wreaths were laid. No-one attending the ceremony in 1921 would have predicted that in less than 30 years more names would be engraved on the memorial and a second service and unveiling ceremony would be held on the 14th of August 1949. Today the memorial remains a lasting tribute to the fallen and on Remembrance Sunday parishioners will again gather around the cross to honour those lost in war.

Nature Notes

Observations from October

Hello everyone

Well, the weather has definitely taken a big turn for the worse recently - it's more like mid November than October! However, as the weather deteriorates we often see more birds in the garden. They seem to know when the bad weather is coming, so they feed up on the goodies we provide for them.



In our garden, we've had lots of goldies, chaffinches and tits - mainly great and blue tits, but also cole and long tailed tits flitting about. The latter come in gangs and pass through. We saw a green woodpecker the other day. We sometimes hear its cackle but don't see it. Martin tells me he saw a flock of swallows and martins recently. This is very late in the year for them, but they often have a late brood (their third brood!) particularly when the weather is good, which it was in September.

Down at Tuck Mill, they tell me that they see a kingfisher regularly, sitting on their wall and diving into the stream to catch small fish - how super!

We went to visit friends in Salcombe in September, on a lovely sunny day, which brought out the butterflies. We saw several good ones, including blues and some clouded yellows, which come over from the continent in late summer. I don't know why they are called 'clouded', because they are bright yellow, with black tips to their wings.



I understand that there is a move to name a bird species as Britain's national bird. Many countries have their national bird, such as the blue crane in South Africa and the resplendent quetzal in Guatemala (name dropping!) but we don't have one. I think ours should be the robin - don't you?

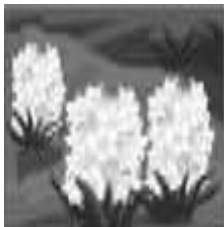

Hi friends

Can you see what I'm up to? I love this time of year as I love playing conkers. Well, you might think that we mice are far too small to play conkers but we don't play it like you humans do, with horse chestnuts drilled with a hole and a piece of string tied through, no we have our own special way, which we think is great. First of all we find a horse chestnut tree, they do look lovely when the blossom is out, but then we know that good conkers will form. When the wind blows the chestnuts fall off and we mice then push them into the hedge for safety so no one can see us, then we climb on top and start gnawing away at the shell. 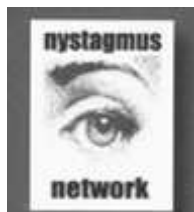
