Gallery changes its face for intoLACE

Thelma Hulbert Gallery (THG) is making preparations for their exciting Autumnal show intoLACE – a collaborative exhibition with the Devon Guild of Craftsmen. They will be bringing together artists whose work references lace.

The show includes pieces from the *Bluestockings* series by artist Catherine Bertola who has also shown at the V&A. **Other makers in the show include Imogen Luddy's** transformation of everyday objects such as cake stands with lace details and Helen **Snell's** 3-dimensional lasercut lace images.

Artist Andrea Stokes has been invited to create a remarkable installation at the gallery as part of intoLACE. Each of the 12 Georgian windows of the gallery will be covered with a lace drawing as if swathed with a net curtain. It will incorporate designs from traditional Honiton lace – a craft the town has been renowned for since the 17th century. It will be traced with the help of a team of 25 local women at a two day event.

Experienced lace makers from Allhallows Museum, Honiton will be based at the gallery during the exhibition to showcase their extraordinary lace-making skills, reinforcing the importance of keeping the skill alive in the 21st Century.

Payhembury's Telephone Box



Payhembury Parish Council recognises that the telephone box is in some need of attention and would like to consider parishioners' views of its future.

The following options have been identified:

Option 1. Leave the telephone box in its current location. Repair inside and out, maybe to include shelves for a book lending box. Possible repair costs: £600 - £700.

Option 2. Move the telephone box into Waterloo Plot (which is to benefit from being slightly re-designed and maintained). Possible Costs as above + possible planning permission costs.

Option 3. Move the telephone box up to the playing field for use by the children. Planning permission costs may be incurred.

Option 4. Dispose of the telephone box.

Forms will be placed in Payhembury Provisions where we would ask that you tick your preferred option. A decision will be made at the next meeting of Payhembury Parish Council on Wednesday 13th November. We would love to hear from as many parishioners as possible.

for a Social afternoon.



Nature Notes

Observations from October

Hi there

Well, the weather has taken a distinct turn for the worse, hasn't it? We've had our heating on and off for a few days now, and today it's very cold and rainy.

The butterflies hate this cold weather, so they have disappeared from our garden. However, there are lots of birds feeding on the feeders. We have blue and great tits, and this morning there were two cole tits. These are charming, perky little birds, not much bigger than blue tits, and can be recognised by their black and white heads. Their habit is to arrive on the feeders, snatch a nut or seed, and fly away with it---they don't hang around. We've also been visited by lots of young house sparrows, which have apparently largely disappeared from the towns and cities, but there's no shortage of them round here.

Our apples have been falling from the trees for some time, partly due to our friends the birds pecking away at them. There was a blackbird helping himself to them this morning.

There are still some swallows and martins about here, but their numbers have declined quite a lot. This cold weather will send them on their way to Africa very soon.

Improving Digital Photos



I am considering holding a workshop in Payhembury in the New Year to explore how digital photographs can be edited on a computer to achieve a more satisfactory image. This will be very basic and aimed at people who do not know how to enhance photographs they have taken. I will probably use simple software such as 'Microsoft Office Picture Manager'. If you are to follow the work practically in the session, you will need to bring a desktop or, preferably, laptop computer. I will provide a colour printer and paper.

Basics covered will be enhancing colour, brightness and contrast, cropping, resizing for sending by email and red-eye removal. I may also deal with how photos can be edited to remove parts of the image which interfere with the composition. I will also show how images can be enlarged using a company which receives the images as email attachments and returns the prints in a matter of days.

Next year I intend to mount an exhibition in Payhembury Hall of some of my photographs and would like to leave space in the exhibition for framed prints which result from the workshop. I have only become interested in these issues in the last ten years and it occurred to me that there may be others who were brought up with the box camera who would like to embrace the digital age.

Whether I hold the editing workshop will depend on whether I receive expressions of interest from people (of all ages) who would like to attend. Please email or phone me to discuss things or to register your interest.

Churchyard Memorial Area



The Parochial Church Council (PCC) wish to improve the Memorial Area of the churchyard. Improvements being considered are:

- ◆ The addition of another wall at right angles to the present one to give a more enclosed, private area and more plaque space.
- ◆ Removal or relocation and improvement of the flower bed to give easier access to existing plaques and making more ground available for future internment of ashes.
- ◆ Rendering the existing wall to improve its appearance and presentation of the plaques.
- ◆ Improving the ground adjacent to the wall by laying a small stoned area close to it in order to reduce unsightly weeds and allow more of an area for flowers and tributes.

However, before anything is decided, the PCC would appreciate comments and observations from anyone in the Parish and particularly from anyone who has an interest or connection to the existing plaques.

Building safer communities together

Devon charity wants to save you money on your heating oil



Homeowners and organisations that use oil to heat their properties can benefit from a local scheme created to help save them money.

The Devon Oil Collective was launched in Spring 2012 by the Community Council of Devon, a local charity that supports communities across Devon. The project works on the principle that people can reduce their annual spend on heating oil by collectively buying oil in bulk.

The scheme has already seen its members making substantial savings since it began. Typically members can look to save approximately £38 on a 1,000 litre order.

Project administrator Cara Stobart says “Through negotiation with suppliers, we are able to pass on reduced rates to our members. The savings we make are made on the strength of our orders. The more oil orders we take, the more negotiation power we have”.

The Devon County Council backed scheme acts like a broker. Once members have told them how much they wish to order, the Devon Oil Collective will negotiate a price and place the order on their behalf. There is an order deadline at the beginning of each month, a price is negotiated within 2 days of the deadline and deliveries are usually made within 2 weeks.

Fuel poverty is one of many topics the Community Council of Devon is trying to tackle in this large rural county. Schemes like the Devon Oil Collective can genuinely help families who may struggle to heat their homes this winter. There are a large proportion of properties off the gas network in Devon and the potential savings in collective buying is huge.

Warning – order early to avoid winter price hikes

The Devon Oil Collective wants to advise all oil users that there is a pattern in oil prices every year. Every summer the prices drop and in the winter the prices rise. This is understandable. Heating oil use increases when the temperature starts to drop in the winter months so the prices increase at the time you are most likely to need to buy. You can avoid these prices by thinking ahead and ordering early.

The Devon Oil Collective’s advice is to top up you oil tank in September/October to avoid the highest winter prices. To become a member of the Devon Oil Collective you can join from as little as £24 per year for a domestic household.

Rainfall: Below average rainfall for both August and the first half of September keeping the ground hard and dry. It was the driest summer in the UK as a whole since 2006. The first storm of the autumn arrived on Sunday 15th September bringing wind, rain and reduced temperatures.

Temperatures: Both August and September continued the warm theme of the summer with temperatures well above average. The summer of 2013 was the ninth warmest in the UK overall and the seventh sunniest since records began. The most notable weather of the summer was the prolonged heatwave in the middle of July, when temperatures regularly passed 30degC. It was the most sustained period of hot weather since July 2006.

Weather elsewhere: A freak hail storm turned parts of Falmouth into a winter wonderland in early September. Smoke from the wild fires in the Western U.S. and Canada was detected above the UK in August, a long journey! So far no big hurricanes have formed in the Atlantic possibly because of Saharan dust at high levels. The arctic sea-ice cover did not reach a record low this year and was closer to the norm.




PAYHEMBURY SPRING BULB AND FLOWER SHOW


