Rectory notes - A tough tinsel time

Covid Christmases were tough. For many, though, this year will be tougher – a lack not of intimacy this time but income. Budgets squeezed, rent and mortgages up, public service provision down, foodbank use escalating even before the current crisis, inflation carving into everything. Even the supermarkets have sensitively toned down their dream-inflating Christmas TV ads.

And yet, are tougher times closer to where Christmas began? "He has brought down the powerful from their thrones, and lifted up the lowly; he has filled the hungry with good things, and sent the rich away empty." Not the words of a political revolutionary, or a newspaper headlining a tycoon's downfall, but the song of Jesus' mother Mary after the angel's visit. The start of the Christmas story.

For Palestine, 2,000 years ago was the toughest of times. Roman subjugation meant insufferable tax burdens. It meant daily fear of abuse for women by the occupying soldiers, fear of death for any man deemed to rebel. "In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered," begins the familiar Bethlehem tale. This was no innocent civic exercise but a tax-turbo-charging tool. "To you is born a Saviour," the shepherds heard, and from the bottom of the social pile heard it as heralding simple economic freedom more than we imagine. The Christmas story was birthed not in a romantic manger but in raw physical struggle.

The Romans have moved on. But global financial systems and immense corporate power now shape our lives. We may be a Mary feeling under the cosh – and Mary must have been tough and resilient more than meek and mild. We may be a shepherd – hard-working yet weighed-down. To both, God came. For both, God cut across their lives and met them in their plight. Solutions weren't instant, but hope for a new order was born.

Wherever this Christmas sits on the toughness scale for you, may it embrace you with the joy that ambushed Mary and the shepherds. And may we know the hope brought by the one born in Bethlehem whose self-proclaimed mission became to "bring good news to the poor, release to the captives, and let the oppressed go free."


Payhembury Parish Council meeting Wednesday 11th January at 7.30pm & Parish Council Grants

Avian Influenza (Bird Flu)

It's currently a legal requirement for all bird keepers to keep their birds housed and to follow stringent biosecurity measures to protect their flocks. This applies whether keepers have commercial flocks, or just a few birds in a backyard. The decision was made by the UK's Chief Veterinary Officer, as the UK continues to face its largest ever outbreak of avian influenza – with over 70 cases since the start of October.

You should be vigilant for any signs of disease in your birds and seek prompt advice from your vet if you have any concerns. You can help protect your birds and prevent avian flu by maintaining good biosecurity on your premises, including:

- Housing or netting all poultry and captive birds;
- Minimising direct and indirect contact between poultry and captive birds and wild birds – including making sure that their feed and water is not accessible to wild birds:
- Preventing access by poultry and captive birds to ponds and watercourses;
- Cleansing and disinfecting footwear and equipment before and after contact with poultry and captive birds (or changing into clean footwear before



tending to your birds);

- Regularly cleaning and disinfecting hard surfaces in areas where birds are kept;
- Reducing the movement of people, vehicles or equipment to and from areas where poultry and captive birds are kept, to minimise contamination, and using effective vermin control;
- Keeping fresh approved disinfectant at the right concentration for use at farm entrances and before entering poultry and captive bird housing or enclosures.

Full details of what is required can be found on the government website – www.gov.uk/bird-flu

You can also find a self-assessment checklist at the above link to help you put the measures in place, as well as more information about the virus. You can keep up to date with any future changes by regularly visiting the avian influenza section on the government website, and by registering for email or text alerts – www.gov.uk/guidance/apha-alert-subscription-service

The risk to public health from the virus is very low, however it is important that people don't pick up sick or dead birds. You should call the Defra helpline on 03459 33 55 77 if you find:

- One or more dead birds of prey or owl;
- Three or more dead gulls or wild waterfowl (swans, geese and ducks);
- Five or more dead birds of any species.

The Food Standards Agency advice remains unchanged, that avian influenza poses a very low food safety risk for UK consumers. Properly cooked poultry and poultry products, including eggs, are safe to eat.

Winter Plans for Snow and Ice Conditions on Payhembury Parish Roads

For the third year in a row, we have had no snow in the parish of Payhembury. Nevertheless, we cannot afford to be complacent and must, like the fire brigade, remain ready for action if necessary. We can take precautions such as preparing a snow plan for the parish, ensuring that our grit bins are full and that we have residents willing to help where possible. Although there may be no snow, the insidious nature of frost, causing icy roads, is a much more likely danger.

Devon County Council (DCC) is responsible for clearing and gritting major highways such as the A373, the A30 and from there to the level crossing in Feniton. With more miles of roads than any other single county, DCC has a huge task to undertake. Here are some statistics from last winter:

- Over 220,000km of road salted by 1,761 (significantly down on last year's 3,023) individual grit runs;
- Over 8,000 tonnes (the previous year was 18,000 tonnes) of salt were used;
- Lowest road temperature 6.4°C on Dartmoor on 20th January;
- A light covering of snow fell only on high ground such as Dartmoor.

DCC expects parish councils to be responsible for the roads within their parish boundaries and they expect each parish to appoint a snow warden, snow warden assistants and to produce a Snow Plan. The Parish Council has therefore produced a plan and appointed a snow warden. We have some volunteer snow warden assistants in several areas and new volunteers are always welcome.

DCC help with the provision of salt / grit as necessary. Currently there are six yellow/green salt / grit bins located in the

parish. Clearly it would be neither practical nor cost-effective to treat all <u>15 miles</u> of our parish roads in icy conditions. It is, therefore, planned to concentrate on a few significant places such as around the centre of Payhembury or on steep sections of road. In prioritising our actions, particular attention should be paid to access and safety for emergency services, key workers, vulnerable persons and for livestock.

As we have neither a snowplough nor a grit spreader, we have to rely on volunteers, wheelbarrows, shovels and, importantly, the cooperation of residents. Drivers should consider:

- Deciding if your journey is essential. Could you walk instead?
- Choosing a route that is likely to be clear without steep hills;
- Driving with caution, ensuring increased distance between vehicles, as well as using gentle braking;
- Being prepared with warm clothes, strong footwear and a spade;
- Never assuming that a road has been salted.

Parishioners should be aware that, in icy conditions, main roads such as the A373 may not be gritted and they should therefore proceed with caution.



Parking

I am writing in reply to the letter in the November magazine, regarding parking in the village. It is obvious that a carpark is needed for the safety of the parishioners. I, Roger Leach, expressed a wish over this to happen over 30 years ago. It was refused. I readdressed this problem recently and asked Robert to bring up the suggestion of a carpark on our land below the school in the meadows, it was refused again. If this had been agreed, the village would have had a perfect entrance to the school and village hall. Also a public footpath could have been incorporated in order to get to the shop. All the children from Hillside could have walked through into the school safely.

I have farmed this land all my life and know it to be suitable for this project. It was a generous offer and was foolish to have been rejected.

Weather for October 2022

Rainfall: October had several very wet days with the last day of the month being the wettest resulting in 31mm more than average. November has continued being wet with already the month's rain falling during the first 15 days. As a result, the fields are now saturated, but at least the Devon reservoirs should start to be filled, although as of 13th November they were only 39% full.

Temperatures: Daytime temperatures once again were exceptionally warm for October, being +3.2 degC above the norm and as a result the gardens have continued to bloom and the grass continues to grow. No air frosts yet this autumn. The start of November has also been exceptionally warm both day and night with some records broken elsewhere in the U.K.

Weather elsewhere: There seem to be many 'fatal' floods around the world over the past few weeks. In Australia, New South Wales has endured weeks of severe weather with very heavy rainfall and widespread flooding. California has also experienced heavy rain and snow on 8th November with floods. Colombian president Gustavo Petro declared a disaster on 1st November after rainfall levels across the country exceeded levels not seen in the past 40 years. The resulting flooding claimed the lives of at least 266 people. In contrast, the drought in Somalia is a humanitarian disaster unfolding.

Paul's Nature Notes October-November 2022

The local population of pigeons seems to have reached almost plague proportions and this does not auger well for our local farmers or for our winter vegetables. These birds can be so destructive of crops in the winter months. Mind you, they don't have it all their own way. A young sparrowhawk has set up its territory in the area and has been feasting on pigeons. It is an amazing spectacle to see such a bird on one of its "bombing" raids, flying in very low, hedge-hopping, and then conducting a tight braking turn before pouncing on some unsuspecting prey. To watch it feed though can be somewhat gruesome.

Very occasionally, we are witness to another of this bird's feeding modes. Over breakfast, I was suddenly aware out of the corner of my eye of a bulky bird smashing into a large bush adjacent to the bird feeders. It emerged moments later with a hapless goldfinch clutched in its talons. Our local sparrowhawk had struck again – so much effort for such a small morsel.

The project to record the flora and fauna of the parish has now been running for almost a year and a considerable amount of progress has been made. The precise locations of over 200 species of wildflowers have been recorded. Thanks to Di Somers, we now have an excellent understanding of the wild flora in Tale on the far western reaches of the parish, which includes three-cornered leek and creeping comfrey and to Tim Cox for discovering orchids on the far eastern slopes. On the northern reaches we have our glorious banks of snowdrops in late winter and on the southern fringes most of the last remaining Payhembury daffodils, not forgetting the banks of native bluebells in the spring. It has truly been a voyage of discovery and one that is not yet over.



Our local moth count has now reached 619 species and thanks to a great group of birdwatchers, we now know that we have 88 species in the area, although it has to be said that many are in serious decline and some may not have been seen for a few years.

A recent visit to Bowling Green Marsh in beautiful sunshine produced some wonderful birds – avocet, black-tailed godwits, curlews and ducks including countless teal plus a flash of electric blue as a kingfisher flew past.

In early November, there were reports of a large white owl in the Barrow Road area. Did anyone else see this bird?

Halina's Herb Corner

Frankincense (Boswellia serrata)

Last December, I wrote about one of the gifts offered by the Magi to the baby Jesus – myrrh. This December is about the other valuable offering – frankincense. It was and still is a very sought after valuable aromatic tree resin grown primarily in India, Somalia and Oman. Over many centuries, frankincense was said be worth more than its weight in gold.

Historically it was burnt to create a permeating scent during rites of passage such as weddings, childbirth, and funerals. It even accompanied Egyptian pharaohs on their journey into the hereafter, used both to embalm their bodies and perfume the chambers in which they were laid to rest.

It was used to oil hair, sweeten the breath and smoke from it, as eye makeup and in tattoos, as well as to mend cracked pots and the bark from its tree was used as a dye.

In the early years of Christianity, incense was expressly forbidden because of its associations with pagan worship; later, the Catholic Church would incorporate the burning of frankincense, myrrh and other aromatic items into specific rites. When you think about it – the burning of frankincense is infinitely sensible where the chances of infection and odour from the 'great unwashed' gathered masses would be countered by the antiseptic and sweet smelling smoke.

Dioscorides and others mentioned the therapeutic use of the resin in the treatment of skin disorders, in ophthalmology, haemorrhages and pneumonia. Pliny the Elder (1st century) mentions it as antidote to hemlock. The Iranian physician Avicenna "Ibn Sina" (10th century) in his book "El-Kanon Fi El-Tibb" thought that frankincense

was useful in many disorders and disease for helping fever, gastric disorders and tumours. In China, it is used for "almost everything".

Today, vast amounts of research are underway, many of which are confirming the traditional uses but identifying novel uses also. Frankincense is strongly anti-inflammatory, analgesic, antiseptic, antifungal and toning for the skin, bladder, lungs, and digestive tract.

Its use for pain management in inflammatory conditions such as joint issues, inflammatory bowel disease and skin conditions is comparable to several conventional treatments. Joint conditions benefit greatly. particularly when frankincense is used with turmeric. Another traditional application for respiratory conditions such as bronchitis. asthma, and fevers is also showing interesting results. Taken with liquorice, frankincense has been found to be protective and healing of the liver. Much interest circles around the way in which frankincense effects certain parts of the immune system, affecting both tumour growth and leukaemia development.

Caution – As with most herbs with high oil content frankincense should not be used during pregnancy.
