

Hazel's 1st Prize Winning Quiche (From the spring bulb and flower show 2012)

This will make a 10inch quiche

Pastry
8oz plain flour
2oz margarine
2oz lard
a bit of water

Make the pastry and chill for 1 hour

Roll it out to about 1/2 cm and blind bake at 200°C for 10-15 mins

Filling

4-5 rashers of smoky bacon chopped into smallish pieces and cooked till its crispy
1-2 onions chopped finely and cooked till translucent
2-3 eggs (depending on size)
around 1/4 - 1/2 pint of single cream
around 1/4 - 1/2 pint milk
salt and pepper, lots of strong cheese

Put the cooked bacon and onions in the pastry case first.

Mix together the eggs milk cream and salt and pepper (I put a bit of cheese in this mixture a well)

Put that into to pastry case then top with a layer of cheese

Cook on 180°C till set in middle about 30mins, it may take a bit longer but check it regularly (I just give mine a wobble).



I was interested to read Lorinda Perry's note about the above daffodil and feel it is appropriate to add a few details. The observant amongst you will have noticed that her note was prefaced by a small replication of the cover of the Payhembury Millennium Book which shows a small picture we had drawn of the said daffodil . On page 2 I wrote a small article about this flower.

It all arose because when we arrived at Cokesputt in 1989 we discovered masses of this daffodil in the banks and land at Cokesputt , and replanted them all in a small orchard where they still flourish today . In those days we took Paying Guests and had staying with us a Horticultural journalist/ specialist who was intrigued by these daffodils and gave me the following description which I replicated for the Millennium book : “ “Narcissus pseudo narcissus” the native English daffodil has over the years produced many different forms of the double and semi-double sports. One of the most distinctive of these occurs in the locality of Cheriton and Payhembury. Instead of double flowers where there are many petals, only the corona (centre) is multi-petalled giving a most attractive and neat effect “

The daffodil seems to naturalise freely and I have seen the odd clumps in hedgerows locally and elsewhere.

Nature Notes
Observations from April

Hello everyone

It's a lovely sunny Sunday morning, but there's a cold north wind blowing. The apple tree blossom doesn't want to open. I don't blame it. Looking skywards, there are four buzzards riding the thermals in the clear blue sky ---plus a few gulls.



On April Fools Day, I walked down to Tuck Mill, and it was very Spring-like. The chiffchaffs and willow warblers had arrived, and their songs filled the air. Also, black-birds, robins, wrens and chaffinches were in full song. Then the lovely voice of the song thrush could be heard, and there he was, just ahead of me. Long tailed tits, blue and great tits, plus a sparrow hawk after them. There's nothing like Spring in England!

Walking down the lane to Tuck Mill, I heard a birdsong which was common when I was a boy in the Midlands, but which I had not heard down here in Devon. And there he was, singing away in the top of an ash tree. "A liittle bit of bread and no cheeese!" Yes, the unmistakable song of the yellowhammer, a species which has declined in number in recent years. The male's lovely bright yellow head shone in the sunshine.

There have been a few butterflies about recently too, attracted out of hibernation by the warm sunshine. I've come across peacocks, tortoiseshells, orange tips and speckled woods---lovely creatures. And spring wild flowers too---primroses, wood anemones, wild daffs and even some bluebells in recent days braving the cold winds.

So far the court has been thoroughly weeded, had a gully dug around it to stop the weeds returning in the future and had new posts concreted in. It has also been pressure washed. We are now waiting on it being rebound and painted, although we **can't say exactly when this will be, as it depends on the weather.**

We had our AGM last month and welcomed some new members from the village which we are very happy about. We also welcomed some players from Broadhembury who are keen to join the committee and set up some inter- village fixtures.

Elderflower cordial

For the season when the elderflowers are out

20 Large heads Elderflower

2 Sliced Lemons

2 ozs citric acid

2 ½ Pints boiling water

3 ½ lbs granulated sugar

- ◆ Pick flowers when fully out, midday and as hot as the season permits and stroke the flowers off the stalks
- ◆ Put all ingredients in large bowl, add boiling water and stir to dissolve sugar
- ◆ Leave for 5 days , stirring each day, then strain off the lemon and flowers
- ◆ Put into sterilised containers (clean milk containers do well)

This cordial can be frozen in plastic containers but leave head room in container for expansion. To use dilute to taste with still or sparkling water

Elderflower Cooler

1 bottle dry white wine , 4-6 tablespoons Elderflower cordial & 1 bottle Sparkling Water

Rainfall: Devon has just been declared a drought area though no hosepipe ban yet. The reason is March only provided 23% of its normal rainfall and April so far has not been much better. You only have to look at the stream through the village to see how low the levels are in the groundwater. Luckily, as its not raining, my rain gauge failed so some of the figures in April rely on measurements in the Otter Valley. It has now been replaced.

Temperatures: March was exceptionally warm especially towards the end of the month where record highs were recorded. The temperatures have plunged in April though daytime is still warmer than average. The other notable statistic has been the cold nights seen in the large temperature range with several air frosts during March and April, not good for delicate plants.

Weather elsewhere: Over 90 cities in more than half of the US states had their warmest March on record. Unfortunately devastating tornadoes have also accompanied these warm temperatures with several deaths reported despite the advance warnings being given.
