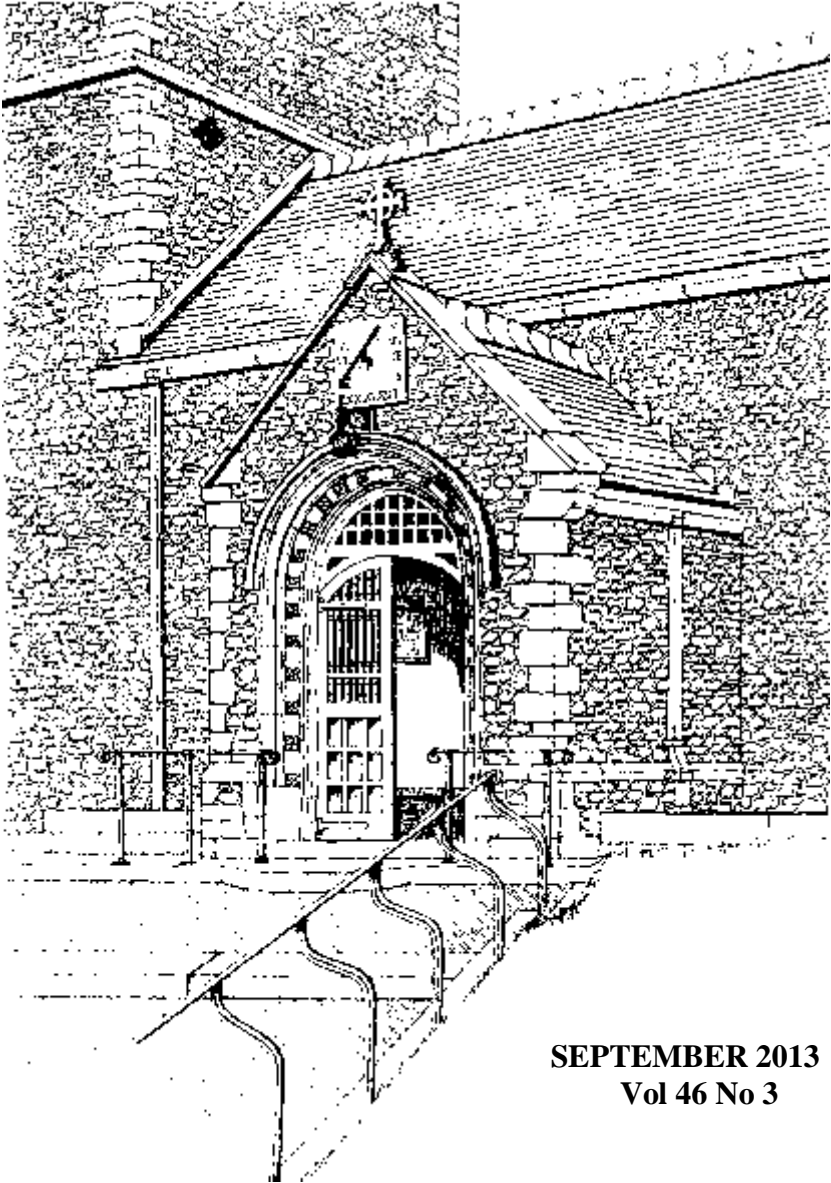

New Community Theatre Project: *The Music of Time*  
Tale Valley Community Theatre's new intergenerational project is well under way. Twelve writers ranging in ages from eleven to seventy four have created the fourteen scenes which will form the content of *The Music of Time* to be performed in November. This will be the fourteenth original production for the company since *Parson Terry's Dinner* in 2000 and, unusually for

TVCT which has used a range of performance sites, it will be performed in Payhembury Hall. Nick Pruce from Talaton has written the lyrics of the theme song and Charles West from Plymtree is Musical Director. Fourteen singers have already said they want to take part.

The scenes, depicting various aspects of life – travel, family life, religion etc – are paired, with one offering a view from the childhood of older participants (1940s) whilst the other depicts projections of that theme in the old age of the young participants (2080s). There will be a casting and directing workshop on Sunday Sept 15<sup>th</sup> in Payhembury Hall. From 10.00am-1.30pm I will work with all who are interested in acting and from 2.00pm-4.00pm all those interested in directing. As the scenes are no more than ten minutes long this is an ideal opportunity for people to dip their toes into theatre and to learn new skills. It also means that busy people can become involved without mortgaging their life to the production. If you are interested in being a part of *The Music of Time* **but can't make the opening workshop**, please let me know.

In Poland recently, in Warsaw and **Supraśl, I created two community plays in just five days each.** Both productions were highly successful but the main pleasure for me was to be told by the participants how much they had enjoyed the experience. Each production was unique – as will be *The Music of Time*. Why not get involved in some capacity? We need actors, directors, digital artists to create projected backdrops, lighting and sound technicians and a host of other posts to make this original project work. I am very willing to chat about possibilities or to meet individuals to discuss possible involvement.

*Nature Notes*  
*Observations from August*

Hello there



Several of you have told me that they haven't seen many birds about in recent weeks. Well, neither have I. There is a good reason for this, which is that birds lie low in July and August, because they moult---that is, they lose some of their feathers, which means that they can't fly as well. They wait until their new feathers have grown before we see them again. Happily, that is about now, (mid August), so there have been a few more birds about in the last week or so.

Most of the birds in our garden at present are this year's youngsters. We have had young tits and finches on the feeders, and young black-birds eating the raspberries. We are also lucky to have two green woodpeckers regularly coming to eat the ants in our lawn. Down at Tuck Mill, some of us saw a blue streak fly past down the Tale---yes, a kingfisher in all its glory---surely Britain's most spectacular bird!. There were also swallows feeding their young on the wires.



The good weather we've experienced recently has brought out a lot more butterflies. There are peacocks, red admirals, small tortoise-shells, a comma, gatekeepers and hundreds of whites on the buddleia---the butterflies' favourite food bush. I also saw a clouded yellow and a couple of garden tiger moths---real Summer beauties!

## Poffitt Lane

Thanks to excellent work by Richard Spurway at County Hall, a major section of the Tale Common Head to the River Tale section of Poffitt has been resurfaced. This was a major task as the lane was previously virtually impassable due to deep ruts and exposed stones (photo right). This part of the lane is now easily available to pedestrians, horses and off-road vehicles (Poffitt is classed as an 'unmetalled road' and vehicles have a right to use it, although they undoubtedly aided some of the deepest rutting).



The photo at the end shows this bit of road after repair.



The footbridge (shown left before repair) which takes the ROW to Pound Lane and thereby to Haskins Cross has been repaired and all three bridges on that route are passable.

The section which branches from the River Tale into Broadhembury Parish, leading to Luton, has yet to be repaired. Richard Spurway is liaising with a colleague who is responsible for this section and we expect news soon on the repair of the Broadhembury section.

I am grateful to Keith Granger (Clerk to Broadhembury Parish Council) and my wife, Di (Chair of Payhembury Parish Council) for the support they provided and continue to give to make this ROW passable. A glance at a map of 1950s Payhembury shows very clearly how

many ROW have been closed. These closures resulted from changed patterns of employment in rural areas – farmworkers often went to and from farms across the fields - and transport - few had cars and horses were commonplace on farms - and changes in farming techniques which removed hedges and found it inconvenient to have ROW passing through crops and fields holding stock. Those which remain are to be cherished and Poffitt (according to Robin Stanes a name derived from 'purfleet' a stream or marsh of the bitterns) was saved from partial closure in the 1980s. Making it passable will enable good circular walks and additional access to the River Tale. It is hoped that the three sections will be repaired by the New Year.

## Caring for your pet's teeth

Like humans, cats and dogs have a set of baby teeth that fall out and then have a set of adult teeth that need to last for the rest of their life!

**Caring for these teeth will help ensure your pet doesn't suffer** from any of the problems associated with poor dental hygiene,

Plaque and tartar.

Swollen/painful gums, sometimes receding from the teeth leaving them loose or falling out.

Bad breath, caused by bacteria (not nice for them or us!). In severe cases the bacteria can enter the blood stream, potentially damaging internal organs.

### What can you do to help prevent dental disease?

#### Brushing:

**We brush our teeth every day, so why not your pet's teeth too?!** There are many different pet toothbrushes and toothpastes available (your own toothpaste is not safe for pets). **It is best to start brushing your pet's teeth from a young age so they learn to accept it;** however, it is possible to start slowly and gently with an older pet too.

#### Diet:

Feeding a biscuit diet that your pet has to crunch on can help to keep the teeth clean. There are many specially formulated dental diets that contain everything your pet needs. Dental chews can also be used to keep the teeth clean, these contain calories so reduce daily ration to allow for this.

#### Anti plaque water additives:

**It is possible to add a special solution to your pet's drinking water.** This contains antibacterial agents and an ingredient that helps stop plaque and tartar formation and can be purchased from your Veterinary Surgery.

*A Veterinary Nurse can check your pet's teeth (normally a free service), and will be able to advise you on the best dental care for your pet.*

## **A sense of place; is there a future for local identity?**

Devon's rural communities have thrived on their individuality. Each owes their origins to different circumstances, have different histories and have developed unique characteristics that build a sense of community, which in turn is part of our personal identity. Yet these features are under threat. Is our countryside heading in the same direction as the typical 'could be any town' high street?

The Community Council of Devon will be looking at the problems at their annual conference taking place at Exeter Racecourse on 12 September. With seven speakers covering areas of rural life from housing to health, policing to community enterprise, the conference may not produce all the solutions, but aims to increase consciousness of this challenge and to advance the debate.

**Rainfall:** July was completely rain free until 24<sup>th</sup> when the rains came and eventually contributed to July having more than half its normal rainfall 32mm. In contrast last year's July rainfall was 104.3mm. August has been wetter with close to average rainfall.

**Temperatures:** July was well above average in temperature and at least with my thermometer 18<sup>th</sup> July was the hottest on my record though I have suspicions it may read too high. August has been cooler but still well above the average. It is interesting to compare last July with this one. Last year the mean maximum temperature was 21.8 degC compared to 26.5 degC this year.

**Weather elsewhere:** The latest measurements of arctic sea-ice suggest 2013 will not see the fractional cover go as low as the record minimum of 2012. We will know for sure in early September. In contrast in Idaho the hot weather has led to wildfires burning for weeks on end.

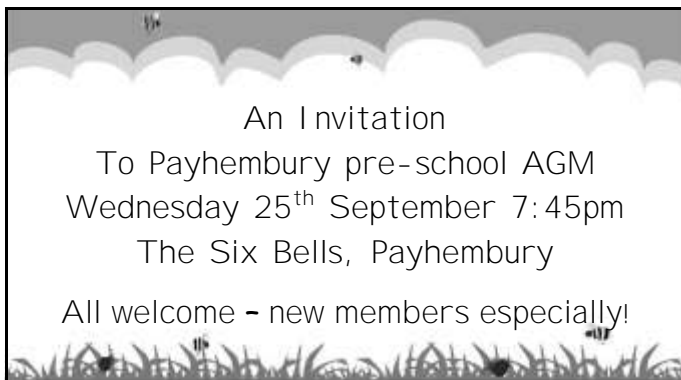
