



I was rather saddened recently when listening to people being interviewed on the radio and TV about the elections that were coming up. I heard several comments along the same theme; the people didn't vote because, "they don't do

anything for me". The "they" was the politicians and the people interviewed were inferring that they would only vote if they personally got something out of it. I felt really perturbed by this reaction, what about community spirit, what about loving your neighbour?

I really thought what a sad state that some people have moved so far away from the basic Christian values of our society, in fact moved away from basic values of most religions. Are we developing a society of "me" rather than "we"?

I think we are fortunate to live in villages where we do still look out for each other,

where we have concern for each other and for our communities. Where we can pull together to support each other in raising funds as in soup lunches, plant sales and the like and coming together for May Day events, Fun Days etc. After occasions like those we may feel exhausted but there is also a sense of satisfaction and

We are also fortunate in our villages that in our Primary Schools there is a heavy emphasis on caring for others, apart from themselves, of looking outwards into the wider world and supporting where they can. All values which we hope and pray they will develop and take into later life so if interviewed they won't respond in such a negative way as those I heard interviewed.

Cyclists spotted!



Gina and Tim Cox cycled through Tale recently and made time to stop and chat to Di and me before taking off to Aunk, Talaton and home. Unlike most contemporary cyclists who look as though they are heading for the *Tour de France*, they were dressed in ordinary clothing but wearing the necessary safety helmets. Gina was riding a battery-assisted *'Powabyke'* whilst Tim was on a very sleek *Raleigh 'Pursuit'*, a fitting name given Gina's steed and speed.

Gina invited us to try out the *Powabyke* and Di and I were very impressed with the ways in which the motor assisted the ride. I have an upright, threespeed gents *Rudge* bike made around 1965 with a chain-

case, lever brakes and sprung saddle. Handlebars, pedal cranks and wheel rims are chrome, with a black frame and mudguards with gold detail. For me it is an object of beauty and reminds me of simpler days and the sunshine of youth. As a boy in Wales, my first bike was an adult ladies' one on which I could not reach the saddle (even adjusted to its lowest point) and on which the handlebars seemed at head height. Cycling with my older brother and friends, after coming down a steep hill on 'Mam's bike' I failed to take a sharp right hander and ended up in a field. These were the days when 'ladies' rode bikes with stings radiating from the rear hub to the mudguard's edges to deter their long skirts and coats from becoming enmeshed in the back wheel. When 'dropped handlebars' became fashionable, the older bikes were known as 'sit-up-and-beg' models. In my Welsh village there was no electricity and I earned most of my pocket money by ferreting for rabbits and shooting pigeons (both taken by my father to the factory where he worked where there was a ready market due to post-war rationing of meat) and catching moles for farmers. I set my traps on the way to school and checked them on the way home. I sent the cured skins to East Anglia and I rejoiced when the postal order for 7/6d (around 36p) arrived.

In the absence of cars and public transport the bike was the main means of transport. I find it interesting that in a working visit to China a few years ago, the bike is not just a means of transport but it, and especially the trike, is also an important way of transporting sometimes amazing amounts of material. The photo was taken in Beijing.



We wish Gina and Tim many more pleasurable bike rides. Does anyone else have memories of childhood bikes and rides?

Hello everyone

Two of my informants (!!) have told me that we have not one, but two red kites in the area. In fact, they are a pair who are nesting. I haven't seen them myself, but I'll be keeping my eyes peeled. As you may know, red kites are making a big come back in Britain, having recovered from near extinction. They are large beautiful birds of prey, with a forked tail, so if you see them, do let me know.

I hope the pair of bullfinches I reported on last month are still about --- I did see one in my garden a couple of weeks ago. We have a song thrush's nest containing four eggs near us. The swallows and martins have arrived in force now, plus their larger cousins, the swifts. Did you know that swifts spend nearly all of their lives in the air, only occasionally coming in to land.

On a walk to Blue Anchor, I saw several whitethroats and a couple of buzzards. I also heard and then saw a male blackcap. Blackcaps are small grey warblers. The male sports a black cap to its head, but the female's head is brown. The male sings quite beautifully. To crown all this, there was a blue flash as I approached the river Tale. Yes, a kingfisher streaking by---you have to be very quick to see these super little birds. There must be fish in the river, so I had a look and there were a few tell-tale splashes, as the small trout jumped for flies.

I haven't seen very many butterflies yet. There are a few orange tips about, plus tortoiseshells, but not much else yet.

Peter Randall-Page

Thelma Hulbert Gallery's (THG) major new exhibition presents the work of the internationally acclaimed artist Peter Randall-Page. This prolific artist and sculptor has undertaken commissions across the world and his work is held in many important collections including the Tate and the British Museum.

Well-known across the South West for his monumental 'Seed' sculpture at the Eden Project and recent show in Plymouth, Peter Randall-Page, who is based in Devon, has chosen THG in Honiton, East Devon as an ideal platform for this important new exhibition.

The exhibition, opening on 10 May, will feature new drawings, prints and sculptures including Honeysuckle I & II, which are linocuts of the flowing form of the honeysuckle.

"Drawing has always been an important part of my practice as an artist. For me, drawing takes many forms and performs many different functions. I always carry a sketch book as an aide-memoire for ideas and have always made objective drawings as a way of analysing and studying form. When working with stone I often draw directly onto the surface prior to carving." Randall-Page commented.

Peter Randall-Page's work has continually been inspired by his study of natural phenomena and their impact on our senses and emotions. He constantly examines the underlying principles determining growth and the forms it produces. In his words "Geometry is the theme on which nature plays her infinite variations."

Rainfall: Both April and May so far have experienced only slightly above average rainfall which is good for the gardens. Ottery was briefly flooded after a thunderstorm on the evening of 28th April but Payhembury escaped the heavy rain.

Temperatures: They have remained above average throughout the period although there have been no notable warm periods. The 2^{nd} April provided a higher minimum than previously seen in this area.

Weather elsewhere: The Balkans have recently experienced flooding after prolonged heavy rain in Serbia and Bosnia. In the tropical Pacific another El Nino event is thought to be starting which will have an influence on the weather in Australia (drought) and western America (floods). California is still experiencing a drought so this may be welcome.

To the people of Payhembury (especially those living around the Green)

In September Tale Valley Community Theatre will perform 'They Dream of Home', a play written by me about the Village's and Parish's involvement in WW1. Some of you will remember the production, Parson Terry's Dinner, which I

created in 2000 which celebrated the turn of the Millennium. It was performed at various sites in the Village and I would like to achieve a similar thing with 'They Dream of Home'. I would like, therefore, as with Parson Terry, to be able to close sections of the roads to traffic for the play's 90 minute performance time. The penultimate scene recaptures the awfulness of warfare and life in the trenches, contrasted with the Christmas truce during which German and British troops came out of their trenches and sang carols together before resuming the fighting.

On the Green and surrounding area, for some minutes I would represent the use of shells and guns in the battle by the use of recorded sound effects plus some theatrical pyrotechnics to produce smoke and flashes. Done professionally, this will not be in any way dangerous and I will ensure that it is done by experts and that suitable insurance and emergency services are in place. However, the noise could be disturbing to young children and therefore I am writing this now to let you know that the production (and dress rehearsal) will generate some disruption and noise. I hope that, given the intention to commemorate the men of Payhembury who fought in that awful war, you will be able to cope with the dress rehearsal and performance on September 6th.

I am very happy to discuss this with anyone who wants to know more and also to send the script to people who would like to read it. Please email me at J.W.Somers@ex.ac.uk or telephone 01884 277390. If there is need, I will hold a meeting to discuss things.

I am sure this will be a very moving event. I am also arranging a number of other events such as an evening singing songs from the time, a talk by an historian and presentations by local schools. I also expect to mount an exhibition of local, family memorabilia related to WW1. I would be very grateful for your help in making this performance happen. The countryside code began in the 1950's to help people protect, respect and enjoy the countryside in England and Wales. As the summer months are fast approaching, it is beneficial to the environment and farmers to remind dog owners how to conduct themselves while walking in the countryside. Key things to consider are:

Respecting other people – always leave gates as you find them and follow instructions on signs. Leave farm equipment and animals alone, if you think an animal is in distress try to alert the farmer or inform the RSPCA. Keep out of the way if animals are being moved and follow farmers' directions.

Protecting the environment – always pick up after your dog and take litter home and dispose of it appropriately. Ensure your dog is wormed regularly, at least every 3 months, to prevent infections and to protect other animals.

Protecting your dog against diseases that can be contracted through wildlife – Monthly treatment against Lungworm protects your dog from the 'silent killer' that is carried by foxes. This parasite is not killed with regular worming treatment - ask your vet how to protect your dog.



Protecting livestock and wildlife - Make sure your dog is under control near any wildlife or farm animals by **keeping your dog on a lead**. Pay attention to any signs which may not permit dogs to walk on certain land.



Livestock can behave unpredictably especially if they have young animals; give them space so that they don't feel threatened. Some dogs have the tendency to chase animals; please keep them away from livestock, especially pregnant ewes and ewes with young lambs.

It is a legal requirement to keep your dog on a short lead on 'open access land' (no more than 2 metres) near animals and horses for safety reasons.




CLARET'S CORNER
